Re: Bylaw No. 2979/89 Northwest Area Structure Plan

We have examined the proposed plan in light of the questions and suggestions received from the public at the open house of May 11 and the submission at the public hearing of June 26. The questions and comments of Council during first reading have also been considered in the review of the plan document. As well, recent land use and ownership changes, together with the new City census figures have been used in the review.

This review has resulted in a number of changes being advised to the text and the supportive maps. Most of these changes are minor or editorial in nature, in order to provide greater clarity in the plan. Changes to the text are shown in **bold** print in the attached revised document.

Changes to the maps include:

Map 2 and 3:	updated subdivision, ownership and land use information
Map 8:	addition of tunnel/overpass information
Map 9:	new subdivision and convenience store location in Edgar industrial area; school locations in corners of sites; possible road closure of west end of Grant Street; land use change to commercial/industrial northwest of 67th Street and 67th Avenue intersection.

With these changes, we feel the proposed plan is in good order and recommend that Council proceed with second and third readings to bylaw 2979/89 with the proposed amendments.

INTRODUCTION

Enabling Legislation

This plan, known as the Northwest Area Structure Plan, has been prepared and adopted by the City of Red Deer pursuant to Section 64 of the Planning Act, being the enabling legislation.

Location

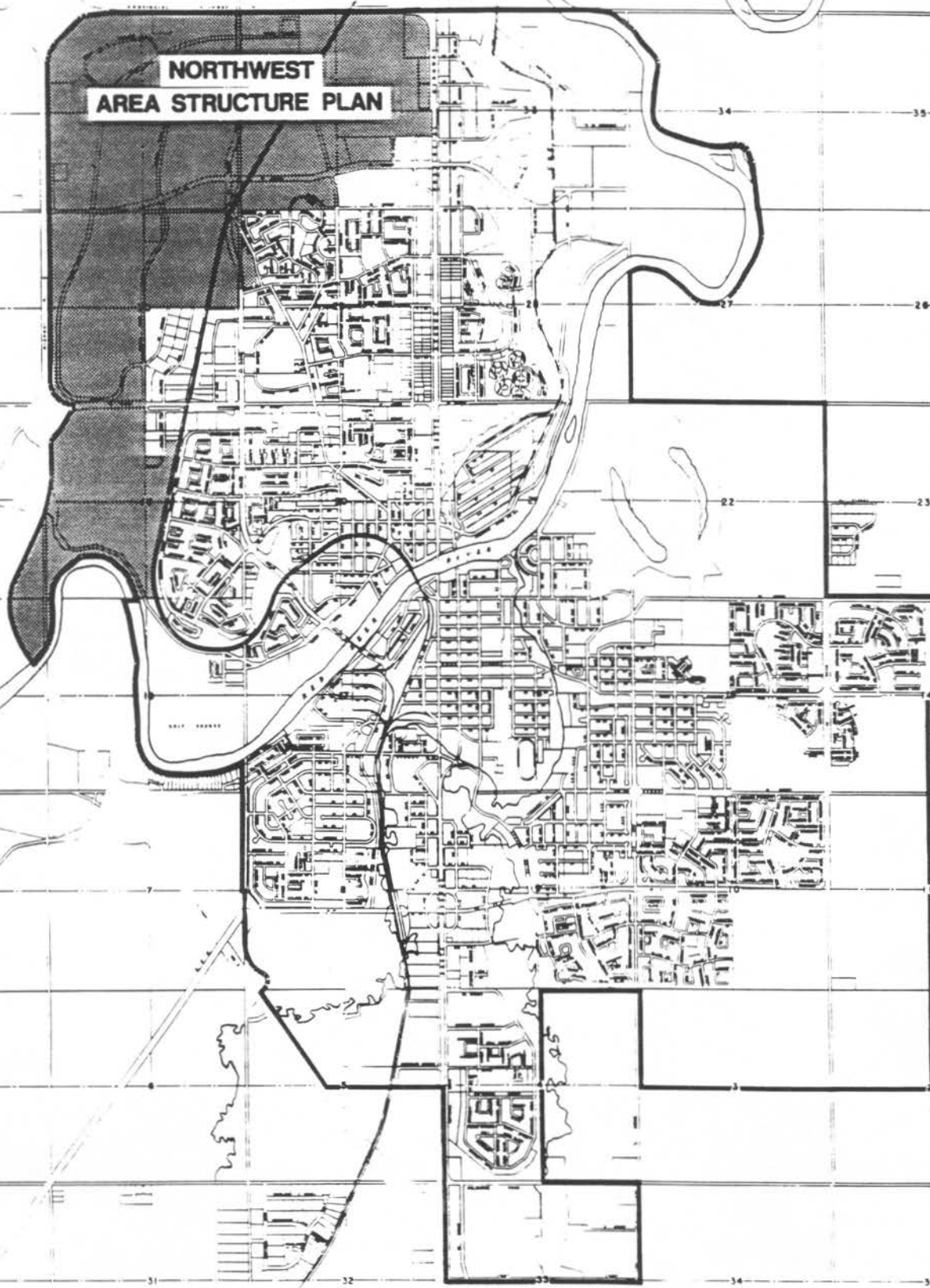
As can be surmised by the plan's title, the plan area covers the northwest portion of the City of Red Deer. Map 1 locates the plan area with respect to the total City. The boundaries of the Area Structure Plan area are more clearly defined on Maps 2 through 9.

PLANNING FRAMEWORK

The Northwest Area Structure Plan falls within a framework of plans and bylaws, provided by the Planning Act, to guide municipalities in planning for their future.

Red Deer Regional Plan

The Red Deer Regional Plan was ratified by the Minister of Municipal Affairs on May 9, 1986. The purpose of the plan is to guide municipalities in the management of local land use planning. The Regional Plan provides broad policy guidelines and gives sufficient flexibility to municipalities to reflect their local wishes and needs. All statutory plans and land use bylaws must conform to the Regional Plan.

General Municipal Plan

The Planning Act requires all incorporated urban municipalities with a population of 1,000 or more to prepare a general municipal plan (GMP). The purpose of this plan is to describe the land uses proposed and the manner of future development in a municipality. A general municipal plan also is to designate or describe areas where more detailed development or redevelopment plans are desirable.

The Red Deer General Municipal Plan was adopted by the City Council on March 31, 1980 under Bylaw 2663/80. In the GMP one of the areas that was recommended for an area structure plan is in the northwest sector of the City.

Land Use Bylaw

It is mandatory for municipalities with a population of 1,000 or more to adopt a land use bylaw, which generally divides a municipality into districts and regulates the use of land and development. The land use bylaw implements the policies and objectives outlined in the General Municipal Plan and any area structure plan. The current Red Deer Land Use Bylaw was adopted by City Council on August 18, 1980 under Bylaw 2672/80.

Area Structure Plan

An area structure plan is intended to provide a more detailed plan for the future development of an area of a municipality. The plan is expected to describe the land use, sequence of development, road patterns, population density, provision of public utilities and other necessary matters. An area structure plan provides useful guidelines for a developer in proposing detailed subdivision plans for development in the area.

EXISTING SITUATION

The City's General Municipal Plan, adopted by City Council in 1980, indicated that two areas were designated for the preparation of area structure plans, one on the south side of the City and the second in the northwest. With regards to the latter, for implementation the area was divided into two sectors;

- (a) north of 67th Street known as the northwest sector, and
- (b) south of 67th Street known as section 19.

Area North of 67th Street

On September 15, 1980, City Council adopted the Northwest Sector Area Structure Plan under Bylaw No. 2687/80. An amendment to the Northwest Sector Area Structure Plan was adopted by City Council on March 30, 1981 under Bylaw No. 2689/A-81.

Area South of 67th Street

The Section 19 Area Structure Plan was adopted by City Council on October 27, 1980 under Bylaw No. 2695/80.

The Need For Revision

Since the adoption of the aforementioned plans in 1980, a number of changes have occurred in this particular area and the City. These include:

- o The City's population has increased by 14,575 persons to 55,947 persons, an increase of 35.2 percent since 1980.
- o During the same time, the population of the area north of the Red Deer River, including the plan area, has increased by 5,611 persons to a total population of 21,781 persons for an increase of 34.7 percent.

- o A number of developments have taken place in the northwest area. The **eastern portion of the** Glendale residential area has been **mostly** completed, including two schools and a recreation area. Also, the Kentwood neighborhood has started north of 77th Street. A number of industrial parcels are being developed in the Edgar industrial area.
- o The design and financing of railway relocation is being finalized as part of the Major Corridor Study. It is presently under construction and the project is expected to be completed by 1993. The relocation of the rail line will permit the logical extension of residential areas and their separation from industrial districts.
- o Designs are being completed and funding is scheduled for the development of the Maskepetoon Athletic Park.

NORTHWEST AREA STRUCTURE PLAN

This new plan combines the area north of 67th Street with the area south of 67th Street and will be known as "Northwest Area Structure Plan."

The Goal

The goal of the Northwest Area Structure Plan is to accommodate orderly urban development and expansion, based upon the economical provision of municipal infrastructure, so that the resultant home and work place environs are conducive to safe and healthy living.

Objectives

The Plan desires to achieve the following objectives:

- (a) to provide for orderly, compatible and economical land uses and development,
- (b) to provide for the economical and efficient extension of utility services,

- (c) to provide for a hierarchy of roads for the effective and safe separation and movement of traffic,
- (d) to provide for open space and public facilities, and
- (e) to retain the natural characteristics of Maskepetoon Park.

The plan area is shown on Map 2. It has an area of 795 hectares or approximately 12.5 quarter sections of land. The area is bounded by Highway 11A on the north and Highway 2 to the west. On the east and south it borders existing highway commercial, residential and industrial areas.

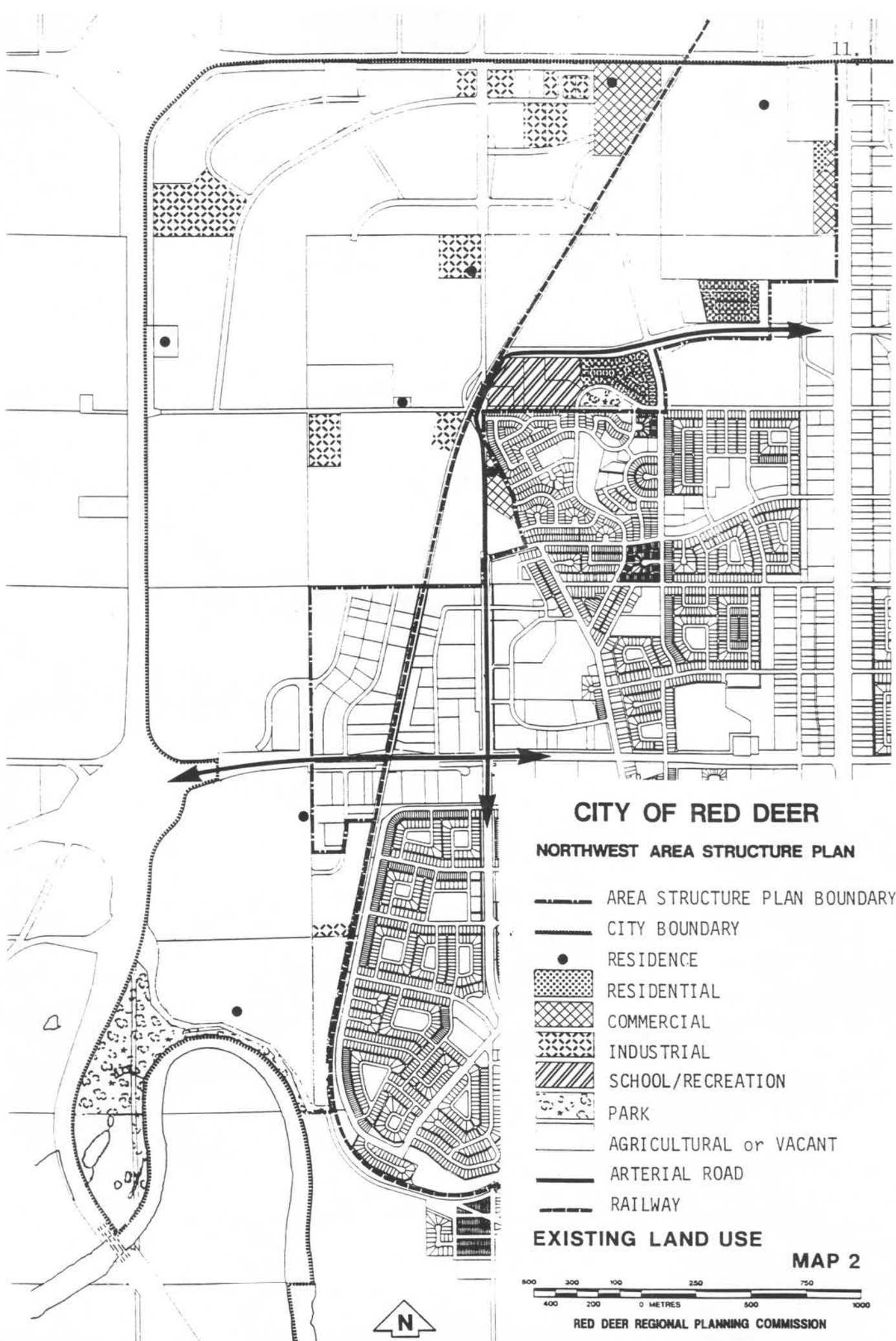
Existing land uses primarily include farmland, some residences and industrial lands - both vacant and developed. It also includes a number of treed areas (see Map 2).

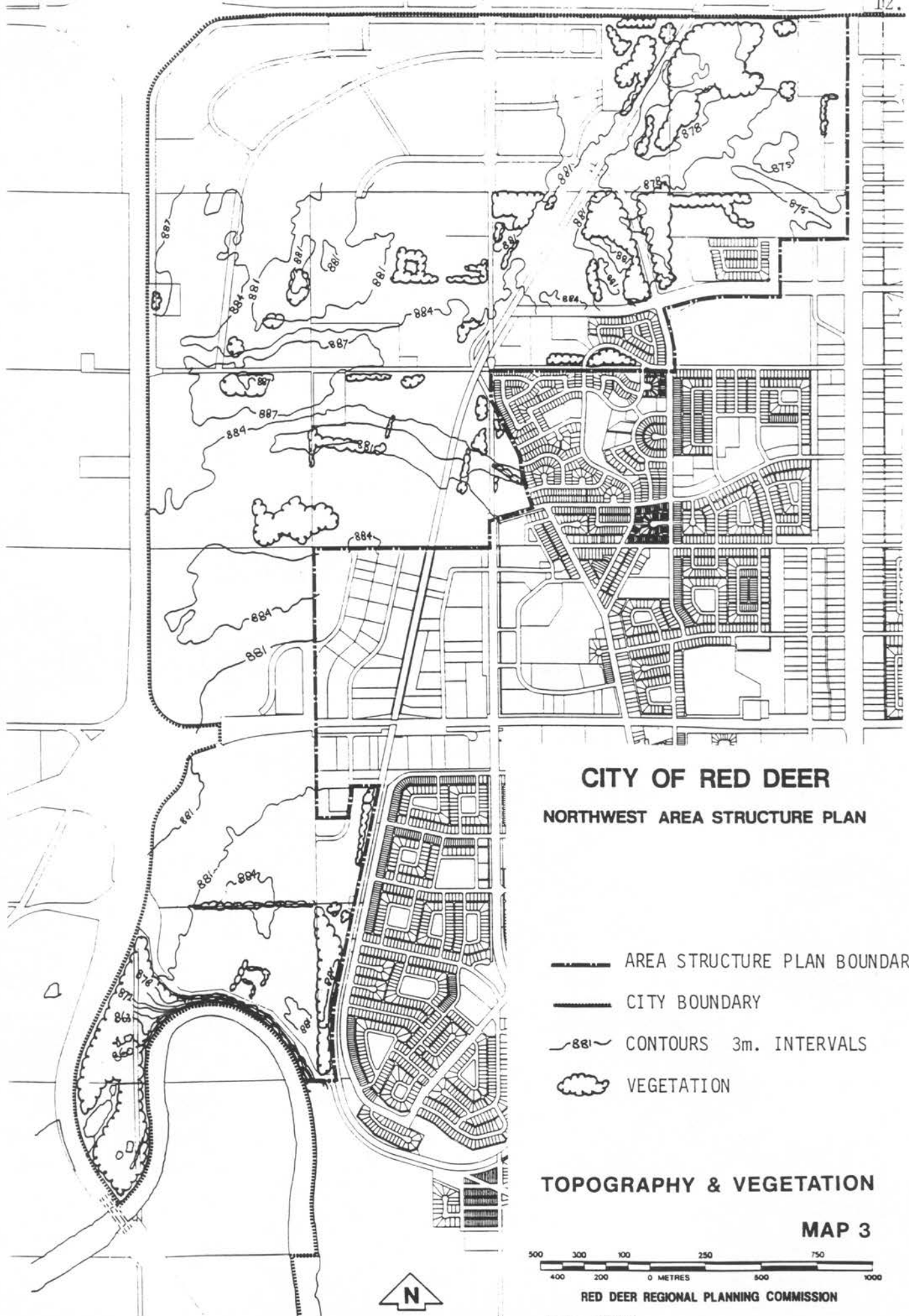
Physical Characteristics

Map 3 provides an overview of the physical characteristics of the area, which is generally flat, rising gradually towards the boundary of Sections 30 and 31 north of the Golden West Industrial Subdivision. The northwest part of the area has been subject to road construction and development. The areas which have been used primarily for agricultural purposes have little vegetation left. The majority of the remaining tree cover is located in the northeast and southwest, especially near Highway 2 and the Red Deer River. The trees are mostly poplar, except for the Maskepetoon ecosystem which contains transitional, mixed woods including poplar and white spruce, as well as sensitive stands of tamarack and wetland vegetation.

Land Ownership

Land ownership in the study area is as follows:





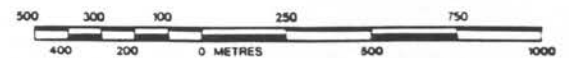

Of the 795 hectares, approximately 74 hectares are currently developed. Map 4 shows the distribution of private and public lands.

Utility Services

Major utility lines which need to be considered in the planning and development of the northwest sector are shown on Map 5. Future plans and development will serve to protect these utilities from undesirable encroachment.

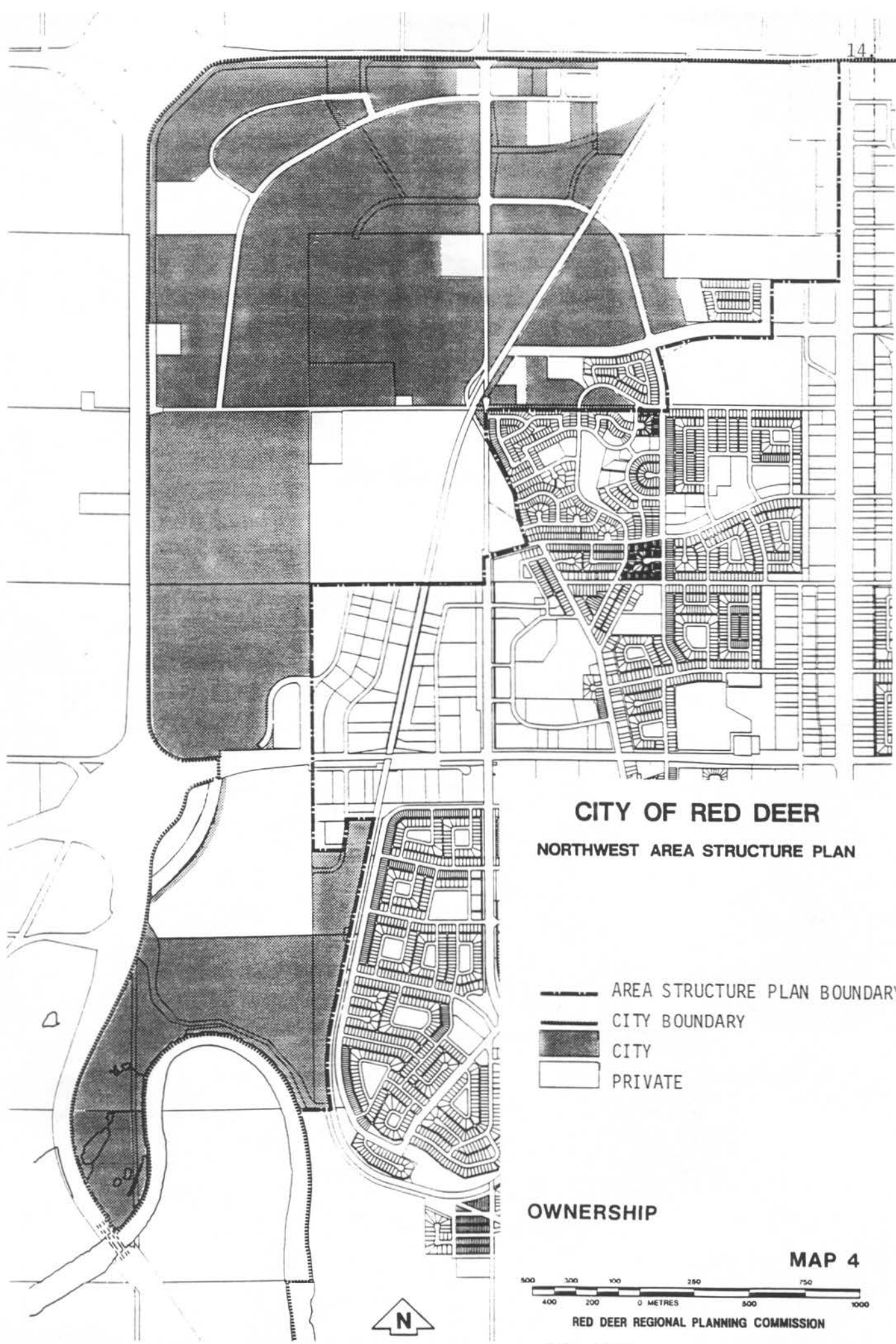
The area can be serviced with natural gas, telephone and cable television. Municipal power and water services can be extended from adjacent areas to serve lands in the plan area as they are developed.

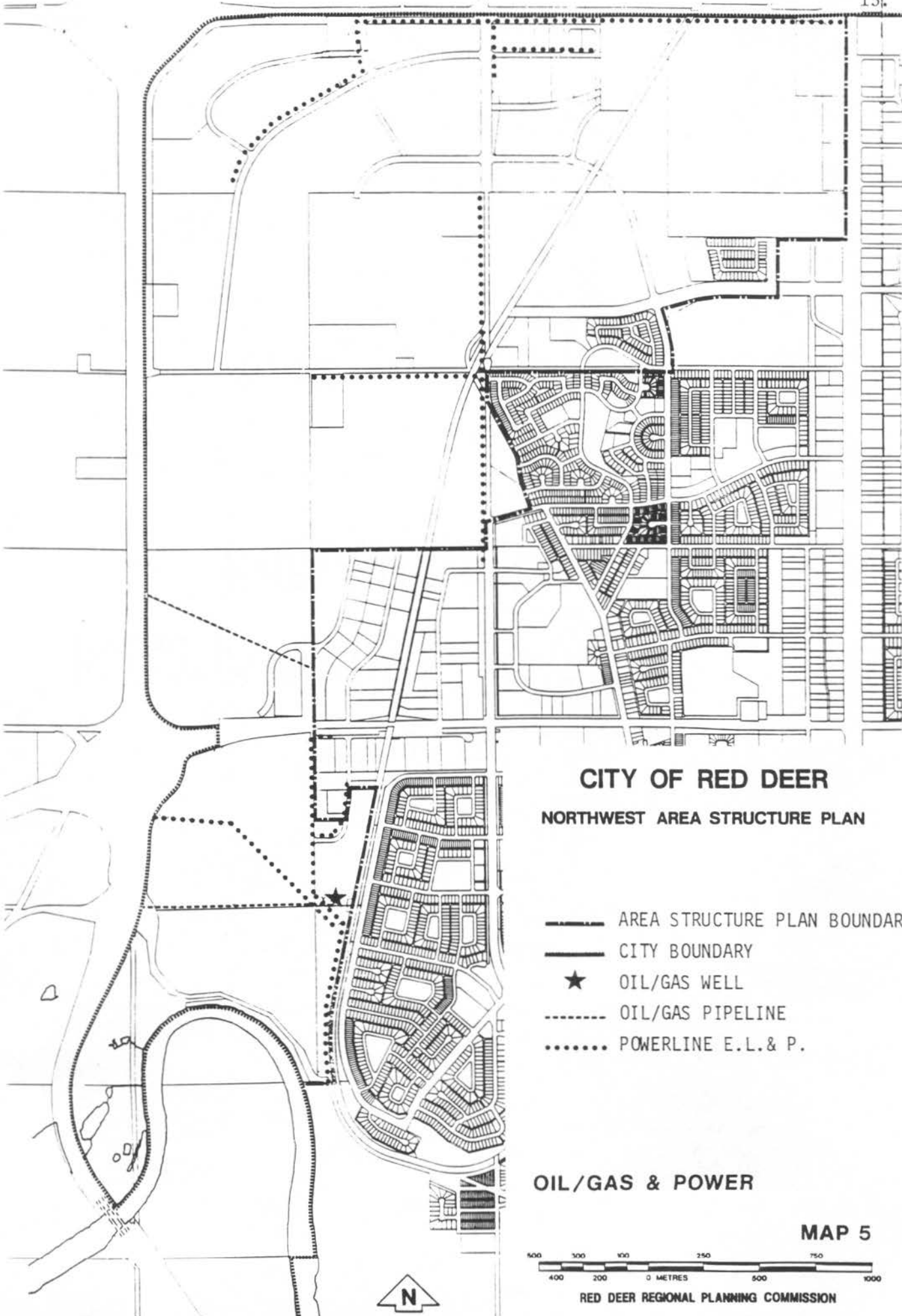
With regard to stormwater, the plan area is generally divided into two basins - the area north of 76th Street up to Highway 11A and the area south of 76th Street (see Map 6). The northern area has two catchment systems which will drain easterly into the existing system at 77th Street and Gaetz Avenue. The southern basin also has two catchment systems, but requires a new trunk line to drain southward into the Red Deer River. There are a number of stormwater **detention** ponds planned for this area as shown on Map 6.

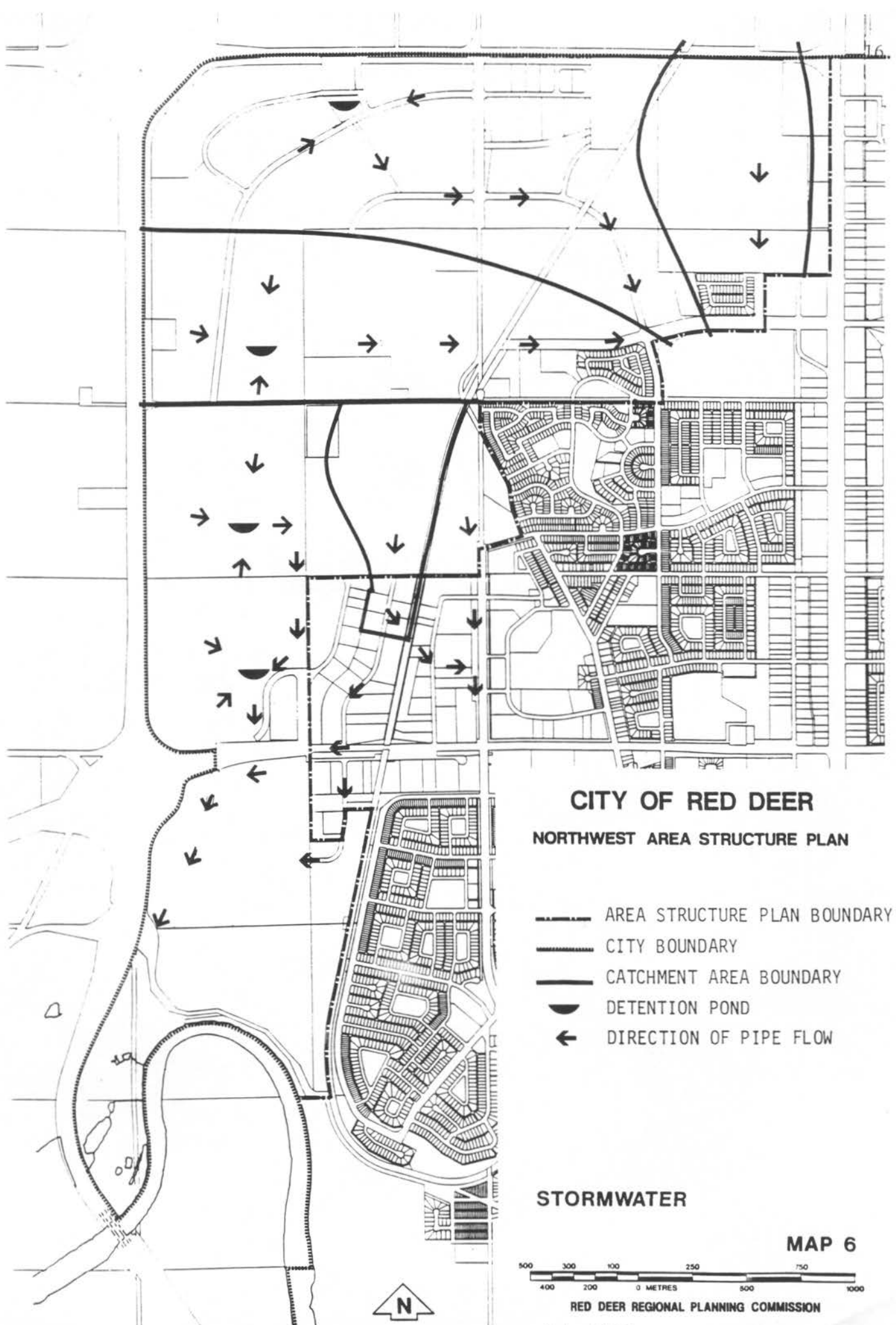
Similar catchment basins are planned for the sanitary sewer system based on gravity flows (see Map 7). The existing sanitary trunk at 77th Street and Kennedy Drive will be extended west to serve the north basin. The south basin trunk will be extended to the areas north and south of 67th Street using the existing trunk at 67th Street and 67th Avenue.

Transportation

The transportation system in the Northwest Area Structure Plan will be

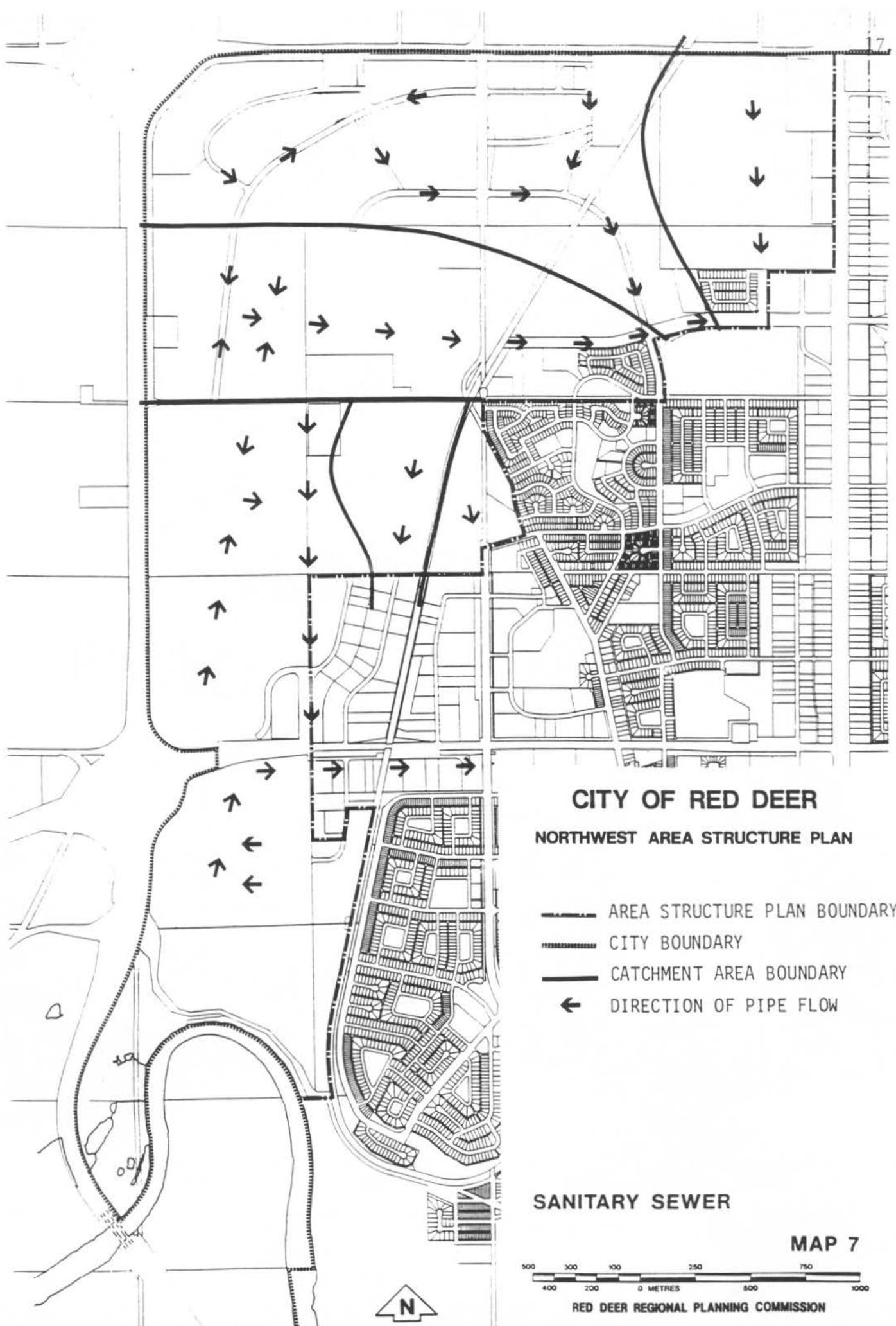

very much affected and guided by the major continuous corridor project, which in March of 1988 was approved by the Alberta government. This project, as it impacts on the northwest portion of the City, entails the relocation of the downtown railyards and station to the northwest quadrant together with the realignment of the Canadian Pacific rail line to the western margins of the City. Map 8 shows the location of the new railyards and alignment of the rail line. The project is expected to be completed by 1993 and will provide the following benefits:

- o The City will be able to further its roadway system, especially in the downtown area, and complete the major continuous corridor being a major arterial route from the southern limits of the City northward to Ross Street along the former rail alignment, and then back to Highway 2 via Taylor Drive, 64th Avenue and 67th Street.
- o Canadian Pacific (CP) will have new and more efficient yards and station.
- o The former railyard will provide a location for major development to aid in downtown revitalization.
- o It will enable the City to accommodate a more compatible pattern of land uses for the northwest part of the City.
- o The removal of the railway tracks from the residential area will add to the area's amenity and remove physical barriers between neighborhoods.
- o It removes a number of rail level crossings and the need for new bridges or overpasses.
- o It enables the potential future use of portions of the abandoned rail right-of way as a pedestrian/bicycle trail.

Road System

The road network will consist of a series of arterials, collectors and local roads. For the purposes of this plan, arterial roads are the most significant and are generally established in accordance with the City's road studies, primarily the City of Red Deer Transportation Study (update) adopted by Council in April of 1982. As shown on Map 8, the

perimeter of the plan area is Highways 2, 11A, 11 (67 Street) and Gaetz Avenue. 64 Avenue and the 77 Street - 67 Avenue - Kerry Wood Drive connection form the arterial roads. The Edgar industrial area will be serviced by a main industrial collector road (Edgar Drive). Where desirable and possible, noise attenuation measures will be considered as these roads are developed.

Land Uses

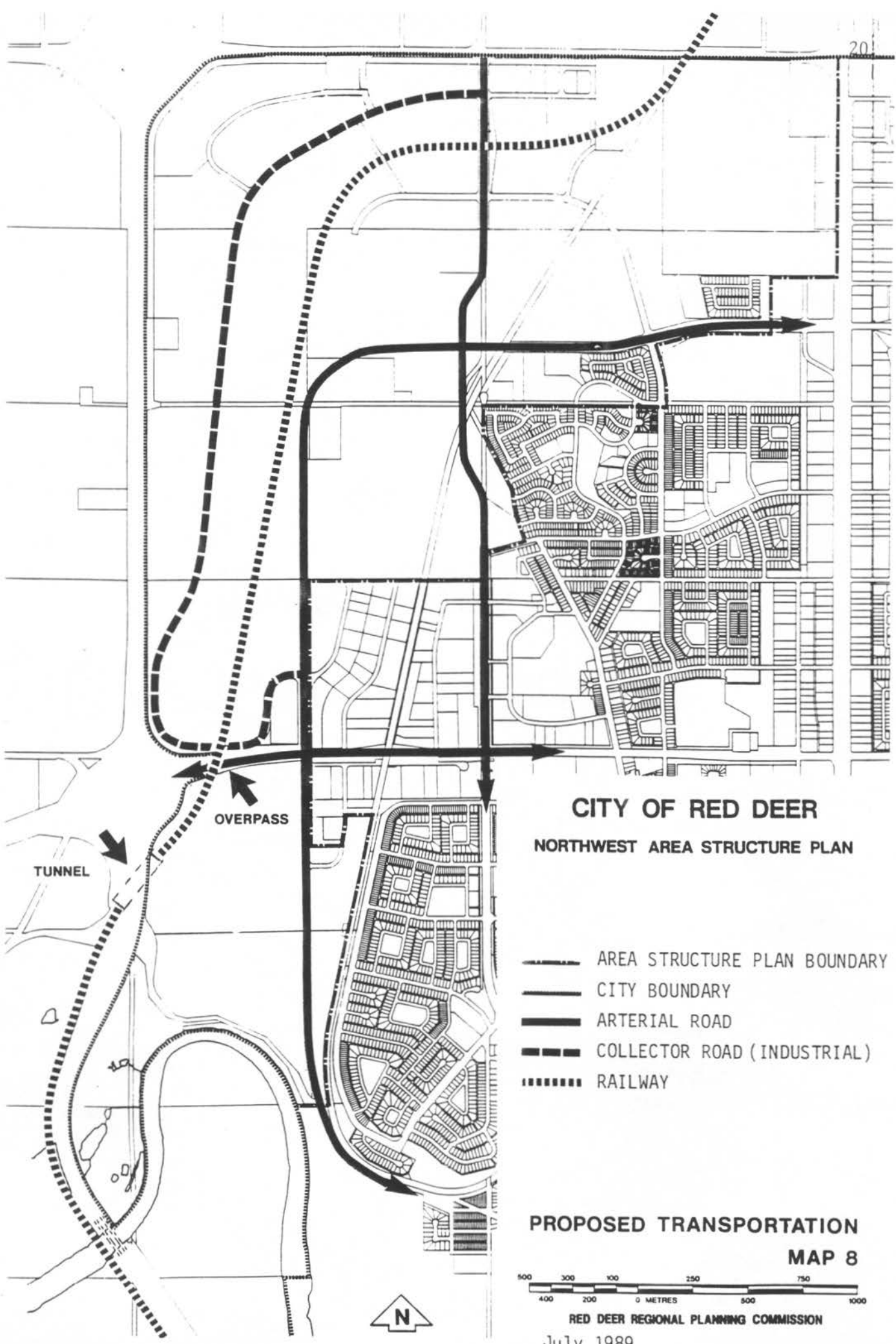
An essential component of an area structure plan is the proposed land use pattern. For the Northwest Area Structure Plan this is reflected on Map 9. This map serves as a general guide for the allocation of land uses and the location of important roads; however, boundaries and alignments are not necessarily final and may be altered in succeeding planning and development stages.

Residential

The Northwest Area Structure Plan provides for **two major** residential areas, **being the Kentwood and Glendale neighborhoods**. The total area designated for residential use in the Plan is 296 hectares, including 26 hectares for neighbourhood centres, pathways and small parks. Of this, approximately 150 hectares of residential land is made available through railway relocation.

Utility servicing will be based on 50 persons per hectare, but because of the recent trend towards more single family housing and the general poor response by the public toward small lots, the expected population density is around 43 persons per hectare. Consequently, the anticipated population for the Northwest Area Structure Plan is 12,700. The 1989 population of this area was **approximately 285**.

The density of 43 persons per hectare will permit a variety of housing types ranging from single family through townhouses and apartments. The distribution of housing types will be determined as detailed subdivision



plans are developed in the future. All of the residential areas will be separated from the rail line by a berm, which will also be fenced. This will serve to promote aesthetic, noise attenuation and safety measures.

Open Space and School Facilities

The Red Deer Recreation, Parks and Culture Master Plan adopted by the City in 1986 sets the standards required for each type of facility; they are neighborhood, district and city level recreational areas.

City Level Facilities

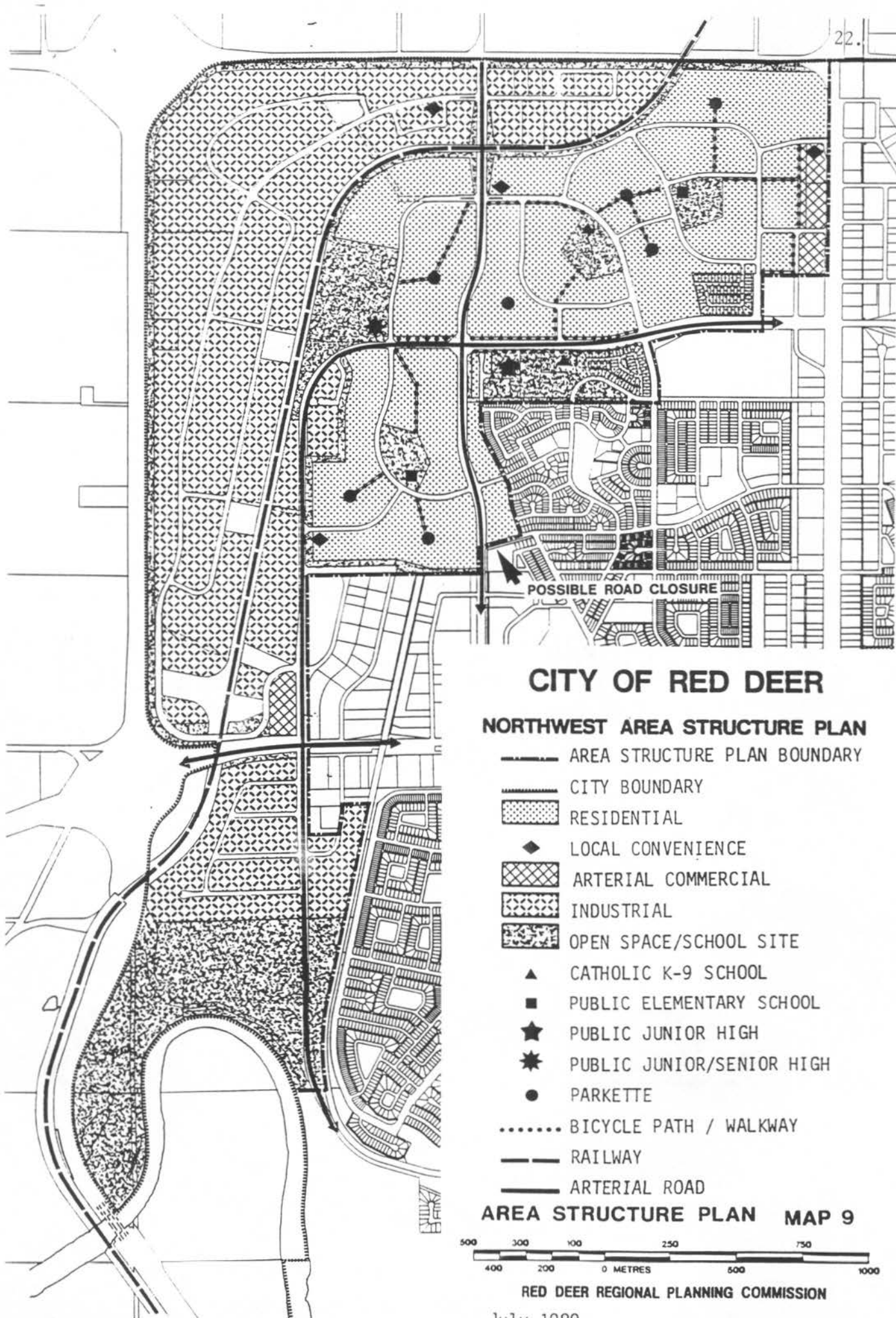
The City is planning to develop a large athletic park in the S.W.1/4 19 located north of the Red Deer River and west of the Oriole Park subdivision. The development of this park, known as Maskepetoon Athletic Park, is projected to be completed in five years time and likely will consist of approximately ten ball diamonds, three soccer fields and a large multi-use area. These athletic facilities will greatly add to the diversity of the recreation features in this area since the existing Maskepetoon Park will be conserved as a natural area.

District Level

A district centre provides recreation/school facilities for a number of neighborhoods. It is intended that the district centre be comprised of a senior or junior high school, a district library, an indoor swimming pool, an ice arena and outdoor sports facilities including tennis courts, ball diamonds and all purpose fields. These facilities are subject to joint use agreements between the City and School Boards, and therefore are used co-operatively for City recreation and school education programs. It is anticipated that the associated buildings will be located on the southeast corner of the site.

Neighborhood Level

Four neighborhood centres are planned for the area, each expected to



serve a population of 3,200 people. Each centre is planned to have either an elementary public school or kindergarten to grade nine (K-9) separate school, as well as a community shelter, playground and sports fields as outlined in the Recreation Parks and Culture Master Plan.

The neighborhood centres wherever possible are expected to be linked to each other by a pedestrian/bicycle path. A series of parkettes or small parks are planned for use by pre-school children, as well as to provide a visual attraction for the surrounding area. Wherever possible, municipal reserves will be located to conserve natural treed areas.

For the Northwest Area Structure Plan area, open spaces for recreation and education facilities are expected to be provided for by means of reserve dedication through the provisions of the Planning Act, with the exception of the Maskepetoon Athletic Area and Park and perhaps a small area south of 67 Street. The Maskepetoon lands have been acquired by the City through the Waskasoo Urban Park and railway relocation projects.

Commercial

A district shopping centre, known as Heritage Business Park, is being developed along 67th Street, just to the southeast of the plan area. It will serve the northwest quadrant of the City, together with five local convenience sites one of which is the Glendale site just outside the plan area. Highway commercial uses are planned for the area north of 77th Street adjacent to Gaetz Avenue, and will include a convenience store presently in operation.

Industrial

Lands to the west of the proposed new railway right-of-way plus the quarter immediately southeast of the Highway 2 - 67th Street interchange has been allocated for industrial uses. A number of industries have

already been established, mainly east of 64th Avenue and south of Highway 11A. A total of 369 hectares of land is set aside in the plan for light industrial uses and the rail yards and line. The new railway line will offer access to rail trackage for industries wishing to use rail facilities.

The new railway right-of-way including the yards occupy about 34.3 hectares of land. In the north part, the railway will act as a separation between the industrial and proposed residential areas. To reduce the noise effect of the railway, and to promote aesthetics a berm is to be created between the new railway right-of-way and the residential area.

Industrial development in the area of existing oil well likely will be in the long term and therefore should allow for the phasing out of the oil well.

Phasing

Residential development has started in the area north of 77th Street and west of the Gaetz Avenue commercial areas. This area, which is known as Kentwood, will be gradually expanded towards the north and west. The **western portion** of Glendale can be developed concurrently with the Kentwood area since they are in different utility servicing areas. Industrial development to date has focused in the area to the east of 64th Avenue and south of Highway 11A. The primary direction of industrial development will be west and south to 76th Street. Industrial development could also expand in the area west of Golden West, north and south of 67th Street once new storm drainage south to the Red Deer River is in place.

IMPLEMENTATION AND AMENDMENT

The Northwest Area Structure Plan will primarily be implemented through the land use control mechanisms provided by the Land Use Bylaw. However, further clarity and more detailed land use patterns will be established by Council on recommended approval of subdivision plans for various

portions of the plan area. The subdivision of land process will be guided by this Area Structure Plan and provide for the distribution of land uses, as well as the establishment of open spaces through the provision of reserve lands. In this regard, it is to be noted that the location and boundaries of land uses shown on Figure 9 are generalized and therefore subject to final determination during the subdivision process.

This plan may be amended by City Council by bylaw in accordance with the provisions of the Planning Act.

Commissioners' Comments

We would recommend Council pass a resolution to amend Bylaw 2979/89, Northwest Area Structure Plan, based on the revised Schedule A submitted by the Planning Commission, then proceed with 2nd and 3rd reading of said bylaw. The revised Schedule "A" is attached for Council's consideration.



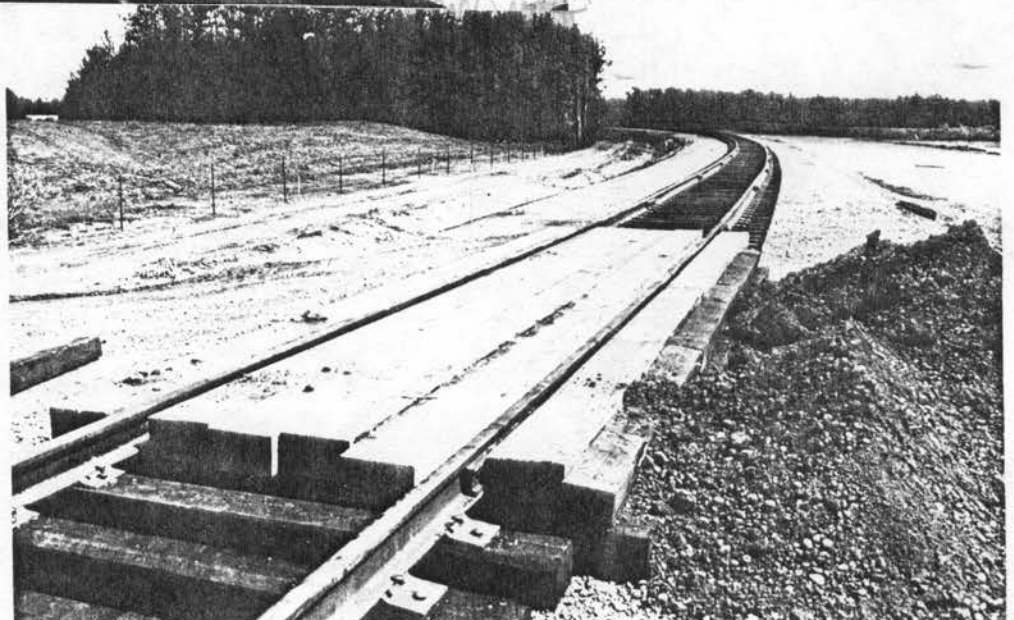
A rail crossing HAS BEEN BUILT at the southwest corner of the Slemko land giving access to their land that was expropriated south of the rail-right-of-way.

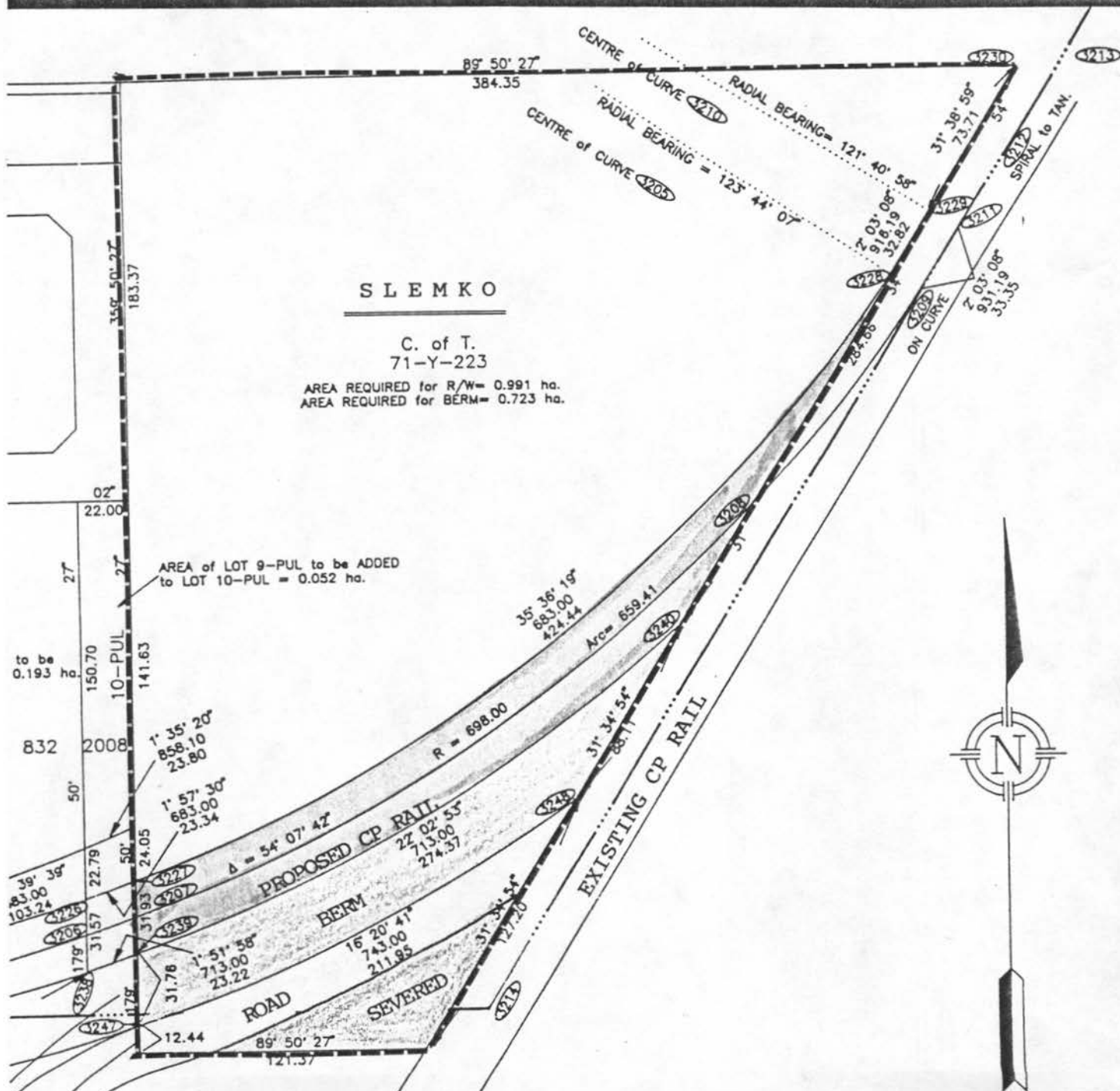

At the Council meeting of July 10, 1989, consideration was given to your report dated June 30, 1989 concerning the above topic, and at which meeting the following resolution was passed.



For approximately 5 days a week 8 hours a day, 44 St. on 51st Ave. just north of the hospital is being used as a parking lot. Most of them are hospital employees who park here and walk across to the hospital, the others park their vehicles in front of our homes and walk to the 5010 Centre on 43 St.

This has created both hazard and inconvenience for the families on our street. They park on both sides of the street, which makes it impossible for vehicles to pass each other because the street is too narrow. There are little children on this street that cross back and forth to play with each other. That's the hazard. A child is going to come out between the parked cars. I don't want to witness a child being hurt or killed by oncoming cars.

I personally witnessed a vehicle come to a sudden stop when two children came out from between parked cars, to cross the street.

Inconvenience. I am a handicapped person and have to use the Citizen Action Bus. They should be able to pull up to the sidewalk to pick me up, instead of in the middle of the road. My friends are also put into this position, when they come to visit or pick me up, or to help me.

This parking on 44 St. has started since the R.D.R.H. has changed their parking lot from meters to toll booth.

I strongly feel that something could be done to assist with this predicament. The Hospital employees choose to inconvenience my neighbours and myself by parking for free on our street.

I would appreciate it if the Parking Commission would look into this matter. I hope to hear from you soon.

Mrs. Riley is concerned about the employees occupying all the parking space in the residential area north of the hospital. A petition raising similar concerns has been submitted to City Council. That petition requests that the area be marked "Residential Parking Only".

There is a parking lot south of the hospital available for daily and monthly parking which tends to be, at best, half full. Apparently the employees prefer to park free along the streets instead of paying 50 cents per day in the parking lot.

If the parking lot were fully used it would not remove all the cars from the streets but it would certainly help.

Our recommendation is for the Parking Commission or the City Administration to meet with the Red Deer Regional Hospital Administration to explore the extent of the problem and possible solutions.

City Council may provide direction on this matter at their May 15th meeting.

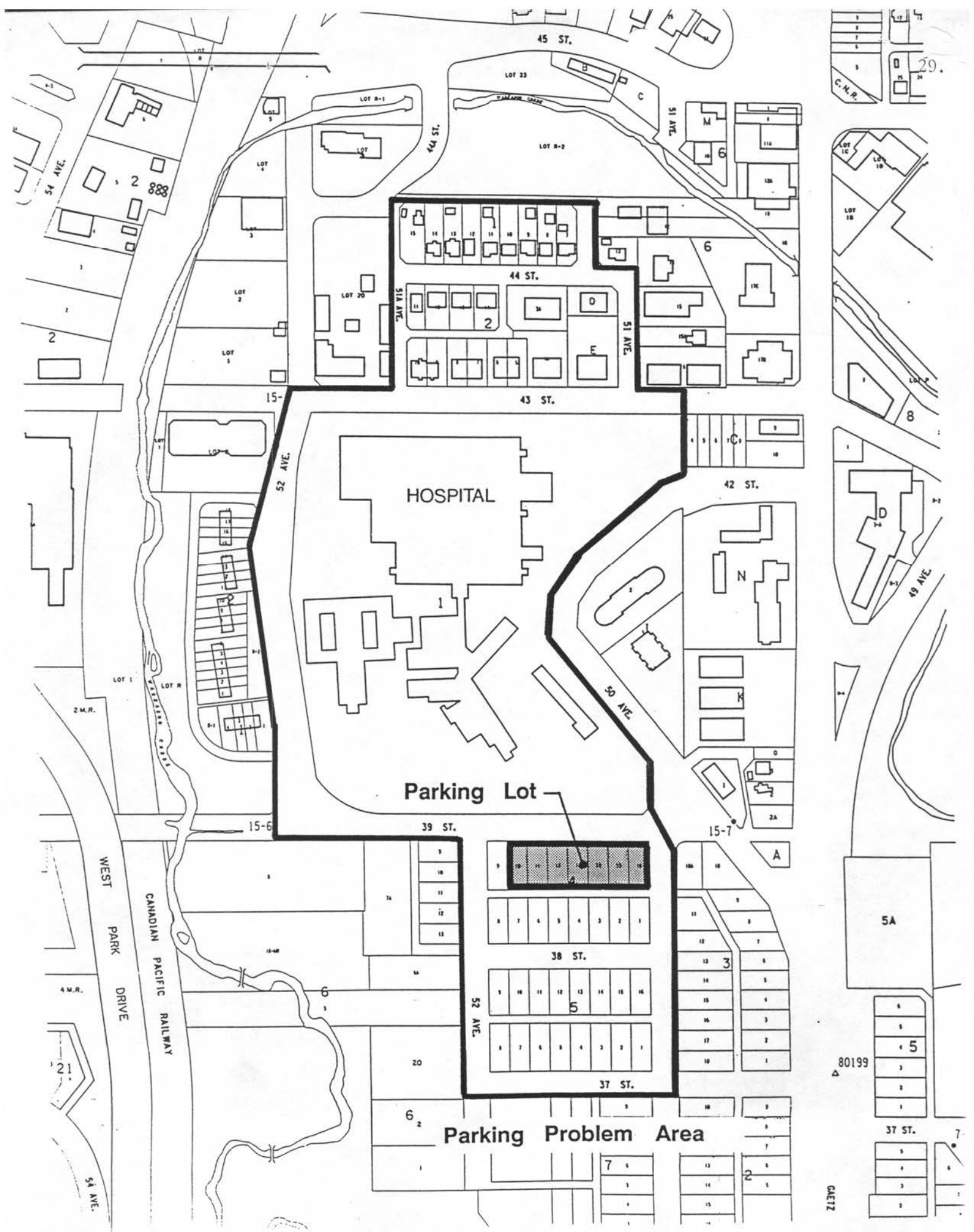

In response to the above, the request is similar to that made by other City residential property owners who find that nearby commercial uses are infringing into the on-street parking near their homes.

A method of dealing with these situations is to institute a permit system where only those persons who have a permit can park in areas that have been signed with that restriction. There are inconveniences to the system, such as:

1. How to deal with visitor parking, and
2. Who is entitled to a parking permit; renters or owners?

The implementation of such a system in one area means that we will likely receive similar requests which, because of the need for enforcement, will require additional staff.

We trust this is the information required.



This is in response to Caroline Riley's letter of April 20, 1989. Her letter reiterates the common complaint from residents in the area, "Employees of the Hospital and 5010 Centre park on our streets leaving no space for ourselves or our guests. Parking has made the roadway hazardous for vehicle use and resident children".

Recently, the City received a petition requesting the implementation of residential parking zones in the area. However, the Engineering Department is concerned that implementation of residential zones or no parking zones would only displace the problem to neighbouring roadways.

The Engineering Department recommends a comprehensive review of this area, prior to further remedial action being taken.

Re: Petition - Residential Parking Only, 44 Street, 51 and 51A Avenues

The petitioners are concerned about the impact of hospital and 5010 Building employees parking along residential streets to the north of the hospital. Similar concerns have been raised previously to the Parking Commission by both residents and business owners in the 5010 building who are concerned that employees are occupying customer parking spaces.

Recently the Parking Commission agreed to install additional 2 hour meters along part of 43 Street between 51 and 51A Avenues. Possibly this has moved more employee vehicles onto 44 Street.

A site inspection confirmed that vehicles are parked along residential streets for two blocks both north and south of the hospital. There is a parking lot operated by Empire Parking covering nearly on-half of the block immediately south of the hospital which was approximately half occupied. The rates for daily parking are 50 cents or \$10.00/month. That appears to be very reasonable but obviously the employees prefer free parking.

The Bylaws and Engineering Departments have been very reluctant to recommend any form of restricted residential parking in the City because of the difficulties of enforcement. Without some form of parking permit, it is questionable whether a sign indicating "Residential Parking Only" would be effective.

Similar concerns were raised just over a year ago regarding parking in the residential areas around the Park Plaza Theatre. That particular problem was occurring during the evening hours when most residents would be home and visitor parking was nearly impossible. The solution to that problem was for the Park Plaza Theatre to negotiate a shared parking arrangement with the adjacent Public School Board. This has helped alleviate the situation.

This problem primarily involves the hospital and it is recommended that as a first step towards exploring solutions, the City Administration or the Parking Commission arrange a meeting with the Red Deer Regional Hospital Administration to discuss the matter.

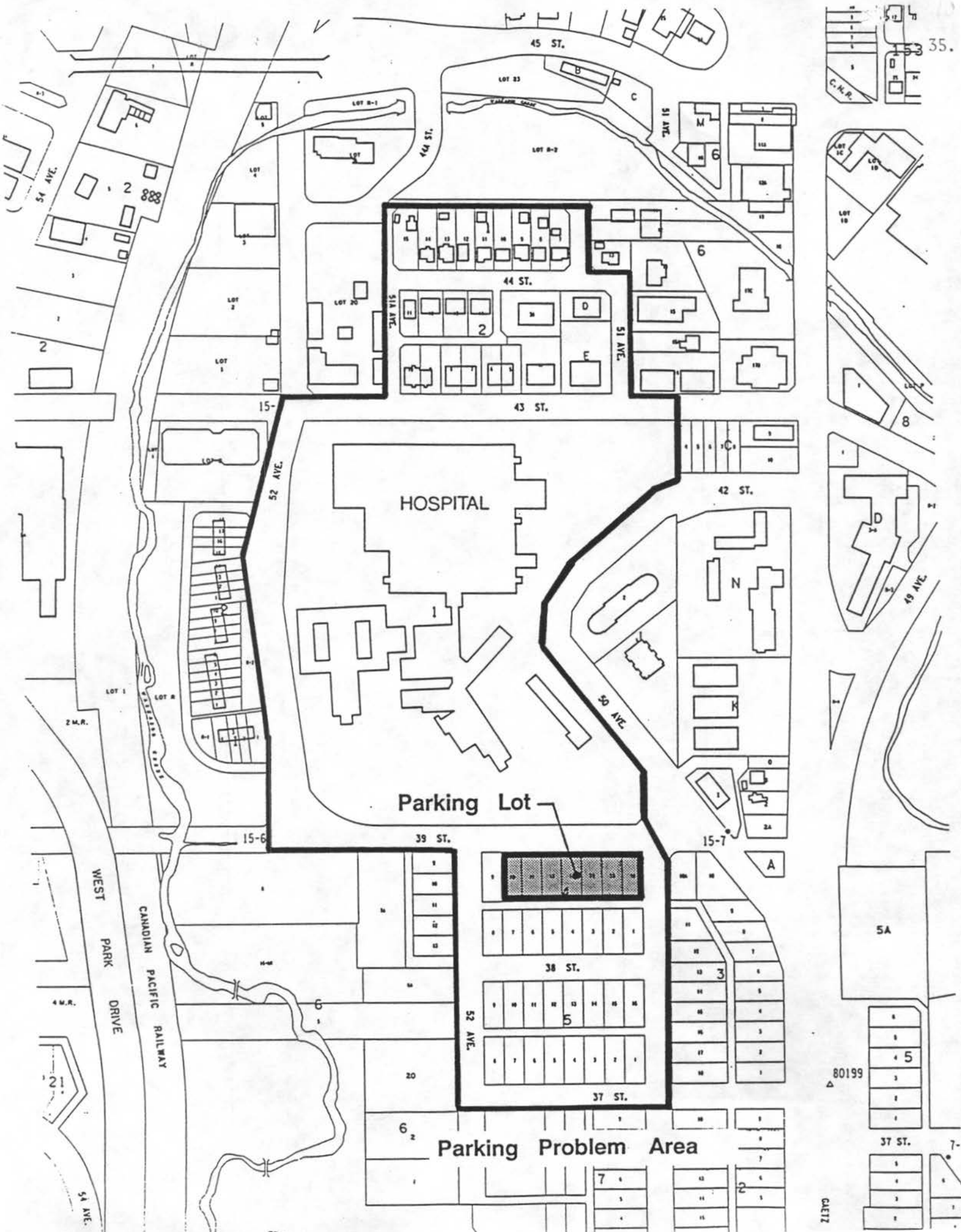


In response to your memo regarding the above, we have the following comments for Council's consideration.

The concern expressed in the above petition is similar to that brought forward by other property owners who are adjacent to commercial areas, such as the Plaza Theatre. In order to accomodate the resident's request, it would be necessary to set in place a permit system that would allow only residents the ability to park in the area. Signage of the area and patrolling would be required. A decision on who could obtain a permit and verification that applicants meet the necessary criteria would have to be in place prior to such a system being implemented. This type of permit would not allow for guest parking on the street, which would not solve part of the problem mentioned in the petition.

To effectively patrol this area, it would appear only the normal business hours would need to be covered. However, other districts would require additional hours of coverage.

We trust this is the information required.

This area has a long history of parking related concerns, and the City has implemented several changes in the vicinity as outlined chronologically below:

1. November 1964 - The Commissioner's office approved the removal of no parking signs from the south side of 43 Street, between Gaetz Avenue to the CP Rail right of way.
2. August 1973 - Implementation of a no parking zone on the north side of 43 Street, from Gaetz Avenue to 51 Avenue, as per Council resolution.
3. October 1977 - Request for private parking zone in front of 5013-43 Street. Not supported by the Traffic Advisory Committee.
4. July 1978 - The City Commissioner's office designated a no parking zone on the north side, from 5118-43 Street to 51 A Avenue, and on the south side, from 51 A Avenue to 51 Avenue to discourage parking by Hospital construction workers.
5. October 1979 - Item 4 was repealed by the Commissioner's office once the Hospital construction was completed.
6. August 1981 - The Hospital asked for a no parking zone 7.6 m both sides of the underground driveway. This was approved by the Traffic Advisory Committee.
7. September 1981 - Centre 5010 requested parking meters for clients. The Commissioner's office approved the installation of two hour meters on both sides of 43 Street, between Gaetz Avenue and 51 Avenue.
8. October 1981 - A request was received for a no parking zone on 51 A Avenue to prevent parking within the intersection. This request was forwarded to the By-laws Department for enforcement.

9. April 1984 - Centre 5010 asked the City to convert the first metered stall to a passenger loading zone. This was approved by the Parking Commission.
10. May 1984 - Alderman T. Connelly requested parking removal on one side of 51 A Avenue, between 43 Street and 44 Street. This was not supported by the Traffic Advisory Committee.
11. June 1985 - A request was received for parking removal on the south side of 43 Street, in the vicinity of the Hospital underground exit driveway. The no parking zone was increased by an additional 6 m east and west of the driveway. Recommended by the Engineering Department and approved by the Commissioner's office.
12. August 1985 - Relocation of Transit Route 1 bus stops, from 43 Street between 52 Avenue and 51 A Avenue, per Council resolution. Completed October 1985.
13. November 1985 - Request to accommodate a driveway access to the Dairy Queen site, supported by the Engineering Department and approved by the Commissioner's office. Two metered spaces were eliminated.
14. June 1986 - The Parking Commission approved the installation of 4 two hour parking meters on the west side of Gaetz Avenue in front of the 5010 Centre.
15. July 1986 - The By-laws Department requested that parking signs be installed on the south side of 43 Street, east of 52 Avenue, to prohibit parking at the intersection. Approved by the Commissioner's office.
16. September 1986 - The Parking Commission approved 7 two hour meters for the west side of Gaetz Avenue. Gaetz Avenue is now uniformly metered from 43 Street to 45 Street.
17. September 1986 - A public request was received to remove the parking from one side of 51 Avenue, between 43 Street and 44 Street. No action was taken.
18. November 1986 - Centre 5010 asked for increased parking enforcement. This request was approved by the Parking Commission.
19. May 1988 - The Parking Commission approved the installation of an additional meter on 50 Avenue, between the 5010 Centre and J.D. Calhouns, filling an unused driveway access.

20. March 1989 - Centre 5010 requested additional parking meters be installed on 43 Street, between 51 Avenue and 51 A Avenue, since employee parking eliminated parking for clients. The Parking Commission approved this request for the north and south side of 43 Street.

Despite this long history, the Engineering Department remains firmly against the use of residential parking zones on 44 Street, 51 Avenue, or 51 A Avenue for the following reasons:

Residential parking zones instituted on any of these block faces, may:

- a. Relocate the parking problems to the next block.
- b. Likely result in more vehicles circulating in the area searching for a parking space and hence, increased traffic noise causing more nuisance to the local residents.
- c. Likely generate more public dissatisfaction from both the motorist and residents.
- d. Require a higher level of enforcement and general administration.

Presently, there are several issues that must be evaluated regarding the implementation of residential parking zones.

- 1) How will these zones be enforced?
- 2) Will permits be issued to residents' vehicles not registered in the residents' name? (e.g. leased vehicles, company vehicles, dealer tags, temporary license plates, commercial tags).
- 3) What procedure will be adopted to accommodate
 - a) Extended parking by visitors, nurses, repairmen, home renovation workers, etc.?
 - b) Residents who have a garage sale, a special occasion with many guests, or an open house to sell their property?
- 4) Will additional permits be issued to residents who claim they have lost their permits?
- 5) Are residents permitted to lease or sell their resident and/or visitor permits to non-resident parkers?



- 6) Will the cost of administering the program be borne by the residents affected?
- 7) Is public interest being served if the program results in under utilization of curb parking on public roadways within the residential parking zone and acute parking shortage in the residential and commercial area immediately outside the zone boundaries?

The Building Inspection Department's survey of The City of Edmonton and The City of Calgary indicated that:

"... The establishment of limited residential parking zones is a complicated process which requires a great amount of planning and cooperation ... Both cities state that the zones are a "headache"..."

The implementation of residential parking zones is clearly an undesirable solution and may only relocate and/or create other problems. A similar request, from Caroline Riley of 5126-44 Street, is currently before the Parking Commission. The Engineering Department suggests this item be deferred to the Parking Commission for further study prior to any further remedial action.

At the June 20, 1989 meeting of the Finance & Audit Committee, consideration was given to the attached report from the Director of Financial Services dated May 26, 1989 re: Audit Committee. At the above noted meeting, the following resolution was passed.

"RESOLVED that the Finance & Audit Committee hereby recommend to Council of The City of Red Deer, as follows:

- 1) that portions of the Land Bank be the next area to be audited,
- 2) that the audit of the Land Bank not take place until 1990,
- 3) that a Land Bank Audit Task Force be established, as soon as possible after the 1989 general election, with said Committee to begin preliminary work on the setting of terms of reference for the audit.
- 4) that the selection of a consultant for the audit be considered in 1990.
- 5) that the \$25,000.00 budgeted in 1989 for an audit be carried over to 1990."

As Council will recall, an amount of \$25,000.00 was budgeted for 1989 to conduct an audit of a selected area of the City. The Finance & Audit Committee, as outlined in the above resolution, recommend that a portion of the Land Bank be the next area audited. It is also recommended that this audit not begin until 1990. The rationale for this postponement is due to the large number of projects currently on the go, i.e. Major Continuous Corridor, Southeast Service Basin Study, Agri-Trade Centre.

Many of the Departments involved in these projects would have to be involved with the Land Bank audit. For these Departments, taking on another project at this time would be very onerous. It is projected, however, that this audit can be accommodated in 1990.

Also, the Finance & Audit Committee feels that as two Council members would be appointed to the Audit Task Force, greater continuity throughout the entire audit process would be ensured if the Audit Task Force was formed after the General Election.

This is presented for Council's consideration.

As Council will recall, on June 23, 1986 a resolution was passed expanding the role of the Finance Committee to include terms of reference relative audits.

The Finance & Audit Committee's expanded role gives the Committee the responsibility of reviewing matters relative the external auditors, the internal auditor and task forces appointed by the Committee. In respect to these task forces, the Committee has the responsibility to:

- 1) initiate task forces to conduct value for money audits of specified City Departments.
- 2) Review task force reports, along with responses from Departments, and report on same to Council.

It is in respect to task forces which the Finance & Audit Committee is reporting to Council at this time.

For Council's information, the following is some background information relative to the functions of the audit and the task force.

The difference between the Finance & Audit Committee and the task force as noted is that the Committee is a standing Committee to look at the financial status of the City as a whole and the task force is ad hoc in nature formed to review a certain section or department of the City. The Finance & Audit Committee has the responsibility of establishing: 1) the areas to be audited; 2) structure of Task Force; 3) Terms of Reference. Upon recommendations from the Finance & Audit Committee, City Council must approve the budget for the audit. The basic goals of this task force are to not only determine that finances are properly managed, but also to review intangible operations. These intangibles could include the determination if resources are being used efficiently and effectively.

Once a task force is established and an area has been chosen, the Finance & Audit Committee, upon budget approval by Council, shall select a consultant who is qualified in the area of concern. From here, there are three phases the task force follows:

- 1) Planning phase - here it establishes what are the issues, as well as familiarizing itself with the area concerned.
- 2) Execution phase - at this point the task force will approach the Finance & Audit Committee to establish the scope and depth of the audit to be made.
- 3) Report writing - this is the formal findings of the task force and this part is very important to take into account views from all areas concerned including management's response to the findings.


Upon presentation of the report to the Finance & Audit Committee, which in turn will go to Council, it is important that a follow-up take place. In other words, has the section or department carried out recommendations of the report as approved by the Committee & Council.

It is important to emphasize that this process is not undertaken with the idea that we have problems in any department, its purpose is to ensure the citizens of Red Deer are indeed getting value for their tax dollar. Proper communication and information flows through all areas concerned is vital to ensure acceptance of the process through all levels.

The Finance & Audit Committee having reviewed the audit process and the role of the task force, have the following specific recommendations for Council's consideration.

a) Priority

It is the view of the Finance & Audit Committee that the following list be our priority for audits.

- 1) Fire Department
 - 2) Land Bank
 - 3) Public Works
 - 4) Civic Garage
 - 5) Parks, Recreation & Culture
 - 6) Financial Systems
 - 7) Bylaws & Inspections Department.
- 

b) Establishment of a Task Force

As indicated above, the Finance & Audit Committee recommends that the Fire Department be the first area to be analyzed through this process. In this regard, the following task force membership should be established:

Members

- 1) Two Aldermen (one of whom is the Chairman)
- 2) Two citizens (preferably people who are very knowledgeable in the fields of fire protection and ambulance services)
- 3) City Commissioner
- 4) Consultant (this person or firm should be one who has vast knowledge and experience in this field)

Resource People

- 1) Director of Finance
- 2) Fire Chief
- 3) Deputy Fire Chief - Ambulance
- 4) Internal Auditor

c) Terms of Reference

It is recommended by the Finance & Audit Committee that the following terms of reference be approved for said task force:

- 1) To analyze and assess whether operations are carried out with due regard for economy, efficiency and effectiveness.
- 2) To develop an opinion whether or not expenditures in the Fire Department (including ambulance and paramedic services) represent good value for money.
- 3) To identify opportunities for cost reductions and improvement of service where possible.

Some key aspects the task force will be directed to focus on are:

- 1) The appropriateness of Fire Department's deployment strategies and service levels in respect to the type, quantity and severity of the hazard which exists in various parts of the City.
- 2) The Department's goals and objectives and the appropriateness of fund allocation to support each of the functions; i.e. fire prevention, firefighting and protection of life.
- 3) The cost effectiveness of the present organizational structure and development of possible alternate methods of performing in each function.
- 4) The economies of improving the level of fire protection in relation to any trade-off with the cost of private insurance.
- 5) The appropriateness of cost recoveries relative to services provided.

d) Monetary Requirements

It is recommended by the Finance & Audit Committee that \$25,000.00 be allocated in the 1987 budget for this project.

The preceding information and recommendations are submitted for Council's consideration.

In conjunction with the purchase of the new computer processor previously approved by Council, it is necessary to purchase the operating software.

The net cost of the operating software is approximately \$235,000 for a five year licence. This cost was not included in the debenture by-law because the Alberta Municipal Financing Corporation will not allow computer software to be debentured.

It was intended the cost of the software would be financed by a five year lease agreement. The lease cost would be funded from the base budget and would not represent an additional cost to the budget.

As a result of the current high short term interest rates, the interest rate for a five year lease is 15%. The interest cost if a debenture could have been issued would have been 10% for a five year term.

The City has reserve funds that would probably earn an average of 11% over the next five years. It would be in the City's best interest if these reserve funds could be used to finance the software cost. The funds could be repaid over a five year period with 11% interest. The net savings that would result to the City would be \$38,090 as disclosed in the following table:



The attached application from Alberta Government Telephones is for two locations within the City for the establishment of Remote Wire Centres. One site has been identified as #120 Dixon Crescent (Deer Park), Lot 30, Block 4, Plan 822-2889, while the second is a 15 metre by 30 metre site located adjacent to a right-of-way plan in the Westerner Commercial Site, as indicated on the attached map.

Based on our asking price of \$150,000 per acre, the site requested by Alberta Government Telephones should be priced at \$16,650. However, a recent sale in the area at \$125,000 per acre, would indicate a selling price of \$13,750. To this should be added survey fees of \$1,500 for a total purchase price of \$15,250.

Attached are the comments of the Land Supervisor, which deal with the residential lot in Deer Park. The Economic Development Department's comments are similar inasmuch as we cannot support the requested purchase price of \$10,000 as indicated in the letter from Alberta Government Telephones.

We would however, recommend that the City sell Alberta Government Telephones the site as identified on the attached map at a price of \$15,250 which includes all survey fees.

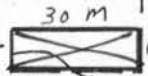

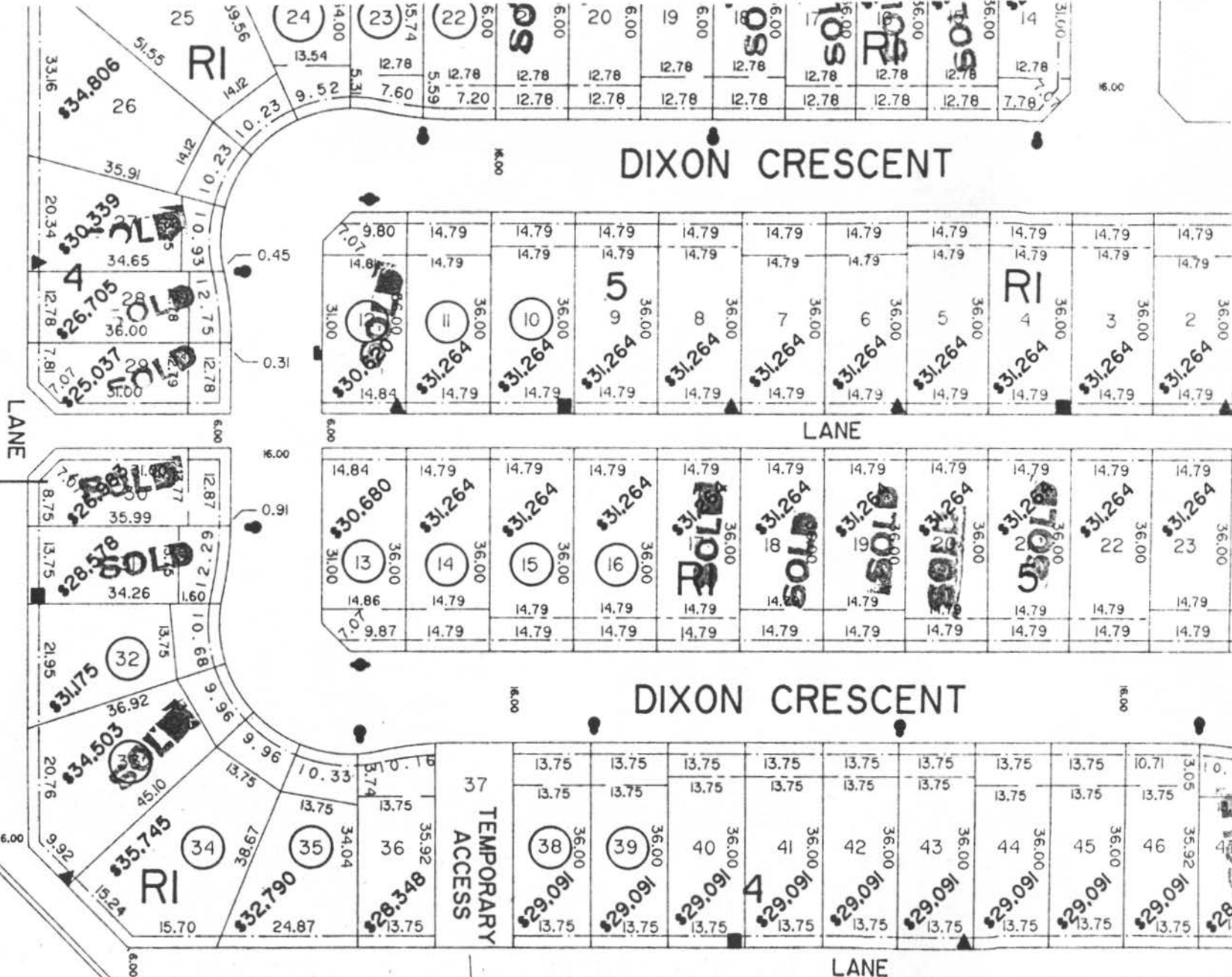

BACKGROUND

As Council is aware, it directed the Engineering/Public Works Departments, at their meeting of October 3, 1988, to consider the possibility of implementing a recycling program in the City of Red Deer.

"RESOLVED that Council of The City of Red Deer hereby agree that the correspondence from "The Elsie Carlson UCW" regarding recycling and community compost piles be referred to the Engineering Department to be considered in the Waste Management Study currently under way, and as recommended to Council October 3, 1988, by the City Commissioners."

We have spent a considerable amount of time investigating the issue. As we have indicated in recent correspondence (attached), we have had considerable discussions with The City of Edmonton regarding their recently implemented program (October 31, 1988). It appears their program is quite successful.

In discussions with Edmonton staff, they have provided to us the Contract and Tender documents they have used in their program. They have indicated that we are quite welcome to use their documents as a framework for our own. This is a generous offer, as we are certain that there are many man-months of research and development that have gone into the preparation.

TENDER AND CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

As indicated, it would be our intent to use The City of Edmonton material as much as possible. Some of the more pertinent characteristics of the document indicate:

1. The term of the Contract was approximately seven years, with rate changes over the years based on a Consumer Price Index of some fashion. We could look at a range of between 5 and 10 years, but as there is considerable capital investment, a longer term is desirable to the contractor.
2. Initial items to be collected were newsprint, metal, and glass; with optional inclusions of plastic, cardboard, and magazines at the City's option; the price to be variable depending on items to be recycled. I believe we would have to discuss this matter further with Edmonton to determine the best way for us to commence.
3. Contractor is responsible for supply and distribution of recycling containers and also supply of the vehicles required for collection.
4. Contractor to execute a Public Relations Program at his expense, including Press Releases, Newsletters, etc.
5. Contractor to arrange for and document markets for recycled materials.
6. Contractor to operate a centre in Red Deer where recycled items are processed and where drop-off of material is possible.
7. Performance criteria are set to be met by Contractor e.g. in Edmonton it is approximately 9.5 kg/month/dwelling unit. There are penalty clauses for non-performance.
8. Pickup to be same day as regular garbage collection.
9. Collection from single family dwelling units only.
10. Extensive record system maintained by Contractor with respect to markets, revenues, and amounts of each item collected.

ADVERTISING

As indicated above, the Contractor is made responsible for a significant amount of public relation activities during the course of the Contract. It is my belief that the City should, at least in the initial stages, supplement the Contractor's advertising with advertising of our own. It would be our intent to place an amount in the 1990 Budget. An initial and preliminary estimate would be \$6,000-\$8,000.

We should also initiate some extensive public relations and advertising activity prior to Tender award, to prepare City residents for the program. While the citizens of Red Deer appear to be generally receptive to the philosophy of recycling, we believe a campaign outlining our plans and the benefits of recycling must be made available to our citizens. Sample literature is attached.

Depending upon our schedule, this advertising could take place in the 1989 budget year. We do not have a firm estimate of cost, but believe it could reach the \$10,000-\$15,000 mark. As an example, I believe personally it is important to have a mascot/and/or slogan, and would propose a contest in the schools and/or involving the general public.

USE OF COSMOS

Direction from Council is required with respect to the potential involvement of COSMOS in the program. An initial discussion with Ms. Diane Lehr indicated that while they are not prepared to bid on the Contract, they would like very much to see some of their people used in the labour force of the successful Contractor. This is being done in the Edmonton scenario; the south side of the river is under contract to B.F.I., a private sector corporation employing their staff. On the north side the Contract was given to the Edmonton Recycling Society. This group is a non-profit society underwritten by the Mennonite Central Committee. They employ physically and mentally handicapped people to assist in the operation.

This option is open to The City of Red Deer, in that we could make it a condition of the contract that COSMOS be involved in supplying some of the manpower. This could result in a somewhat higher Tender price.

SCHEDULE

It would be our intent to, given Council's direction is to proceed, immediately commence preparation of a Tender and Contract Document. Given the present heavy workload and commitment on my staff, I would anticipate that the Contract could not be out to Tender prior to the end of 1989.

Tender award and Contract commencement would be in early 1990. While this may appear to be a lengthy period, it is in my mind a tight schedule based on available resources.

An option that could be considered, if Council wished, is that a consultant could be commissioned to do the work. I do not feel that this would shorten the time frame appreciatively.

It would be our intent to place a sum in the 1990 Budget for Council's consideration with respect to anticipated costs. It is my preliminary estimate that the cost to each household be as high as \$3-\$4.

We are trying to arrange for a representative of The City of Edmonton to be present at the Council meeting to answer any questions. Failing that, the writer will respond to all questions, and obtain responses as soon as possible.



We have reviewed the correspondence from Cosmos Enterprises and are very sorry to hear about their difficulties.

The Public Works Department has been in contact with The Province of Alberta and with The City of Edmonton, with respect to recycling programs. Edmonton has recently embarked on a recycling program and are having considerable success. The present estimated costs are in the order of \$.85 per household per month.

Edmonton has indicated that they would be pleased to assist us in our efforts to set-up a program. It was anticipated that we would be able to bring a report before Council at the meeting of June 26, 1989, which would outline the implications of, and procedures involved in initiating a recycling program.

In most instances, the firms that will be involved in tendering for the recycling contract are relatively large firms, as the investment in plant and material is considerable. One of the firms involved in the Edmonton recycling program, as a contractor, is the Edmonton Recycling Society. They employ physically and mentally handicapped people in their recycling plant. This is perhaps an issue we could attempt to address in our program.

RECYCLING UPDATE

- ** The delivery of Blue Box containers to the 124,000 homeowners in Edmonton is going well; final deliveries on December 2.
- ** Multiple-dwelling residents (apartments, condominiums, etc.) will be asked to participate before the end of 1989.
- ** In 1989, new materials will be added to the glass, newsprint and metal cans now being collected. These will include plastic bags, magazines, cardboard and plastic containers.
- ** The two contractors operating the recycling program have hired (or soon will be hiring) 70 or more new employees.
- ** An Edmonton company, Scepter Manufacturing, is producing the 124,000 Blue Boxes.
- ** The two contractors, BFI and ERS, separate the three collected materials at their plants; the "glossies" are removed from newspapers, the colored glass is separated from the clear glass, aluminum cans are separated from other metal cans, and returnable containers (i.e. pop and beer bottles etc.) are separated from both the glass and tin. All of this is done to increase the value to markets.
- ** In the first day of collection, from approximately one-fifth of the total number of participants, collectors picked-up 35,000 kg. of newsprint, saving the destruction of 600 trees.
- ** Also in the first day of collection, collectors picked-up 4,500 kg. of glass and 3,000 kg. of tin, preserving the raw materials of iron ore, bauxite, silica sand, soda ash and limestone.

- Every tonne of paper recycled conserves approximately 15 trees. 35,000 trees a day are used to publish Canadian newspapers.
- One tonne of cardboard represents 896 years of tree growth (32 trees that grow an average of 28 years).
- Wood harvest every year in Canada equals an area the size of Vancouver Island. (81,000 sq. miles). In Canada, only 67% of the area logged annually is successfully reforested.
- Paper is recycled up to 17 times in the Orient.
- In the process of decomposition, paper in garbage dumps gives off a large amount of methane gas, which contributes significantly to the greenhouse effect.
- From November 1, 1988 to April 14, 1989, ERS recycled 1,741 tonnes of paper.
- Recycling an aluminum can requires only 5% as much energy as refining one from bauxite.
- From November 1, 1988 to April 14, 1989 ERS recycled 445 tonnes of metal.
- Glass can be recycled an indefinite number of times.
- From November 1, 1988 to April 14, 1989 ERS recycled 237 tonnes of glass.

Conserving Creation - Creating Employment

FACT SHEET

- Employment of people with disabilities was a specific objective of ERS.
- Executive Director, Dr. Cornelius Guenter started working on the project proposal on December 23, 1987.
- On April 1, 1989 50 people were employed at Edmonton Recycling Society. Only 3 of these had come from permanent full-time positions. Most of the rest were unemployed. Some came from temporary positions.
- Twenty-five (25) Severely Employment Disadvantaged people are being trained at the ERS. Most are mentally disabled. Some will obtain permanent employment here, and others will be placed into permanent positions for which they are being trained. The training program is funded by a grant from the Canadian Jobs Strategy of Employment and Immigration Canada.
- ERS and MCC are seeking to develop alternatives to providing productive employment for physically and mentally disabled persons.
- Due to the ERS local purchase policy all of the blue boxes for the City were manufactured in Edmonton instead of Toronto, Ontario.

Blue boxes are now being manufactured in Edmonton for use in Vancouver, Victoria and the American Pacific Seaboard. A blue box manufacturing industry has been established in Edmonton
- The boxes for the nine ERS collection trucks were designed in Edmonton and built by International Truck Body in Coaldale, Alberta. The trucks were retrofitted with dual controls by the City of Edmonton at the cost of some \$9,000 each.
- The sorting equipment was built by Grain Guard, an Edmonton manufacturing firm.
- Shipping the recyclables to market is providing additional jobs in the transportation industry.
- Projects ERS is currently working on have the potential of creating another 20 to 30 permanent jobs.







Mr. Haslop, The Engineering Department Manager, has prepared and submitted a report to the writer.

I consider the report to be complete and accurate and will not elaborate much beyond what Mr. Haslop has already stated. In support of his request I would, however, like to make a few comments.

At the last meeting of Council, Alderman Guilbault raised the issue of the amount of work going to consultants. The matter under discussion was the detailed design and cost estimate for Gaetz Avenue and 48 Street Sidewalk Improvements. One additional Professional Engineer will not result in us doing all future work ourselves; there are projects such as transportation and transit studies, Water Treatment Plant and Wastewater Treatment Plant expansions and upgrading, bridge design work, and other complex engineering assignments that we would still not be equipped to handle.


It is our goal or intent to remain actively involved in a relatively small proportion of the engineering work connected with utility and roadway construction, subdivision development, and traffic issues.

With our present staff compliment, the administrative and technical burden is such that I feel sincerely Mr. Haslop, Mr. Warder, and Mr. Lee are being pressured beyond acceptable limits.

As Mr. Haslop has indicated, since I assumed the position of Director of Engineering Services, with the resultant responsibilities for Transit and Airport, there is actually less engineering man-hours available within the Engineering Department than 8-9 years ago.

RE: ADDITIONAL PROFESSIONAL ENGINEER

As you will recall, we discussed the matter of workload assigned to current professional staff within the Department, at time of preparation of the 1989 Budget.

Basically we have three Professional Engineers within the Department, carrying heavy workloads and responsibilities in terms of public impact, future growth, public safety, and potential cost to the City. The positions are:

- A. Engineering Department Manager
- B. Streets and Utilities Engineer
- C. Traffic Engineer

We indicated that the previously mentioned staff members were overloaded, but further anticipated that this was a result of a rather unusual capital roads program in 1987 and 1988. Examples being:

- 1. 67 Street River Bridge
- 2. 30 Avenue Twinning - 55 Street to 32 Street
- 3. Gaetz Avenue Widening - 78 Street to Highway No. 11
- 4. 32 Street Construction - 30 Avenue to Douglas Avenue
- 5. Major Continuous Corridor
- 6. Computerized Traffic Signals
- 7. Downtown Parking Strategy
- 8. Downtown Sidewalk Rehabilitation Program

What is in fact occurring is not a slow down in the Department's workload due to completion of projects, but rather an ever increasing amount of correspondence, cost control, meetings, and demand for engineering information. Projects such as the Traffic Signal Coordination have taken many hours of staff time for training and operation, and will take many more before our staff are fully conversant with the System. There are numerous minor deficiencies on all previous projects that require monitoring and action. The Major Continuous Corridor is to occur over the next 3-4 years, and is demanding a significant amount of professional input. The City is undertaking a major Transportation Study this year, which again requires a lot of senior engineering input; all

Agreements. One can see that the coordination and administration of the numerous consulting firms is very time consuming without the day-to-day correspondence and in-house engineering project design and construction.

Since 1979, we have not increased the number of Professional Engineers in the Engineering Department. The City's population has since increased from 39,370 to 55,947 for an increase of 42%. Rather than increase the engineering manpower to correspond to the increased workload, we have actually lost valuable input from the City Engineer. As Director of Engineering Services, a considerable amount of your time is utilized in the administration of the Transit and Public Works Departments, as well as other administrative roles required to assist the City Commissioner. The result is a very stressful work environment with a continuous backlog of unattended work items. Not only does this affect staff, but also the level of service we are able to provide to the public. We are fortunate that significant errors have been avoided to date. A further indication of workload is the attached table which tries to illustrate the general increase in capital cost expenditures per engineer.

As we are falling behind with bridge maintenance, ability to provide time for report reading and guidance to consultants for long range planning, following up on Development Agreements for bonding and security expirations, and as we have absolutely no slack time to cover staff holidays and time off due to sickness, etc., I believe the time is here to hire another Engineer. He should be a Junior Engineer available to assist in routine matters and the general workload. There is also a definite advantage to the City in having another staff member familiar with the operation of the City and the Department to the point of having a ready replacement should one of our three Engineers decide to leave. An illustration of this latter problem is the replacement of Mr. Gord Stewart with a new Engineer; not only will it take some time for him to become familiar with the City, but it took six months to recruit the individual. That length of time really placed a strain on the Engineering staff.

Even though there are no funds within the 1989 Budget for this new position, I request that we seriously consider advertising in August (it will take some time to develop a job description and evaluate the position in terms of salary) and aim for a suitable candidate to start by October 1, 1989. The three months' salary could possibly be covered by a year-end budget surplus, but it also may not materialize. Of course we would be committing ourselves for the 1990 Budget.

Commissioners' Comments

The attached report from the Dir. of Engineering Services is a request for Council approval to hire an additional Engineer. As pointed out by Mr. Haslop in his report this matter was thoroughly discussed at the time the Commissioners reviewed the 1989 budget. At that time, we chose not to include this position in the '89 budget as we anticipated that the workload would decline or at least not increase. We did, however, recognize that the time is rapidly approaching when the addition of this position would be necessary. As pointed out in the report, the reality is that contrary to our expectations at that time, the workload has increased, and increased substantially. We would normally prefer to bring these matters before Council during budget debate when total City priorities can be reviewed in perspective. However, in view of the current circumstances in the Engineering Department and the time it is currently taking to recruit suitable individuals, we would concur with the report of the Dir. of Engineering Services and fully support his request and recommend Council authorize the hiring of an Engineer. Should Council agree with this request, we would recommend that the cost in 1989 be charged against any surplus in the Engineering Department Budget or as an overexpenditure, but we doubt this would represent 3 months' salary as we do not believe that we would be successful in recruiting an individual by October 1, 1989.




Thank you for taking time to meet with us to discuss the City's concern with respect to CRC Grants.

A letter from Ken Wilson, Acting Assistant Deputy Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks, was received here January 24, 1989 announcing our eligibility for this grant as \$12.00 per capita (a copy of that letter is attached). Applications were invited any time after April 1, and we responded in good faith, submitting our applications to the Regional Office April 21. We have been waiting since then expecting the cheques to be received here any day.

On June 12 we received a letter from the Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks announcing a retroactive cutback in funding. On June 14 a further letter was received from the Director of the Community Recreation Branch offering three alternatives to municipalities who had already applied.

I have protested this decision to the Minister, the Deputy Minister, and the local M.L.A.s. It is my hope that a Province-wide outcry at this decision might convince the government to reverse that retroactive decision and to modify the program, if necessary, in the years ahead but to allow us to plan for this change.

Mr. Wilson's letter of June 12 (attached) offers three alternatives. My assessment of these and my recommendation follows:

1. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to return the applications to the municipality to have the necessary revisions made."
 - ° To do this is to delay processing at least a further eight to ten weeks as this would require further Board input and City Council approval. This would have groups receiving their funds in September, long after most projects were completed.
2. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to make the adjustments to the application by simply pro-rating the reduction equally over all providers in the application package."
 - ° With this alternative all groups are affected equally.
 - ° With this alternative there is no further delay in getting cheques issued.

- ° This alternative maintains the commitment that we made to each organization. Any change that is now made is a Provincial Government responsibility, and thus the focus on this cutback remains with the Province, where it belongs.
- 3. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to make specific adjustments to specific providers in the application package. In this option we would require specific written amendments to be forwarded, by the municipality, to Alberta Recreation & Parks."
 - ° This option, like the first one, -delays the process significantly.
 - ° Each organization received a letter from us in April indicating we had approved their project and that the government would be completing the process and raising cheques in six to eight weeks. Groups had planned accordingly; to now go back and cut some groups completely or to reduce some significantly sends a message that their projects really weren't a priority or worthy.

Another option that might be considered would be to have two or three organizations applications pulled completely with a guarantee from the Recreation, Parks & Culture Board that they would be given a priority for funding, from this source, in 1990. This would allow all other groups to receive the funding that they now expect. I would not, however, support this option for the following reasons:

- ° I do not recommend us to precommit a grant that is already being reduced in 1990 and is maybe not even guaranteed at any level.
- ° I do not want to suggest to any group that their project is now, after the fact, less important than those others and thus they can now wait for another year.
- ° It might be that we would receive some extraordinary applications in 1990 that we would want to fund and could not because of a precommitment to the organizations that we pulled from this year's submission.

Our local M.L.A.s have been actively seeking alternative methods of funding so that each organization could receive the grant allotment that was submitted. They have suggested that the application from the Twilight Homes Foundation, for the Recreation Centre spa, in the amount of \$35,000.00, could be withdrawn and submitted under the Community Facility Enhancement program. The application of the Folk Festival Society for the development of the Multi-Ethnic Hall at the Memorial Centre could be reduced by \$19,850.00 and likewise applied for under the Community Facility Enhancement program, thus making up the \$54,850.00 that C.R.C. is reduced by. The M.L.A.s are prepared to

guarantee these approvals, and thus every organization would receive full funding.

Based on the above, it is my recommendation that the alternative put forward by our M.L.A.s be accepted and recommended to City Council with the M.L.A.s guaranteeing approval through the Community Facility Enhancement Program for the Twilight Homes Foundation Recreation Centre Spa at \$35,000.00 and a portion of the Folk Festival Society Memorial Centre Hall application of \$19,850.00. All other C.R.C. applications would then remain as submitted. This alternative is accepted failing our ability to convince the Province to reconsider their decision to cut C.R.C. retroactively.

The City share of C.R.C. is likewise reduced by \$54,850.00 in 1989. These funds had been allocated to the Kinsmen Community Arenas, and as a result of this retroactive cutback we must modify our Five Year Capital and Operating plan too. This is going to result in additional carrying charges on these projects.

Attached is a chart that shows our original plan and how we will now have to modify it. Of special note is the Kinsmen Community Arenas funding now stretched through 1992 rather than 1991 and the purchase of the Easthill District site now extended through 1992 as well. Over and above this, we will have to reduce our operational funding from this source from \$100,000.00 in 1990 and 1991 to \$66,309.00 both years in order to accommodate these capital projects already committed to.



Further to the report of the Recreation & Culture Manager, I concur in total with the alternative proposed by the Red Deer M.L.A.s to withdraw \$54,850 in proposed funding from the C.R.C. program and allocate the same amount in C.F.E.P. funding in 1989. The two projects that would have the alternate funding source, i.e. Twilight Homes Foundation - Recreation Centre Spa, and Folk Festival Society - Memorial Centre Multi-Ethnic Hall, would still receive appropriate funding to allow these projects to proceed.

With respect to the purchase of the Easthill District Site from C.R.C. funds, I appreciate that the acquisition or payback will have to be deferred by one year. Although this means an extra year in interest and carrying charges, I do not see any alternative.

Appreciating that the alternative proposed by the Red Deer M.L.A.s is satisfactory, I still support a formal request from the Board, through City Council, to request the Province of Alberta to reconsider their reduction in C.R.C. grants in 1989. A retroactive cut, as announced by The Province, is inappropriate half way through a budget year. A cut in C.R.C. would be more appropriately announced prior to Municipal Annual Budget finalizations.

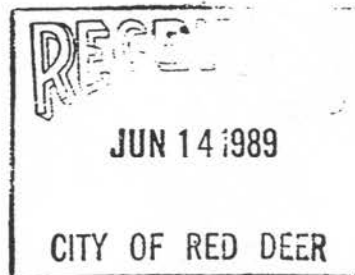

The Honourable Dr. Stephen C. West, Minister of Alberta Recreation and Parks, has recently written to your Mayor announcing the general budget reduction faced by this Department and, specifically, the change to the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program. This change retains the original \$240 million commitment while extending the program by one year. The new funding schedule is as follows:

1989	\$10.00 per capita
1990	\$ 8.00 per capita
1991	\$ 8.00 per capita
1992	\$ 6.00 per capita

This change is effective April 1, 1989.

The changes that have been announced will mean that adjustments must be made to the applications already submitted.

To assist you with this process, the new 1989 eligibility for your municipality under the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program is $54839 \times \$10.00$ per capita = \$548,390.00.

I would ask that you review and rework your 1989 application using the new per capita funding level. If your municipality has already forwarded your 1989 application to the Department, there are three options to consider:



As you are aware, one of the first and certainly one of the important orders of business for a new government, whether it be provincial or municipal, is the establishment of its budget and fiscal policy. The Government of Alberta has undertaken this task. As the Minister responsible for Alberta Recreation and Parks, I wish to share with you some tough fiscal adjustments that we have taken.

First, there will be a general reduction in the Department's operating budget of approximately 1% which will have a minimal impact upon our ongoing work in the area of community recreation.

Second, and more specifically, the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program will be restructured. As the government works to reduce its annual expenditures and to manage its deficit, the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program, because of its very large annual expenditure, has been reviewed. The program has been extended by one year. This adjustment retains the original commitment by the government to the program of \$240 million and distributes the funding over eight years. The schedule will be as outlined below:

1989	\$10.00 per capita
1990	\$ 8.00 per capita
1991	\$ 8.00 per capita
1992	\$ 6.00 per capita


This change is effective April 1, 1989. This decision has been taken to ensure that the stress on the multiplicity of organizations is lessened by extending the grant program over a longer period of time.

I certainly appreciate that this adjustment to the program will place additional strain on many aspects of your municipal recreation services and upon community recreation in your municipality. Fiscal management and responsibilities are a serious concern for me in my role as Minister and as a member of the Cabinet. I would ask that you strive to understand the necessity of the adjustments that must be made. I would also like to point out that the new Community Facility Enhancement Program is available as an alternate funding source for some of your municipal and community projects.

In Alberta we continue to have one of the most developed and best serviced community recreation systems in the country. The Province still provides a much higher level of support to municipalities and community organizations than can be found elsewhere in Canada.

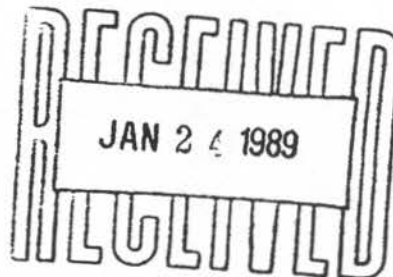

In accordance with the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program regulations, your municipality in the 1989 grant year is eligible to receive \$12.00 per capita based on the official population recorded with Alberta Municipal Affairs in 1988.

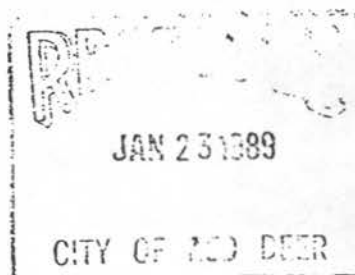
In 1989 the City of Red Deer is eligible for \$12.00 per capital X 54839 = \$658,068.00 subject to meeting the conditions of the grant regulations.

TO ALL 1989 RECEIPIENTS OF C.R.C. FUNDING:

In a letter received June 15 from Alberta Recreation & Parks we have learned that they reduced the support to this program from \$12.00 per capita to \$10.00 per capita for 1989. For 1990 and 1991 they have reduced it from \$10.00 per capita to \$8.00 per capita. They have extended the program through 1992 at \$6.00 per capita. The result of this decision is, of course, that our applications that have already been processed, based on \$12.00 per capita, are now being reduced. The Recreation, Parks & Culture Board has been given three options as to how to deal with these applications already before the Provincial department. One of these options is to have all applications prorated, thus the approved application that was earlier submitted would be reduced by 20 percent.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of this decision by the Province and to indicate to you that there will be a special meeting of the Recreation, Parks & Culture Board held next week to discuss this. We would very much like to have your input for that meeting. Would you please respond to me not later than June 26 with your comments as to the impact of this decision and whether or not you feel another alternative might be possible, such as re-evaluating all applications and thus eliminating some or whatever other options you might see possible.

In the meantime I think it quite appropriate for you to voice your concerns to the local M.L.A.s and the Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks, as this retroactive decision has a significant impact on all of us.

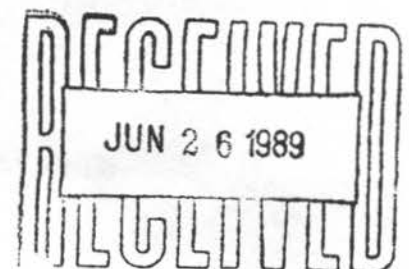
In regards to your letter of June 16 stating that the amount of the grant has been cut, we feel that the option of cutting the applications by 20% each would be the fair way to deal with your cut.


The Board of the Red Deer and District Allied Arts Council has asked me to express our deep concern with both the future cuts and the timing of the 1989 cuts.

The recent decision of Alberta Recreation and Parks Department to reduce funding to municipalities from \$12.00 to \$10.00 per capita in 1989 with further \$2.00 per capita reductions in each of 1990 and 1991 will have a serious negative impact on the Red Deer & District Allied Arts Council. We feel that this reduction in funding will necessitate serious cutbacks in the operations of many non-profit arts groups in Central Alberta.

This is an especially distressing development for Central Alberta arts groups, most of which, as they are amateur in status, were excluded from the large special one time grants awarded to some professional arts organizations immediately prior to the last provincial election.

While reductions for the upcoming years are definitely cause for concern, the fact that the twenty percent reduction for 1989 is being implemented retroactively has a major impact on the ability of arts groups to plan for upcoming events. If we are unable to make commitments to programs for fear of having previously approved funding revoked, it will seriously hamper our ability to operate in an effective and efficient manner.

The Red Deer and District Allied Arts Council has budgeted based upon the previously approved funding. Included in that budget was an active fund raising campaign for a significant portion of our budget. It would be extremely difficult, and probably unrealistic, to assume that we can revise our fund raising expectations upwards to cover the unexpected shortfall due to this reduction in funding.

We urge you, as strongly as possible, to reverse the decision to retroactively reduce the per capita grants for 1989 and to consider the strong negative impact on the cultural activities in Alberta of the future planned cuts in this funding.

The Red Deer Twilight Homes Foundation wishes to express, in the strongest possible terms, our objection to the manner in which Alberta Parks and Recreation is dealing with the C.R.C. funding grants for the year 1989.

As you are aware, Lowell, our Foundation is proposing to share the funding of a whirlpool facility and enclosure which would be an addition to the present recreation centre in Red Deer. The estimated total cost of the project is \$160,000; this Foundation has committed itself to providing \$80,000, one-half of the amount required. It was anticipated that the remaining \$80,000 would be forthcoming through matching government grants.

Plans for this project began to take shape in the fall of 1987. Architectural drawings are now three-quarters completed. It was expected that work on the facility would begin in September of 1989.

Some C.R.C. grant funding was provided in 1988, and our application for 1989 funding was submitted before the deadline date in late fall.

It is only now, in June; half-way through 1989, that the Province advises that it is cutting back support for its C.R.C. funding from \$12.00 per capita to \$10.00 per capita for this year, with further reductions in the years to follow.

We consider this sudden policy shift on behalf of the Province to be a high-handed and arbitrary way for government to deal with, not only the City of Red Deer, but communities throughout the province who have been acting in good faith and proceeding with projects which would improve the quality of life in their own localities.

In our own case, commencement of construction for the whirlpool facility is now uncertain. This is, of course, upsetting to the Twilight Homes Foundation and its parent body, the Kiwanis Club of Red Deer, but especially to the senior citizens who were expected to be the major beneficiaries of this proposed addition to the swimming pool.

We have appreciated your own past efforts on behalf of our Foundation's undertakings to enhance the quality of life of our citizens and especially of our senior citizens.

It is hard-working volunteer organizations like ourselves which see to it that the community is well served and the quality of life enhanced by means of grant funds provided by government.

Government, in its turn, should deal with its citizens in a more responsible and less cavalier fashion.

Thank you for your letter of June 16, 1989 regarding the above, and to say that the reduction at this time is of concern would be a gross understatement.

Our immediate, but not only problem, has to be in regard to the July 1st, Canada Day Festival, where financial commitments have been made up to the limits of available funding, contracts signed, supplies and materials ordered. To change course at this late date is virtually impossible, and as you are no doubt aware, the City of Red Deer, advances an equivalent amount granted in the CRC Grant, as a bridging loan, until CRC monies are received normally in late July. This means that we are already \$1,000 overspent against revenue; and no possible means of recouping any loss at this late date.

The greater, though longer term problem, is the ± \$9,000 which will be lost on the Memorial Centre Gymnasium project, a considerable sum on our restricted project budget, and will certainly delay the fully operational project completion date until next year (1990).

This action could create a ripple effect through various organizations, not the least of whom will be the Public School Board, who are anticipating using the facility commencing October 1st for gymnastic classes, in accordance with our joint agreement, but also will result in the loss of other funding, particularly the Canada Works Section 25 funding for labour costs. Without money to purchase supplies, construction will have to cease, and as Canada Employment funding is based on labour costs + \$125 per employee per week worked, this loss could place the project in severe jeopardy especially as we have already received monies based on an estimated number of employee work weeks, which would have to be repaid if the project was

curtailed. The estimated loss alone from this grant could be \pm \$30,000, not to mention the loss of 6 - 8 jobs.


The final loss of \pm \$750 to the Cronquist House Multi-cultural Centre while disappointing is not too severe, although it will probably result in program curtailment, as funds are transferred to cover the shortcomings the loss will incur.

Regarding the solution to the dilemma by the Recreation Parks & Culture Board, and City Council it would be easy to say 'let our money stand'. Realistically however we appreciate that other groups allocated CRC funding will find themselves in situations similar to ours, and therefore we would reluctantly accept a prorated reduction if necessary, and would welcome an opportunity to discuss tentative solutions at a future appropriate date.




On behalf of the Central Alberta Refugee Effort Committee I would like to express my concern with respect to the recently announced 20% cut in provincial grants to municipalities.

A letter from Ken Wilson, Acting Assistant Deputy Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks, was received here January 24, 1989 announcing our eligibility for this grant as \$12.00 per capita (a copy of that letter is attached). Applications were invited any time after April 1, and we responded in good faith, submitting our applications to the Regional Office April 21. We have been waiting since then expecting the cheques to be received here any day.

On June 12 we received a letter from the Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks announcing a retroactive cutback in funding. On June 14 a further letter was received from the Director of the Community Recreation Branch offering three alternatives to municipalities who had already applied.

I have protested this decision to the Minister, the Deputy Minister, and the local M.L.A.s. It is my hope that a Province-wide outcry at this decision might convince the government to reverse that retroactive decision and to modify the program, if necessary, in the years ahead but to allow us to plan for this change.

Mr. Wilson's letter of June 12 (attached) offers three alternatives. My assessment of these and my recommendation follows:

1. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to return the applications to the municipality to have the necessary revisions made."
 - ° To do this is to delay processing at least a further eight to ten weeks as this would require further Board input and City Council approval. This would have groups receiving their funds in September, long after most projects were completed.
2. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to make the adjustments to the application by simply pro-rating the reduction equally over all providers in the application package."
 - ° With this alternative all groups are affected equally.
 - ° With this alternative there is no further delay in getting cheques issued.

- ° This alternative maintains the commitment that we made to each organization. Any change that is now made is a Provincial Government responsibility, and thus the focus on this cutback remains with the Province, where it belongs.
- 3. "The municipality may request Alberta Recreation & Parks to make specific adjustments to specific providers in the application package. In this option we would require specific written amendments to be forwarded, by the municipality, to Alberta Recreation & Parks."
 - ° This option, like the first one, delays the process significantly.
 - ° Each organization received a letter from us in April indicating we had approved their project and that the government would be completing the process and raising cheques in six to eight weeks. Groups had planned accordingly; to now go back and cut some groups completely or to reduce some significantly sends a message that their projects really weren't a priority or worthy.

Another option that might be considered would be to have two or three organizations applications pulled completely with a guarantee from the Recreation, Parks & Culture Board that they would be given a priority for funding, from this source, in 1990. This would allow all other groups to receive the funding that they now expect. I would not, however, support this option for the following reasons:

- ° I do not recommend us to precommit a grant that is already being reduced in 1990 and is maybe not even guaranteed at any level.
- ° I do not want to suggest to any group that their project is now, after the fact, less important than those others and thus they can now wait for another year.
- ° It might be that we would receive some extraordinary applications in 1990 that we would want to fund and could not because of a precommitment to the organizations that we pulled from this year's submission.

Our local M.L.A.s have been actively seeking alternative methods of funding so that each organization could receive the grant allotment that was submitted. They have suggested that the application from the Twilight Homes Foundation, for the Recreation Centre spa, in the amount of \$35,000.00, could be withdrawn and submitted under the Community Facility Enhancement program. The application of the Folk Festival Society for the development of the Multi-Ethnic Hall at the Memorial Centre could be reduced by \$19,850.00 and likewise applied for under the Community Facility Enhancement program, thus making up the \$54,850.00 that C.R.C. is reduced by. The M.L.A.s are prepared to

guarantee these approvals, and thus every organization would receive full funding.

Based on the above, it is my recommendation that the alternative put forward by our M.L.A.s be accepted and recommended to City Council with the M.L.A.s guaranteeing approval through the Community Facility Enhancement Program for the Twilight Homes Foundation Recreation Centre Spa at \$35,000.00 and a portion of the Folk Festival Society Memorial Centre Hall application of \$19,850.00. All other C.R.C. applications would then remain as submitted. This alternative is accepted failing our ability to convince the Province to reconsider their decision to cut C.R.C. retroactively.

The City share of C.R.C. is likewise reduced by \$54,850.00 in 1989. These funds had been allocated to the Kinsmen Community Arenas, and as a result of this retroactive cutback we must modify our Five Year Capital and Operating plan too. This is going to result in additional carrying charges on these projects.

Attached is a chart that shows our original plan and how we will now have to modify it. Of special note is the Kinsmen Community Arenas funding now stretched through 1992 rather than 1991 and the purchase of the Easthill District site now extended through 1992 as well. Over and above this, we will have to reduce our operational funding from this source from \$100,000.00 in 1990 and 1991 to \$66,309.00 both years in order to accommodate these capital projects already committed to.



Further to the report of the Recreation & Culture Manager, I concur in total with the alternative proposed by the Red Deer M.L.A.s to withdraw \$54,850 in proposed funding from the C.R.C. program and allocate the same amount in C.F.E.P. funding in 1989. The two projects that would have the alternate funding source, i.e. Twilight Homes Foundation - Recreation Centre Spa, and Folk Festival Society - Memorial Centre Multi-Ethnic Hall, would still receive appropriate funding to allow these projects to proceed.

With respect to the purchase of the Easthill District Site from C.R.C. funds, I appreciate that the acquisition or payback will have to be deferred by one year. Although this means an extra year in interest and carrying charges, I do not see any alternative.

Appreciating that the alternative proposed by the Red Deer M.L.A.s is satisfactory, I still support a formal request from the Board, through City Council, to request the Province of Alberta to reconsider their reduction in C.R.C. grants in 1989. A retroactive cut, as announced by The Province, is inappropriate half way through a budget year. A cut in C.R.C. would be more appropriately announced prior to Municipal Annual Budget finalizations.

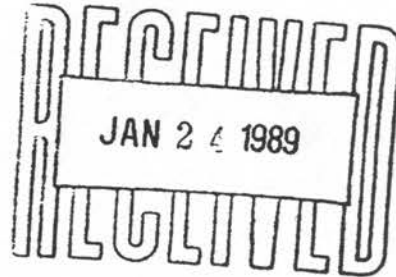

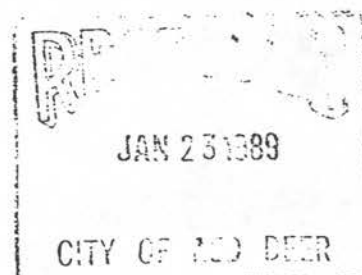

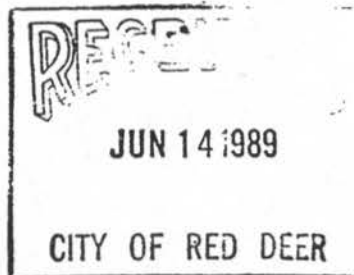

The Honourable Dr. Stephen C. West, Minister of Alberta Recreation and Parks, has recently written to your Mayor announcing the general budget reduction faced by this Department and, specifically, the change to the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program. This change retains the original \$240 million commitment while extending the program by one year. The new funding schedule is as follows:

1989	\$10.00 per capita
1990	\$ 8.00 per capita
1991	\$ 8.00 per capita
1992	\$ 6.00 per capita

This change is effective April 1, 1989.

The changes that have been announced will mean that adjustments must be made to the applications already submitted.

To assist you with this process, the new 1989 eligibility for your municipality under the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program is $54839 \times \$10.00$ per capita = \$548,390.00.



It is with absolute dismay that I learned today that C.R.C. had been reduced for 1989. Four months ago we received instructions regarding C.R.C., indicating that the funding level would be \$12.00 per capita and that applications would be accepted any time after April 1. In good faith the Recreation, Parks & Culture Board then announced this to the community and received applications for this funding. We then met and agonized over these applications, recognizing that they could not all be funded, but through a process of evaluation we accepted applications and submitted them to your Regional Office here in Red Deer for further processing. The community service organizations were informed that their application had been approved by my Board and that they were being processed further with Alberta Recreation & Parks, and they should expect funding in early to mid June.

I cannot comprehend you now reducing this for 1989. If the program had to be reduced and extended, that should have taken place for 1990 and onward, but to make these cuts retroactive is beyond my understanding. Alberta Recreation & Parks is a strong advocate of planning, as is our local Board, and we give that same message to the community service organizations that we support. To now come back and tell them that this planning had not been done earlier is, at best, very difficult to do as many of these organizations have prepared their budgets and planned their programs ready to go this summer.

TO ALL 1989 RECEIPIENTS OF C.R.C. FUNDING:

In a letter received June 15 from Alberta Recreation & Parks we have learned that they reduced the support to this program from \$12.00 per capita to \$10.00 per capita for 1989. For 1990 and 1991 they have reduced it from \$10.00 per capita to \$8.00 per capita. They have extended the program through 1992 at \$6.00 per capita. The result of this decision is, of course, that our applications that have already been processed, based on \$12.00 per capita, are now being reduced. The Recreation, Parks & Culture Board has been given three options as to how to deal with these applications already before the Provincial department. One of these options is to have all applications pro-rated, thus the approved application that was earlier submitted would be reduced by 20 percent.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of this decision by the Province and to indicate to you that there will be a special meeting of the Recreation, Parks & Culture Board held next week to discuss this. We would very much like to have your input for that meeting. Would you please respond to me not later than June 26 with your comments as to the impact of this decision and whether or not you feel another alternative might be possible, such as re-evaluating all applications and thus eliminating some or whatever other options you might see possible.

In the meantime I think it quite appropriate for you to voice your concerns to the local M.L.A.s and the Minister of Alberta Recreation & Parks, as this retroactive decision has a significant impact on all of us.

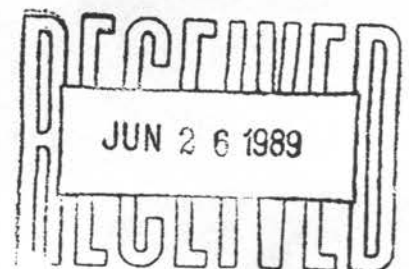


The Board of the Red Deer and District Allied Arts Council has asked me to express our deep concern with both the future cuts and the timing of the 1989 cuts.

The recent decision of Alberta Recreation and Parks Department to reduce funding to municipalities from \$12.00 to \$10.00 per capita in 1989 with further \$2.00 per capita reductions in each of 1990 and 1991 will have a serious negative impact on the Red Deer & District Allied Arts Council. We feel that this reduction in funding will necessitate serious cutbacks in the operations of many non-profit arts groups in Central Alberta.

This is an especially distressing development for Central Alberta arts groups, most of which, as they are amateur in status, were excluded from the large special one time grants awarded to some professional arts organizations immediately prior to the last provincial election.

While reductions for the upcoming years are definitely cause for concern, the fact that the twenty percent reduction for 1989 is being implemented retroactively has a major impact on the ability of arts groups to plan for upcoming events. If we are unable to make commitments to programs for fear of having previously approved funding revoked, it will seriously hamper our ability to operate in an effective and efficient manner.

The Red Deer and District Allied Arts Council has budgeted based upon the previously approved funding. Included in that budget was an active fund raising campaign for a significant portion of our budget. It would be extremely difficult, and probably unrealistic, to assume that we can revise our fund raising expectations upwards to cover the unexpected shortfall due to this reduction in funding.

We are therefore left with the equally difficult alternatives of either increasing fees for our services or reducing staff or programming. Our fee levels are already set at a level that we feel will maximise revenues without restricting access to our programs. Our current staffing level is, we feel, at the bare minimum required to provide the services our community expects of us.

We urge you, as strongly as possible, to reverse the decision to retroactively reduce the per capita grants for 1989 and to consider the strong negative impact on the cultural activities in Alberta of the future planned cuts in this funding.

With regard to the recent decision by Alberta Recreation & Parks to retroactively reduce 1989 CRC funding, I feel compelled to register this society's utter disbelief that we are now faced with a 17% shortfall in our capital budget for this year.

It's difficult enough for community culture and recreation organizations to accomplish what they do with little money and much volunteer effort. Now, it seems, we have to contend with a new, more fluid set of rules that allows the biggest player to both turn back the clock and tighten the purse strings simultaneously.

We are a pro-active organization, not a retroactive one. Any changes made to CRC funding should be made before the fact, not after it. The proposal to shift certain approved CRC grant applications into Community Facility Enhancement grants is at best a smooth political move that seeks to solve a problem by ignoring it's cause.

The issue of retroactivity must be dealt with by all parties concerned, and we must ensure that all past commitments are honoured. One can only change the future, not the past.

The Red Deer Twilight Homes Foundation wishes to express, in the strongest possible terms, our objection to the manner in which Alberta Parks and Recreation is dealing with the C.R.C. funding grants for the year 1989.

As you are aware, Lowell, our Foundation is proposing to share the funding of a whirlpool facility and enclosure which would be an addition to the present recreation centre in Red Deer. The estimated total cost of the project is \$160,000; this Foundation has committed itself to providing \$80,000, one-half of the amount required. It was anticipated that the remaining \$80,000 would be forthcoming through matching government grants.

Plans for this project began to take shape in the fall of 1987. Architectural drawings are now three-quarters completed. It was expected that work on the facility would begin in September of 1989.

Some C.R.C. grant funding was provided in 1988, and our application for 1989 funding was submitted before the deadline date in late fall.

It is only now, in June; half-way through 1989, that the Province advises that it is cutting back support for its C.R.C. funding from \$12.00 per capita to \$10.00 per capita for this year, with further reductions in the years to follow.

We consider this sudden policy shift on behalf of the Province to be a high-handed and arbitrary way for government to deal with, not only the City of Red Deer, but communities throughout the province who have been acting in good faith and proceeding with projects which would improve the quality of life in their own localities.



Thank you for your letter of June 16, 1989 regarding the above, and to say that the reduction at this time is of concern would be a gross understatement.

Our immediate, but not only problem, has to be in regard to the July 1st, Canada Day Festival, where financial commitments have been made up to the limits of available funding, contracts signed, supplies and materials ordered. To change course at this late date is virtually impossible, and as you are no doubt aware, the City of Red Deer, advances an equivalent amount granted in the CRC Grant, as a bridging loan, until CRC monies are received normally in late July. This means that we are already \$1,000 overspent against revenue; and no possible means of recouping any loss at this late date.

The greater, though longer term problem, is the ± \$9,000 which will be lost on the Memorial Centre Gymnasium project, a considerable sum on our restricted project budget, and will certainly delay the fully operational project completion date until next year (1990).

This action could create a ripple effect through various organizations, not the least of whom will be the Public School Board, who are anticipating using the facility commencing October 1st for gymnastic classes, in accordance with our joint agreement, but also will result in the loss of other funding, particularly the Canada Works Section 25 funding for labour costs. Without money to purchase supplies, construction will have to cease, and as Canada Employment funding is based on labour costs + \$125 per employee per week worked, this loss could place the project in severe jeopardy especially as we have already received monies based on an estimated number of employee work weeks, which would have to be repaid if the project was

curtailed. The estimated loss alone from this grant could be \pm \$30,000, not to mention the loss of 6 - 8 jobs.


The final loss of \pm \$750 to the Cronquist House Multi-cultural Centre while disappointing is not too severe, although it will probably result in program curtailment, as funds are transferred to cover the shortcomings the loss will incur.

Regarding the solution to the dilemma by the Recreation Parks & Culture Board, and City Council it would be easy to say 'let our money stand'. Realistically however we appreciate that other groups allocated CRC funding will find themselves in situations similar to ours, and therefore we would reluctantly accept a prorated reduction if necessary, and would welcome an opportunity to discuss tentative solutions at a future appropriate date.




On behalf of the Central Alberta Refugee Effort Committee I would like to express my concern with respect to the recently announced 20% cut in provincial grants to municipalities.

Our organization was awarded a \$4000 Community Recreation and Culture Grant to conduct our 'Multicultural Express' program for children this summer. Preparation for this program by additional staff members is well underway and cannot be reduced by 20%. Therefore, in order to accommodate a 20% reduction in funding our organization would have to subsidize the program from its very limited financial resources.

In more than nine years of receiving financial support from municipal, provincial and federal government departments we have never had funding reduced retroactively. As you are aware, one of the first and certainly one of the important orders of business for a new government, whether it be provincial or municipal, is the establishment of its budget and fiscal policy. The Government of Alberta has undertaken this task. As the Minister responsible for Alberta Recreation and Parks, I wish to share with you some tough fiscal adjustments that we have taken.

First, there will be a general reduction in the Department's operating budget of approximately 1% which will have a minimal impact upon our ongoing work in the area of community recreation.

Second, and more specifically, the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program will be restructured. As the government works to reduce its annual expenditures and to manage its deficit, the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program, because of its very large annual expenditure, has been reviewed. The program has been extended by one year. This adjustment retains the original commitment by the government to the program of \$240 million and distributes the funding over eight years. The schedule will be as outlined below:

1989	\$10.00 per capita
1990	\$ 8.00 per capita
1991	\$ 8.00 per capita
1992	\$ 6.00 per capita

This change is effective April 1, 1989. This decision has been taken to ensure that the stress on the multiplicity of organizations is lessened by extending the grant program over a longer period of time.

I certainly appreciate that this adjustment to the program will place additional strain on many aspects of your municipal recreation services and upon community recreation in your municipality. Fiscal management and responsibilities are a serious concern for me in my role as Minister and as a member of the Cabinet. I would ask that you strive to understand the necessity of the adjustments that must be made. I would also like to point out that the new Community Facility Enhancement Program is available as an alternate funding source for some of your municipal and community projects.

In Alberta we continue to have one of the most developed and best serviced community recreation systems in the country. The Province still provides a much higher level of support to municipalities and community organizations than can be found elsewhere in Canada.

The Honourable Dr. Stephen C. West, Minister of Alberta Recreation and Parks, has recently written to your Mayor announcing the general budget reduction faced by this Department and, specifically, the change to the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program. This change retains the original \$240 million commitment while extending the program by one year. The new funding schedule is as follows:

1989	\$10.00 per capita
1990	\$ 8.00 per capita
1991	\$ 8.00 per capita
1992	\$ 6.00 per capita

This change is effective April 1, 1989.

The changes that have been announced will mean that adjustments must be made to the applications already submitted.

To assist you with this process, the new 1989 eligibility for your municipality under the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant Program is 54839 X \$10.00 per capita = \$548,390.00.

I would ask that you review and rework your 1989 application using the new per capita funding level. If your municipality has already forwarded your 1989 application to the Department, there are three options to consider:



1. The municipality may request Alberta Recreation and Parks to return the application to the municipality to have the necessary revisions made, or
2. The municipality may request Alberta Recreation and Parks to make the adjustments to its application by simply prorating the reduction equally over all providers in the application package, or
3. The municipality may request Alberta Recreation and Parks to make specific adjustments to specific providers in the application package. In this option we would require specific written amendments be forwarded by the municipality to Alberta Recreation and Parks.

Staff from our Regional Recreation Services Section will be in contact with your municipality to assist you in implementing the necessary changes to your Community Recreation/Cultural Grant application.

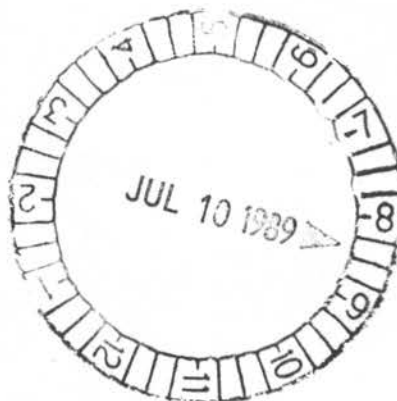

Thank you for your recent letter regarding changes made to the Community Recreation/Cultural program. I appreciate being made aware of your views regarding the timing of the changes made to the program. I hope that the following information clarifies the program's intent and the reasons for the revision to the schedule of assistance provided to municipalities.

The CRC program was created in 1985 to assist municipalities and community groups in providing recreational facilities and programs. A commitment of \$240 million was made at the time for a period of five years. The program has since been extended, as you know, once in 1987 and again this year. The commitment of \$240 million remains the same.

As you are aware, a decision was made to revise the schedule of assistance to municipalities from \$12 to \$10 per capita. Because the provincial budget had not yet been tabled in the Legislative Assembly, it was not possible to inform municipalities of the revised schedule until June 9, 1989. Immediately following the provincial budget announcement, I made efforts to ensure that letters were sent to all municipalities which advised them of the changes to the program and offered assistance from the department of Recreation and Parks in responding to the changes.


Although it is not the intention of the Government of Alberta to further revise the program this fiscal year, I would note that there is a variety of programs accessible by municipalities for recreation purposes, including the Community Facilities Enhancement Program and the Municipal Recreation Tourism Areas program. Funding may also be available from the Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation, the Alberta Sport Council and the Wild Rose Foundation.

The decision to revise the schedule of financial assistance from \$12 to \$10 per capita this year was based on the need to address the fiscal management concerns of the province. The decision was a difficult one; however, I am hopeful that through careful planning on the part of the municipalities and Province that the effect of this decision can be minimized.

I appreciate the difficulties that the changes to the program have created for municipalities and wish to apologize for any inconveniences caused. I will be keeping all comments received regarding the program in mind during discussions with my colleagues.

Once again, thank you for your comments and for your support of Alberta's community-based recreation programs and facilities.





For your reference, we have attached a copy of a letter from the Minister of Transportation and Utilities, concerning cost sharing of the above noted roadway construction scheduled for 1990. The proposed construction program, estimated cost, and City/Province shareability for this Project is described as follows:


1. Sixty-fourth Avenue will be constructed as a four lane arterial roadway from Highway No. 11 A, south to Edgar Drive. The estimated cost of construction is \$500,000, of which the City will be responsible for \$125,000 (25%) and the Province will pay \$375,000 (75%) from Basic Capital funds.
2. Highway No. 11 A will be widened for a distance of approximately 466 m east, and 576 m west of 64 Avenue to improve vehicle turning movements at the intersection. The estimated cost of construction is \$750,000, all of which will come from Basic Capital funds (no cost to the City).

The Province will provide funding to the City for similar projects under the Basic Capital Program up to approximately \$3.6 million per year based on the current rate of \$65 per capita. To date, we have only allocated \$1.2 million on other projects for 1989. The unspent portion of the Grant cannot be carried over to 1990. The uncommitted amount would be lost to us.

In order to take advantage of the available funds this year, and reduce the possibility of being short of funds next year or future years, we would respectfully request that the construction of Highway No. 11 A and 64 Avenue be advanced to commence in 1989 and that Council allocate \$125,000 (the City's share of the total cost) to this Project. The Director of Finance will provide further details on funding for this Project in a concurrent report.

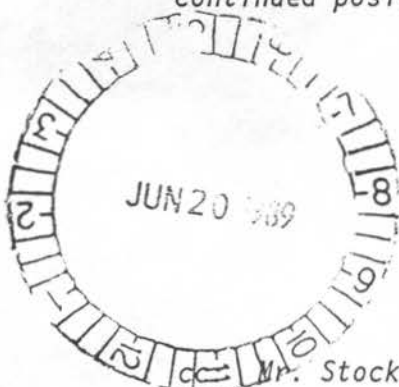
Thank you for your letter of May 10, 1989, concerning the proposed construction in 1990 of 64 Avenue as a four-lane arterial roadway from Highway 11A to Edgar Crescent.

This project will be eligible for cost-sharing under the Basic Capital component of the Alberta Cities Transportation Partnership. That portion within the city limits will be cost-shared on a 75/25 basis, and the portion outside the city limits will be at 100 percent Government share. We understand that no special grant will be required for the portion outside the city limits, as the city will have sufficient Basic Capital funds to assign to this project within its normal allocation available during the three-year duration of the current program.

The project should be tendered as one project and administered by the city. An agreement will be prepared to cover the work outside the city limits. The agreement for this project will be similar to the agreement prepared for the Gaetz Avenue/Highway 11A intersection improvement, which was undertaken by the city in 1988. The Urban Transportation Branch will prepare the necessary agreement and co-ordinate the department's participation in this project.


The area in question is included in the DC(3) district, for which the following regulations apply:

- (c) Any use approved by the City Council for the land within this use district. (2672/T-88)

After reviewing their application, it was our opinion that the principal use would be for an office with some outside storage. This site was previously zoned I1 in which an office was neither permitted nor discretionary and was not an existing use, therefore a decision of Council is required.

We have no objections to the proposal and recommend it be approved.

MAIN FLOOR DRAWING

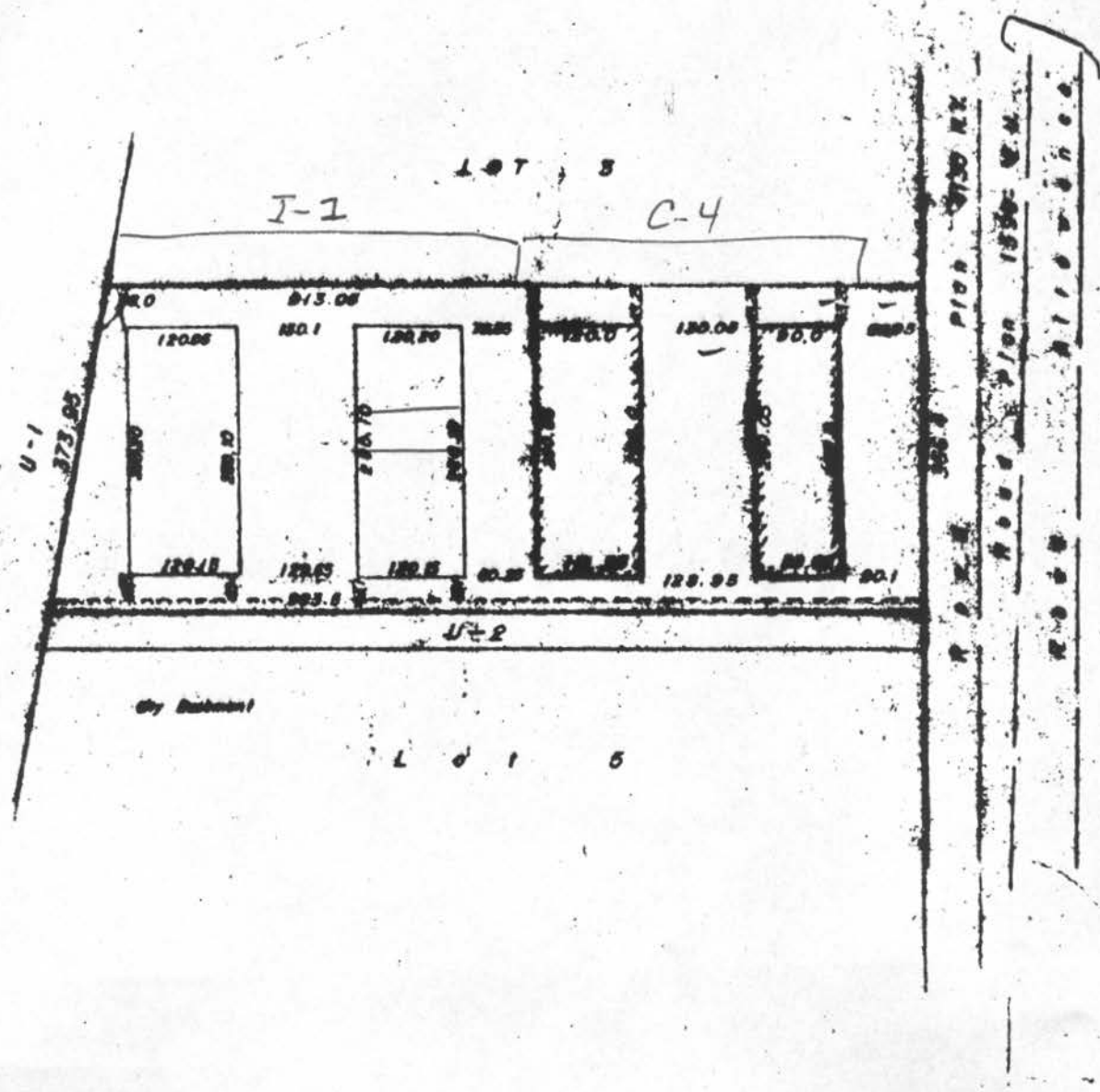



It is this department's opinion that the proposal locating an assembly use adjacent to a high hazard location is not desirable.



Commissioners' Comments

The attached application is for the rezoning of an existing I1 site to allow for the use of part of the facility as a commercial recreation centre. As can be seen from the attached reports the administration is in general concurrence with the application, however, the comments of the Fire Marshal have brought to our attention a serious concern with respect to this application, other existing public assembly facilities in our light industrial areas and any future applications for similar uses in those industrial areas where the bylaw allows such activities.

With respect to the current application, the Fire Marshal is pointing out that by changing the zoning to approve this use, we are in fact allowing one of 2 things to happen:

1. We enforce the Dangerous Goods Route Bylaw which would then not permit the adjacent business to store on his site vehicles containing certain products which are classed as hazardous, thus detracting from what we believe to be this business' rightful and expected use of the property.
2. We do not enforce the bylaw implicitly saying we do not believe these products to be hazardous.

We do not believe that either of these alternates are acceptable and would therefore strongly recommend that this application be denied.

With respect to other existing situations similar to this, we have requested the Red Deer Regional Planning Commission in conjunction with the Fire Department and Economic Development Department to prepare a report for Council's consideration with respect to the entire suitability of locating public assembly facilities (recreation, banquet, day care, etc.) in our industrial areas and we would hope to have this report ready for the next Council meeting.

BY-LAW NO. 2994/89
OF THE CITY OF RED DEER
IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

A by-law to authorize the Municipal Council of The City of Red Deer to incur an indebtedness on behalf of the said City by the issuance of debentures for the purpose of extending 46A Avenue from Riverside Drive to 62nd Street and extending a sidewalk South of 67th Street at the Dawe Centre.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and proper pursuant to the provisions of Section 353 of the Municipal Government Act that the Council shall issue a by-law to authorize financing, undertaking and completing the extending of 46A Avenue from Riverside Drive to 62nd Street and extending a sidewalk South of 67th Street at the Dawe Centre as per Schedule "A".

AND WHEREAS plans, specifications and estimates for such work have been made by the Director of Engineering Services, whereby the total cost of the said project is \$210,000.00.

AND WHEREAS it is estimated by the Council of the said City that the undernoted applicable grants and contributions will be received or applied.

AND WHEREAS in order to construct and complete the said project, it will be necessary to borrow the sum of \$157,500.00 on the credit of the City as herein provided.

AND WHEREAS the said indebtedness is to be repaid over a period of twenty (20) years in annual instalments, with interest not exceeding fourteen per centum (14%), or the interest rate fixed from time to time by the Alberta Municipal Financing Corporation, per annum, payable annually.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the equalized assessment in the municipality as last determined and fixed by the Assessment Equalization Board is \$402,006,900.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the City at June 30, 1989, is \$64,640,411.35, no part of which is in arrears.

AND WHEREAS the estimated lifetime of the project is twenty years.

AND WHEREAS approval of the Director of Standards and Approvals, Department of Environment, for the proposal as required by the Clean Water Act, or regulations thereto, has been obtained under Permit No. 89-MP-013.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RED DEER IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Municipal Council of The City of Red Deer is hereby empowered and authorized to enter into contracts for the purpose of extending 46A Avenue from Riverside Drive to 62nd Street and extending a sidewalk South of 67th Street at the Dawe Centre as may be necessary.
2. That for the purpose aforesaid, the sum of One Hundred and Fifty-Seven Thousand, Five Hundred DOLLARS (\$157,500.00) be borrowed by way of debenture on the credit and security of The City of Red Deer at large, of which amount the sum of \$157,500.00 is to be paid by the City at large.
3. The debentures to be issued under this by-law shall not exceed the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Seven Thousand, Five Hundred DOLLARS (\$157,500.00), and may be in any denomination not exceeding the amount authorized by this by-law and shall be dated having regard to the date of the borrowing.
4. The debentures shall bear interest during the currency of the debentures, at a rate not exceeding fourteen per centum (14%), or the interest rate fixed from time to time by the Alberta Municipal Financing Corporation, per annum, payable annually.
5. The debentures shall be issued in such manner that the principal and interest will be combined and be made payable in, as nearly as possible, equal annual instalments over a period of twenty (20) years, in accordance with the schedule attached and forming a part of each debenture.
6. The debentures shall be payable in lawful money of Canada at the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce in the City of Red Deer or at such other bank or financial institution as the Council may authorize as its banking agency during the currency of the debentures.
7. The Mayor and Treasurer of The City of Red Deer shall authorize such bank or financial institution to make payments to the holder of the debentures, on such date and in such amounts as specified in the repayment schedule forming part of each debenture.


At the Council meeting of July 10, 1989, the following written enquiry was submitted by Alderman Pimm relative to the Community Facility Enhancement Program:
