**Land Sale Policy  
Effective May, 1954.**

Same procedure as before except that a deposit equal to the assessed value of land shall be taken with all applications for residential property. The remaining amount shall be deposited before any building permit is issued or agreement is signed whichever is first.

With commercial property, no deposit will be taken until after the land sale is approved by Council. After the sale is approved, full payment shall be made within a reasonable time. Where any other application for the same property is received, full payment shall be made immediately.

Penalty for Failure to Commence.

No penalty shall be levied for failure to comply with the above provided a letter can be submitted by the applicant showing that he applied for a loan and was turned down or that the loan is still being processed.

In special cases the Assessor may vary the above but in general it shall only be done where there is written evidence from some financial organization of applicant's intention to proceed with construction.

In all other cases, a 10% penalty of the total sale price shall apply. Reports on building permits issued and status of properties shall be submitted in Jun, July, August and September.

## LOGARITHMS.

In converting whole numbers to Logs. the characteristic of the log. has 1 Number or digit in front of the decimal less than the number of digits in the whole number.

In cases where there is no whole No. the characteristic is one more than the number of zeros to the right of the decimal point.-but the characteristic is, of course minus.

e.g. 467.4 -- log 2.6697  
983600. -- log 5.9929  
.000419 -- ~~4~~.6222  
.048365 -- log 2.6845  
.674 -- log 1.8287  
4.19 ~~2~~-log .6222  
.00419 -- log 3.6222

Conversely in converting logs to whole numbers, if characteristic has 2 digits in front of decimal the whole number has 3 digits;

Again where the characteristic is minus one zero less than the characteristic is placed to the right of the decimal.

## Business Tax Rates - 1948

(a) banks, or banker, railway company, common carrier, veterinarian, physician, surgeon, barrister, lawyer, express company, civil engineer, chiropractor, optician, dentist and agent or such like occupations or professions shall pay 10% of the rental value.

(b) sholesale merchant or a wholesale grain dealer, or of a grain elevator, shall pay 8.5%.

(c) restaurant, theatre, taxi stand, hotel, having beer parlor, billiard parlor, pool room or bowling alley, shall pay 7%.

(d) retail merchant, shall pay 5.5%

(e) hotel keeper without a beer parlor and printers and publishers and chicken hatcheries and laundries shall pay 4.5%.

(f) mechanic, barber, beauty parlor, nursing home or manufacturer shall pay 3%.

## Business Tax

7. (a) Every person carrying on the business of a bank, or banker, railway company, common carrier veterinarian, physician, surgeon, barrister, lawyer express company, civil engineer, chiropractor, optician, dentist and agent, or such like occupations or professions, shall pay ten and one-half percent (10½%) of the rental value.

(b) Every person carrying on the business of a wholesale merchant, wholesale grain dealer, grain elevator, restaurant, theatre, taxi stand, hotel, billiard parlor, pool room or bowling alley, retail merchants, printers, and publishers, chicken hatcheries, laundries, mechanics, barbers, beauty parlors or nursing homes, shall pay eight and one-half per centum (8½%) of the annual rental value.

(c) Every person carrying on business of a manufacturer exclusively shall pay four and one-half per centum ( $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ ) of the rental value.

In Red Deer the business tax is based on rental value which is derived from current assessed valuations.

The total assessed valuation of land and improvements is taken at 100% (no allowance for depreciation) and 10% of this figure is the yearly rental value of the building. The business occupying the building pay tax according to their classification.

I might add Motels and Auto Courts are on the same basis. In Red Deer we do not assess machinery in Industrial plants.

BY-LAW NO. 143.

A by-law to appoint Commissioners to carry on the departments and sub-departments of the business of the City of Red Deer and to define their duties.

THE TOWN OF RED DEER ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:-

1. This by-law shall take effect on the 14th day of November, A.D. 1907.
2. From and after the coming into force of this by-law, the carrying out of all resolutions, orders and by-laws of the Town unless otherwise specially provided for, and all resolutions or orders of any standing or other Committees approved by the Council as well as the general administrations of the affairs of the Town shall be under the direction and control of one or more persons who shall be called the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Red Deer; but nothing in this by-law shall be construed as divesting the Council or the standing or other Committees of the duties or powers vested in them, or of a legislative nature or of the power of initiating, setting forth or delivering any policy or plan of Government of the Town, which duties, powers, policies or plans shall remain vested in the Council or in such committees.
3. Every Commissioner shall before taking office give such security for the performance of his duties as the Council shall require.
4. The Commissioner or Commissioners appointed under this by-law shall be subject to the provisions hereof and shall exercise the powers and perform the duties herein mentioned, subject at all times to the legislative control of the Council.
5. The Commissioner or Commissioners shall have power to suspend any official for

cause and report the same to the Council at its first regular meeting thereafter for the Council to take action.

6. The Commissioner or Commissioners are hereby authorized to make rules and regulations for their own guidance in the Council of their business. A copy of All such rules and regulations shall, immediately after their adoption, be communicated to the Council and filed with the Secretary-Treasurer as well as all amendments thereto.

7. MEETINGS

The Commissioners shall meet at least five days in each week.

8. The Mayor shall preside at all meetings of the Board and in the absence of the Mayor the Board shall elect one of their number to preside. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a full and correct minute of all proceedings at the meetings of the Commissioners.

DUTIES OF THE BOARD

9. The Commissioner or Commissioners, in addition to all other powers and duties conferred or imposed upon them by statute, ordinance or by-laws, are hereby authorized and required under the control and direction of the Council:-

(a) To provide for the assessment and collection of the town taxes, licenses, water rates, sewer rates, and all other rates of the town.

(b) To have care, management, control and direction (except of the Fire Brigade at fires) of the fire department and the apparatus belonging thereto.

(c) To have the care, management control and direction of the waterworks, sewers, and all other Municipal institutions

acquired, erected, installed or operated by the Town.

(d) To have care, management, control and direction of all Town property, works, improvements, roads, streets, lanes, bridges, crossings, sidewalks, culverts, parks and all other property owned or controlled by the Town or over which it has jurisdiction.

(e) To have the care, management, control and direction of the Police Force.

(f) To submit in each year as soon as practicable after the election of the Council for the year, after receiving general instructions from the Council of what plan or policy in matters generally should be considered for the year, and after conference with the various committees their recommendations and estimates of expenditure showing separately that for ordinary expenditure and that under proposed by-laws, or that for other purposes, to be made during such year in all departments in the Town business, and the Council shall consider the same and vote the necessary funds for expenditure such as they decide shall be.

(g) To submit from time to time to the Council additional recommendations and expenditures rendered necessary by oversight or any other sufficient cause, provided that no additional recommendations or expenditures shall be considered or authorized after the rate of taxation for the present year has been struck, unless the amount of such expenditure can be paid out of the current revenue, or is to be paid by the issue of debentures.

(h) To exercise all the executive powers and perform all the executive duties to be exercised by the standing committees.

(i) To give effect by the instrumentality of the proper officer or officers to all by-laws, rules or regulations, or resolutions of the council.

(j) To prepare and have introduced to the Council all such by-laws as may be necessary to carry into effect the reports of the Commissioners that are adopted by the Council.

(k) To see that the persons in office or appointed to office have given or do give the necessary security required of them for the performance of their respective duties.

(l) To present to the council on or before the last regular meeting of the council in November for the information of the Council and the citizens generally, as well as for the guidance of the Commissioners of the following year, a general report of the state of affairs of the Town during the year which have been under their control, or direction, and the expenditures made under their authority or superintendence, such report shall also contain such suggestions in regard to the future actions of the succeeding Commissioners as experience may enable the reporting Commissioners to make.

(m) To examine and report upon all contracts and accounts referred to them, upon all annual estimates and expenditures, upon all proposals for the purchase of debentures or other Municipal securities, and generally to examine and report upon all matter connected with the finances of the Town; and to have the supervision of the books of account, documents and vouchers and all monies, debentures and securities in the Secretary-Treasurer's, auditors, collectors' and assessor's offices, and to see that all duties

and services which ought to be performed by them are fully carried out and to have a general supervision over all licenses issued by the Town.

(n) To have supervision of the Town engineering and over all matters connected with the construction, repairs and improvements of the streets, bridges, crossings, sidewalks, lanes, sewers, watermains, drains and any other encroachments, or obstructions of the same not otherwise provided for, and of the planting and preservation of trees, shrubs, etc. in streets and public places, and shall give effect to such directions as the Council may direct in relation to such works.

(o) To have charge and control of the public market and health, the market square, weight scales, and of all buildings and erections connected with the market, and shall have charge of the sanitary condition of the Town, and make all arrangements and issue such orders for the improvement of the Town as may be approved by the Council and as shall not conflict with any legislation or any by-laws of the Town.

(p) To consider and report all matters connected with the establishment of fire limits, the inspection of buildings with reference thereto, and the prosecution of offenders against such regulations as may be enacted or against any by-laws.

(q) To expend in a proper and judicious manner all appropriations made by the Council for the relief of the poor and infirm.

(r) To exercise a general supervision over all questions in connection with the

present or prospective railways that are or may be of interest to the Town and any question relating to the establishment of any new industry in or adjacent to the Town and shall take any steps that may be deemed advisable toward the encouragement of all such enterprizes and shall report from time to time to the Council as to the measures necessary to secure or assist in any or all of the above objects.

(s) To have control of all firemen, labourers, teamsters, and other workmen, in connection with any department of or employed by the Town with power to hire and discharge them, and cause to be kept a proper account of their time and of the amount of their wages and report the same to the auditor, with the department in which each man has been employed.

(t) To cause all orders for supplies and material and orders for "stores" for any of the departments or work under any money by-laws to be made out in duplicate named or numbered by the estimate department or by-law for which the supplies or material is required in the form provided, the party receiving such order to procure and invoice of such material or supplies mentioned in such order to the official issuing the same within a reasonable time after the receipt of the order to the Auditor so that the same may be charged to the proper account, and to cause notice to be given of the receipt of such supplies and material or used to the proper official.

(u) To have control and direction of all the teams, teamsters, horses, carts, and of those connected with the fire department, but they shall act in conjunction as to the latter with the Chief of the Fire brigade as to where they can be employed to the advantage

of the Town always having due regard to keeping the necessary number of horses near the Fire Hall in case of Fire.

12. No action involving the expenditure of any sum over \$50.00 shall be taken by the Commissioners or by any official in the employ of the Town except upon a motion first made and then passed at a regular meeting of the Commissioners and a minute thereof duly entered in the records, but in no case shall the Commissioners or any one else have the power to expend or authorize the expenditures of any monies not ordered by the Council or for any service where no appropriation has been made or where any appropriation has been exhausted.

13. At all meetings of the Commissioners the Mayor must be present and shall vote on every motion made at such meeting and if he shall vote in the negative the motion shall be vetoed until and unless approved by the Council, and the Mayor shall report to the Council all motions so vetoed by him.

14. The Commissioners shall make a report in writing of the work done by them or of any recommendation to every regular meeting of the Council; and at least once a month such report shall contain or have annexed to it a full statement of the expenditure and liability involved during the preceeding month for each department, such statement to show also the unexhausted appropriation in connection with such department, a copy of such report or of any report to be laid before any special meeting, shall be in the hands of each Councillor or on his desk before the opening of the meeting. The reports of the Commissioners containing any recommendations shall contain separate and numbered clauses with respect to

each matter.

After being read by the Council and when any clause is ready for consideration the presiding officer shall put the question, "Shall clause No. be discussed?" a vote shall be taken without any debate and if the majority decide in the negative the presiding officer shall declare the clause or any recommendation contained therein carried, otherwise the clause shall be discussed in the usual way.

15. The qualifications of Commissioners as such shall be such as may be fixed by the by-laws of the Council.

16. The Secretary-Treasurer, if he be a commissioner, shall be paid an additional yearly salary of \$1.00. The Mayor as Commissioner shall be paid a yearly salary of \$600.00. by monthly payments.

Any Commissioner not holding any of the above offices shall be paid by monthly payments such salary per year as the Council may fix by resolution or by-law.

17. All by-laws or parts of by-laws inconsistent with the provision of this by-law while this by-law remains in operation are hereby suspended from the day of this by-law coming into effect until such time as the Council may determine to abolish operations by Commissioners under this by-law.

18. The word "Mayor" where-ever the same occurs in this by-law shall include the Acting Mayor.

Done and passed in Open Council this 14th day of November, A.D. 1907.

BY-LAW NO. 13.

A by-law to regulate the proceedings of the Municipal Council of the Town of Red Deer, and the officers and committees thereof.

THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF RED DEER ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

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1. The Council shall meet on the first Wednesday in each month during the year at eight o'clock p.m. unless such Wednesday is a public or civic holiday in which case the Council shall meet at the same hour on the next day following which is not a holiday.

2. The Mayor may at any time summon a special meeting of the Council; and it shall be his duty to summon a special meeting whenever requested in writing to do so by a majority of the members of the Council.

In case of the absence or death of the Mayor, or head of the Council a special meeting of the Council may be summoned at any time by the clerk upon a special requisition to him signed by a majority of the members of the Council.

3. As soon after the hour of meeting as there shall be a quorum present, the Mayor shall take the chair, and call the members to order.

4. In case the Mayor does not attend within fifteen minutes after the time appointed, the clerk shall call the members to order, and if a quorum be present, a chairman shall be chosen who shall preside during the meeting, or until the arrival of the Mayor.

5. If there be no quorum present within half an hour after the time appointed for the meeting, the clerk shall call the roll and take down the names of the members then present, and the

Council shall stand adjourned until the next day of meeting, subject to the provisions of section 2 of this by-law.

6. Immediately after the mayor shall have taken his seat the minutes of the preceeding meeting shall be read by the clerk, in order that any mistake therein may be corrected by the Council and signed by the Mayor or Chairman.

7. The Mayor shall preserve order and decorum, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the council, and in the absence of the Mayor the Chairman shall have the same authority while presiding at the meeting as the Mayor would have had if present.

8. When the Mayor is called upon to decide a point of order or practice, the point shall be stated without unnecessary comment, and the Mayor order shall cite the rule or authority applicable to the case.

9. The Mayor may vote with the other members on all questions, and any question on which there is an equality of votes shall be deemed to be negatived.

10. If the Mayor desires to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate or otherwise, he shall call on some other member of the council to fill his place until he resumes the chair.

11. Every member, previous to speaking to any question or motion, shall rise from his seat, uncovered, and shall address himself to the Mayor.

12. When two or more members rise to speak, the Mayor shall name the member who, in his opinion, first rose from his seat; but a motion may be made that any member who has risen "be now heard" or "do now speak".

13. Every member who is present in the Council chamber when a question is put, shall vote thereon, unless the Council shall excuse him, or unless he is personally interested in the question, provided such interest is resovable into a personal pecuniary profit, or is peculiar to that member, and not one in common with the interests of the citizens at large, and in such cases he shall not vote. If a member votes contr ry to this rule his name should be struck out of the division list upon a motion that "the vote of Councillor---- be disallowed."

14. When the mayor is putting the question no member shall walk across or out of the room, or make any noise or disturbance; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member pass between him and the chair, or interrupt him, except to raise a point of order. The Mayor or chairman shall rise and stand while putting the question.

15. A member called to order from the chair, shall immediately sit down, but may afterwards explain; the council, if appealed to shall decide the case, but without debate, if there be no appeal the decision of the Mayor shall be final.

16. No member shall speak disrespectfully of His Majesty the King, or any of the Royal Family, or of the Governor General, Lieutenant Governor, or person administering the Government of the Dominion or of this provice; nor shall he use offensive words in or against the council or against any member thereof; nor shall he speak beside the question in debate; and no member shall reflect upon any vote of the council except for the purpose of moving that such vote be rescinded; nor shall he resist the rules of the Council, or disobey the decision of the Mayor of of the Council on the questions of order or practice or upon

the interpretation of the rules of the Council, and in case any member shall so resist or disobey, he may be ordered by the Mayor to leave his seat for that meeting, but in case of ample apology being made by the offender, he may by vote of the council, be permitted forthwith to take his seat.

17. Any member may require the question or motion under discussion to be read at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member while speaking.

18. No member shall speak more than once to the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech which may have been misconceived; and in doing so he is not to introduce new matter. A reply is allowed to a member who has made a substantive motion, but not to any member who has moved an order of the day, an amendment, the previous question, or an instruction to a committee. No member without leave of the council shall speak to the same question, or in reply, for longer than a quarter of an hour.

19. Upon a division of the Council, the names of those who vote for and those who vote against the question shall be entered upon the minutes, not only in the case required by law, but whenever two members shall call for yeas and nays, if so required by any councillor "previous to the question being finally put".

20. All inquiries shall be in writing, and shall be handed to the clerk of the council at least two clear days before the day of the meeting at which such inquiry is to be made; and the answer to such enquiry shall also be put in writing and handed to the Mayor or other presiding officer at least one hour before the meeting, and shall be read by him from the chair.

21. No person except members and officers of the council shall be allowed to come within the bar during the sittings of the council without the permission of the Mayor or an alderman.

22. The members of the council shall not leave their places on adjournment until the Mayor leaves the chair.

23. No standing rule or order of the Council shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

24. In all unprovided cases in the proceedings of the council or in committee, the law of Parliament shall be followed.

25. One day's notice shall be given of all motions for introducing new matter other than matter of privilege and bringing up petitions, unless the council dispense with such notice by a vote of two-thirds of the members present without debate.

26. All motions shall be in writing and seconded before being debated or put from the chair, but motions to adjourn or go into committee of the whole may be viva voce. When a motion is seconded it shall be read, or is viva voce, stated by the Mayor before debate.

27. After a motion is read or stated by the Mayor, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the council, but may, with permission of the council, be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.

28. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment of the main question.

29. A motion to adjourn the council, or to adjourn the debate shall always be in order,

but no second motion to the same effect shall be made until after some intermediate proceedings shall have been made.

30. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, unless (1) to commit it; (2) to amend it; (3) to lay it on the table; (4) to postpone it indefinitely; (5) to postpone it for a certain time; (6) to adjourn it; (7) to move the previous question; these several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are named and the last five shall be neither amendable or debatable.

31. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment of the main question, and shall be put without debate, in the following words: "That this question be now put"; if this motion be resolved in the affirmative, the original question is to be put forthwith, without any amendment or debate; but if the previous question is resolved in the negative, the main question may then be debated and amended.

32. Amendments shall be put in the reverse order to that in which they are moved, except in filling up blanks, when the longest time and the smallest sum shall be put first. Every amendment submitted shall be reduced to writing, and shall be decided or withdrawn before the main question is put to vote. Only one amendment shall be allowed to an amendment, and any amendment more than one must be to the main question.

33. In the appointment of any person to any position in the gift of the council, candidates shall be proposed and then voted for by ballot, the balloting papers having been previously prepared and initialed by the clerk, the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes being dropped after each vote until only two remain, or until one

shall have received a majority of the votes cast. When more than one person is to be elected or appointed, each member of the Council shall be entitled to vote for as many as there are positions to be filled. Any candidate receiving a majority of the ballots cast shall be elected. If more than one ballot is necessary, the candidate having the smallest number of votes on the preceeding ballot shall be dropped. Where appointments as required by Statute to be made by by-law, such by-law shall contain the names chosen by ballot as aforesaid, and such by-law shall be subject to amendment by the council after the election of candidates by ballot as hereinbefore provided.

When the question under consideration contains distinct propositions the vote upon each proposition shall, upon the question of any member, be taken separately.

34. No member of the council, while retaining his seat therein, shall be eligible for any office to which there is attached any salary, remuneration or emolument payable by the council.

35. After a question is finally put by the Mayor, no member shall speak to the question, nor shall any other motion be made until after the result of the vote has been declared, and the decision of the Mayor as to whether the question has been finally put, shall be conclusive.

36. Whenever the Mayor is of opinion that a motion is contrary to the rules and privileges of the council, he shall apprise the members thereof immediately, befor putting the question and shall cite the rule or authority applicable to the case, without argument or comment.

37. Whenever any matter of privilege arises, it shall immediately be taken into consideration.

38. Members having been previously summoned shall immediately take their places when any division is called for, and shall remain in their places until the Mayor or chairman has declared the result of the division.

39. Whenever it shall be moved and carried that the council shall go into committee of the whole, the Mayor shall leave the chair, but he shall first appoint a chairman of the committee of the whole, who shall maintain order in the committee and shall report the proceedings thereof.

40. The rules of the council shall be observed in the committee of the whole, so far as may be applicable, except that no motion shall be required to be seconded, nor shall a motion for a previous question, or for an adjournment to be allowed; and in taking the yeas and nays the names of the members shall not be recorded nor shall the number of times of speaking on a question be limited. Provided however that no member shall speak more than twice until every member who desires to do so shall have spoken.

41. Questions of order arising in committee of the whole shall be decided by the chairman, subject to an appeal by any member of the council. If any disorder should arise in the committee the Mayor shall resume the chair without question being put.

42. On motion in committee of the whole to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

43. A motion in the committee of the whole to rise without reporting, or that the chairman leave the chair, shall always be in order, and shall have precedence of any other motion, on such motion debate shall be allowed and, on an

affirmative vote, the subject referred to the committee shall be considered as disposed of in the negative, and the mayor shall resume the chair, and proceed with the next order of business.

44. Every by-law shall be introduced upon motion for leave, specifying the title of the by-law, or upon motion to appoint a committee to prepare and bring in the by-law.

45. No by-law shall be introduced either in blank, or in an imperfect shape.

46. The question "that this by-law be now read a first time" shall be decided without amendment or debate, and every by-law shall be read a second time, and then considered in committee of the whole, and shall be read a third time before it is signed by the Mayor.

47. Every by-law (unless previously reported upon by a committee, or otherwise determined by the council) shall be referred, after the second reading thereof, to a standing, or select committee of the council to report upon the leading features of the same.

48. Every by-law shall receive three several readings, and on different days, previous to it being passed, except on urgent and extraordinary occasions, and upon a vote of two-thirds of the members present, when it may be read twice or thrice, or advanced two or more stages in one day.

49. The clerk shall endorse all by-laws read in council the dates of the several readings thereof, and shall be responsible for the correctness of such by-laws should they be amended.

50. In proceedings in committee of the whole

upon by-laws such clause shall be considered in its proper order, then the preambe and then the title.

51. All amendments made in committee of the whole shall be reported by the chairman of the Council, which shall receive the same forthwith. After the report has been received, the by-law shall be open to debate and amendment before it is ordered for a third reading.

52. Every by-law which has passed the Council shall, immediately after being sealed with the seal of the corporation, and signed by the Mayor, be deposited with the clerk for security in the safe connected with his office.

53. Every petition, remonstrance, or other written application intended to be presented to the Council must be fairly written on paper or parchment, and signed by at least one person, and no letters, affidavits, or other documents shall be attached to it.

54. Every petition, remonstrance, or other written application may be presented to the council by any member thereof, who shall examine the same and be answerable that it does not contain any impertinent or improper matter, and that the same is respectful and temperate in its language; he shall also endorse thereon the name of the applicant and the substance of such application, and sign his name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Mayor, unless a member shall require the reading of the document, in which case the whole shall be read.

55. All petitions or other written communications on any subject within the cognizance of any standing committee shall, on presentation be considered as referred to the proper committee without any motion, unless otherwise ordered; and no member shall speak upon, nor shall a

debate be allowed upon, the presentation of a petition or other communication to the Council; but a member may move that in referring a petition or other communication certain instructions may be given by the Council, or that the petition or communication shall be referred to a select committee; and if the petition complain of some present personal grievance, requiring immediate remedy, the matter contained therein may be brought into immediate discussion and disposed of forthwith.

56. Any member may move to take up or refer a communication or a petition made or presented to the Council during the year in which such motion is made, or during the year next preceeding such year, and whether such communication or petition has been referred to a committee and reported upon or not; but no motion shall be in order to take up or refer a communication or petition made or presented at any time before the commencement of the year next preceeding such motion.

57. All standing or select committees shall be appointed on a motion of a member, and any member of the council may be placed on a committee, notwithstanding the absence of such member at the time of his being named upon such committee, and the Mayor shall be ex officio a member of every standing or select committee.

58. There shall be annually appointed, at the first meeting of the newly elected council the following committees, which shall compose the standing committee of the council:-  
The Executive committee; the committee on works; committee on licenses; committee on fire and light; committee on property; the committee on legislation; the Reception committee; and the council shall also at the said meeting appoint from among the members

of the council, the persons who shall compose the Local Board of Health.

59. Every member who shall introduce a by-law, petition or motion upon any subject, which may be referred to a select committee shall be one of the committee, without being named by the council and shall, unless he otherwise determine, be chairman of such committee.

60. In all committees the majority shall form a quorum.

61. The members of each standing committee of the Council shall meet at the Town Hall for the purpose of organization within three days after their appointment, at such hour as the mayor may direct.

62. The members of each standing committee shall at their first meeting elect from among themselves a chairman, and shall immediately thereafter determine the days and hours of their future regular meetings.

63. Special meetings of standing committees may be called by the Chairman whenever he shall consider it necessary to do so, and it shall be the duty of the chairman, or, in case of his illness or absence from the Town it shall be the duty of the clerk of the council, or the clerk of the standing committee (if a special clerk shall have been appointed in that behalf) to summon a special meeting of the committee whenever requested in writing to do so by a majority of the members composing it.

64. A special or select committee may be at any time appointed on motion of a member of the council by a majority vote of the members of the council present at any meeting thereof, but no such special

or select committee shall be appointed unless and until notice thereof, specifying the matters to be dealt with by such committee, and the names of the members thereof, shall have been given at a previous meeting of the council.

55. Members of the council may attend the meetings of any of its committees, but shall not be allowed to vote; nor shall they be allowed to take part in any discussion or debate, except by the permission of the majority of the members of the committee.

## OVER 70 YEARS OF AGE

### Old Age Security:

Pension: \$40 a month paid by the Government of Canada. Requirements: Age of 70 years or over. Must be a resident of Canada for 20 years or its equivalent. This is a universal pension without a means test. An application for this form of pension should be made to the Regional Director, Old Age Security, Mercantile Building, Edmonton.

## 65 - 69 YEARS

### Old Age Assistance:

Assistance up to \$40 a month provided on a 50-50 basis in agreement with the Government of Canada and the Government of Alberta. Full cost of administration is borne by the Province.

Requirements: Between the ages of 65 and 69 years and must be a resident of Canada for 20 years or its equivalent. This assistance is granted under a means test. Full cost of administration is borne by the Province.

## BLIND PERSONS ALLOWANCE

An allowance up to \$40 a month, 75 percent of which is recoverable from the Government of Canada.

Requirements: Must have attained the age of 21 years and resided in Canada for ten years or its equivalent. The allowance is granted under a means test. Full cost of administration is paid by the Alberta Government.

## SUPPLEMENTARY ALLOWANCE

An allowance up to \$15 a month is paid to those recipients of Old Age Security who formerly were awarded a pension under the former Old Age Pensions Act. It is also available to other recipients of Old Age Security under a means test to persons who have resided in Alberta for the greater portion of the three years immediately prior to the date they were awarded Old Age Security. It is also awarded to recipients of Old Age Assistance under a means test who have resided in Alberta for the greater portion of the three years immediately prior to the date they were awarded the assistance. Those receiving the Blind Persons Allowance may also receive a Supplementary Allowance under a means test if they have resided in the Province for the greater portion of the three years immediately prior to the date they were awarded the allowance.

The entire cost of this allowance is paid by the Province.

## WIDOW'S PENSION

A pension up to \$40 a month is available under a means test to a widow between ages of 60 and 64 years inclusive who has resided in Canada for 20 years or its equivalent and in the Province for the greater portion of the three years immediately prior to the date of application. The full cost of this pension is paid by the Province.

JUNE 15, 1954

### DISABLED PERSONS' PENSION

Pension: Up to \$40 a month may be paid to a person suffering from a chronic or mental disability of at least 12 months' duration if such disability prevents him from accepting gainful employment. Must be a resident of Alberta for the ten years immediately preceding the date of application and must have attained the age of 21 years. This pension is granted under a means test and the entire cost is assumed by the Province. A person who is already receiving a Mother's Allowance, a Widow's Pension, a Blind Person's Allowance or Old Age Assistance is not eligible for this pension.

### HOSPITALIZATION AND TREATMENT SERVICES

A person who is granted assistance under The Old Age Assistance Act, an allowance under The Supplementary Allowances Act, an allowance under The Mothers' Allowance Act or a pension under The Widows' Pensions Act or who receives Old Age Security if his total income is less than \$1,000 as a single person or \$1,500 as a married person may be provided with hospitalization and treatment services at the expense of the Province. Such services include public ward accommodation in a hospital together with necessary drugs, dressings, X-ray and orthopaedic treatments while in hospital; dental services and half the cost of new dentures; treatment by eye specialist, glasses, and special services as approved by the Director of Hospital Services.

### APPLICATIONS

With the exception of the Old Age Security all applications and enquiries for these forms of assistance should be made to the Superintendent of the Pensions Branch, Department of Public Welfare, Edmonton. ●
