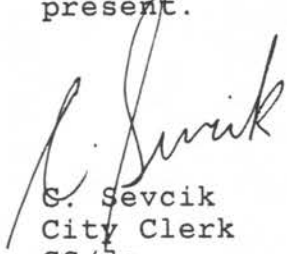

The 88 Red Deer Rustlers have done exceptionally well this year, however the cost in time and money on our part has far exceeded a reasonable amount for any company to give to an amateur sport. We have been fortunate in receiving some support in various ways from many of the businesses in Red Deer for which we are extremely grateful.

The attached letter from the Red Deer Rustler Hockey Club dated April 12, 1989 and addressed to Mayor McGhee is self-explanatory. My comments on this request are as follows:

1. Indeed, the Rustlers have done well this year and have provided good entertainment to the citizens of Red Deer and Central Alberta. However, I could not recommend support of this request, in any respect, as every sports group that has a tournament, and every club that produces a play or a concert, could advance exactly the same argument.
2. All of our recreation and culture facilities are already heavily subsidized. We budget for and depend on this revenue only to maintain a 50 percent recovery in them.
3. No consideration should be given to such a request without an audited financial statement to verify the statements given.
4. If the City was to forgive these fees the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association would be the major benefactor, as 70 percent of the gate receipts, after facility expenses, goes to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association with only 30 percent going to the Hockey Club.

I would recommend that the Recreation Parks & Culture Board recommend to City Council denial of the Hockey Club's request.

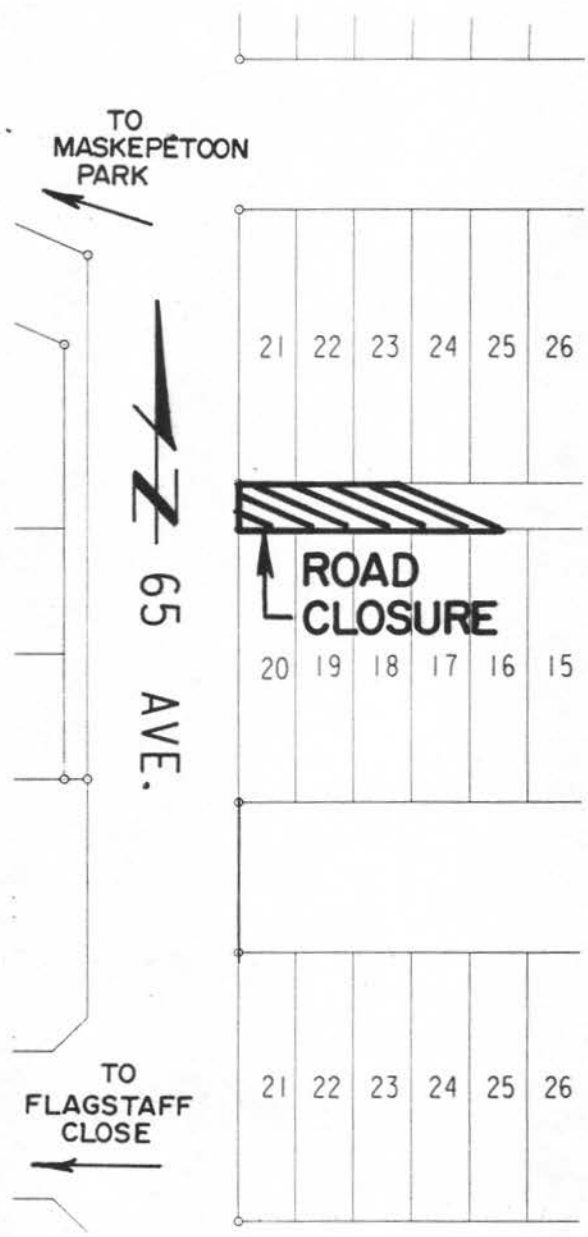

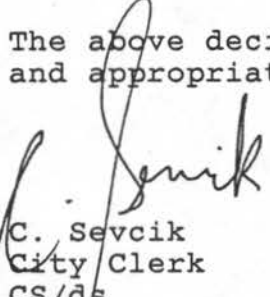

The above decisions of Council are submitted for your information and appropriate action.

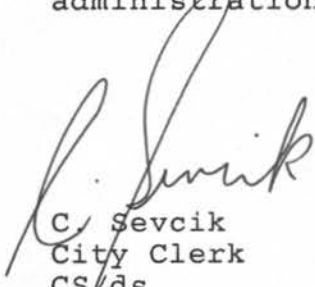

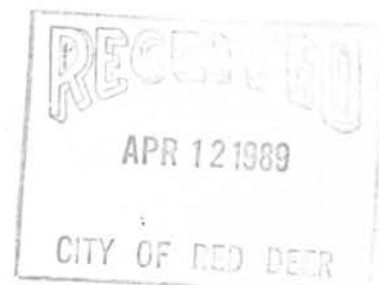
Please set in motion the process of resolutions' development and submit them prior to June 16, 1989. After this date, resolutions will be returned in accordance with the procedures for late resolutions.

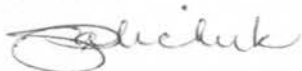

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES PROGRAM

WHEREAS the Family and Community Support Services Program is currently administered through the Provincial Department of Health; and

WHEREAS Family Initiatives is located in the Provincial Department of Family and Social Services under two ministers; and

WHEREAS the objectives and thrust of the Family and Community Support Services Program are more closely related to the Family Initiatives of the Provincial Government;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Family and Community Support Services Program be administered under the Department of Family and Social Services and closely co-ordinated with Family Initiatives.

Background

In the fall of 1988, the Provincial Government announced that it would give greater emphasis to the importance of the family in our society by means of appointing a Minister responsible for family issues. The Hon. Jim Dinning was given this responsibility in addition to his responsibility as Minister of Education.

In learning more about the thrust of the Family Initiatives program, local F.C.S.S. personnel became aware of the similarity of this thrust with the objectives of Family and Community Support Services Programs across the Province. Increasingly, local municipal F.C.S.S. programs have identified the similarities and are becoming more concerned about the possibility of fragmenting the efforts by having F.C.S.S. administered under one department, and Family Initiatives administered under a separate department.

With the revisions made to the cabinet following the 1989 Provincial election, the responsibility for Family Initiatives was moved to the Social Services Department, which became the Department of Family and Social Services. As a result of this move, it would seem appropriate to also consider where the Family and Community Support Services Program might more logically be located. It would seem appropriate to resolve this issue by moving the Family and Community Support Services Program from the Department of Health to the new Department of Family and Social Services.

WHEREAS a number of municipalities provide fire fighting and rescue services to the Government of Alberta on Provincial Highways, and

WHEREAS the municipalities have set fees to recover their costs associated with providing this service, and

WHEREAS the Department of Highways in their policy statement agree to pay the reasonable costs to a municipality for providing this service, and

WHEREAS the Department of Highways have arbitrarily introduced a fee schedule which does not allow for the recovery of costs in providing this service,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association request the Government of Alberta enter into contracts with each municipality providing this service on provincial Highways in order to establish individual fee schedules that reflect the cost of the service provided.

WHEREAS the Municipal Government Act, Section 168(6) allows a Municipal Council to fix the fees that may be charged in respect to ambulance services, and

WHEREAS for the past number of years, the majority of ambulance services have charged fees based on negotiations between the Alberta Ambulance Operators Association and Alberta Blue Cross, and

WHEREAS effective July 1988, Alberta Blue Cross in conjunction with the Minister of Health have arbitrarily reduced the fees normally paid to ambulance services, and

WHEREAS Alberta Blue Cross has cancelled direct billing privileges for ambulance services who fix fees in excess of Blue Cross rates, and have refused to allow form of assignment to Blue Cross subscribers, and

WHEREAS the Minister of Social Services has arbitrarily reduced the fees paid for ambulance services for their clients,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association request the Government of Alberta and Alberta Blue Cross to respect fee schedules as previously negotiated with the Alberta Ambulance Operators Association and its members.

CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS PROCEDURES

1. Preparation of Resolutions

Care should be taken by the sponsors of resolutions intended for consideration at the AUMA Annual Convention to ensure that they meet the following criteria.

- a) Resolutions must address a topic of concern to municipalities throughout the province. (Local concerns should be addressed specifically to the Board of Directors.)
- b) The preliminary clauses should clearly and briefly set out the reasons for the resolutions.
- c) There should be as few preliminary clauses as possible. If the sponsor believes that the rationale cannot be explained in a few preliminary clauses, the problem shall be more fully stated in a one page supporting narrative attached to the resolution. This material will assist the Resolution Committee (and later the convention body) in understanding the problem, but will not be included within the resolution itself.
- d) The operative clause of the resolution (i.e., the one beginning THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED) must clearly set out what the resolution is meant to achieve, and state a specific proposal for action. Its wording should be straightforward and brief, so that the intent of the resolution is clear. Generalizations should be avoided.
- e) Resolutions may be submitted by any municipality which is a full member of the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association. Each resolution must bear an official endorsement of the sponsor's municipal Council.
- f) Resolutions are to be in the hands of the Executive Director no later than the third Friday in May of each year or such date as may be established by the Executive Director. (For 1989 the Executive Director has delayed the deadline to the THIRD FRIDAY IN JUNE.)

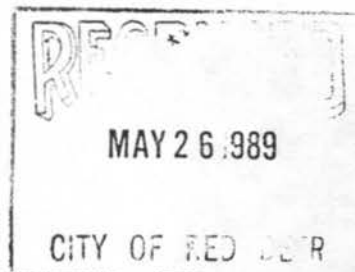

REQUIREMENTS FOR HOSTING
THE 1991 AUMA ANNUAL CONVENTION
September 18 - 21, 1991

Facilities

Due to its growing size and the addition of a 140-booth trade show, the convention has most recently alternated between Calgary and Edmonton. The room requirements include:

- * Banquet facilities for 1200 plus dance floor (approximately 25,000 feet)
- * Trade Show facilities for 150 exhibitors and luncheon space
- * Ideally, six breakout rooms to accommodate approximately 200 people per room at round tables (4000 feet each)
- * Hotel accommodation for 1800: 1200 delegates, 500 exhibitors, and 100 speakers and guests)
- * Up to eight hospitality suites, including one for the partners
- * Registration desks to accommodate 10 staff, telephones and power for computer hookups
- * Five meeting rooms for government departments
- * Meeting room for invited media with telephones
- * Meeting room for AUMA staff and storage
- * Coat check facilities

The fact that if these rooms are some distance from one another, we tend to lose the delegates, must be taken into consideration during the planning stages. The exhibitors at the Trade Show, which helps to support the convention, also demand a prime, one-site location for their exhibits.

Audio Visual

- * Audio visual equipment for as many as six sessions at a time
- * Recording equipment and technicians to record sessions and prepare cassette tapes for sale.
- * Media hookups at all podiums and meeting rooms

Catering

The convention requires catering capabilities to include preparation and service of:

- * Two wine and cheese receptions for up to 1000
- * Luncheon and Breakfast facilities for 1000
- * Banquet facilities for 1200
- * Coffee and tea for 1000+
- * Past Presidents' Dinner for 70

Trade Show

In addition to the room space already discussed, the Trade Show also requires security arrangements and convenient parking for exhibitors.

Host City

The Association has been able to keep the registration fees down because of the generous donations from the host cities for the convention. In addition to \$25,000 in funds, the **Host City** provides the following:

- * Shuttle bus service to and from hotels, and to and from offsite functions
- * Two - three staff/volunteers to assist with set up of the convention office and materials
- * Eight to ten staff/volunteers to man the registration desks including the Partner's registration
- * Four to five staff/volunteers to monitor entrance into meal functions
- * Signage for bus services
- * Entertainment for final banquet

The **Host City**, through a Social Planning Committee, chaired by the Convention Planning Committee Chairman, is also responsible for the social events of the convention, within the budget approved by the Board of Directors. This entails: planning the special events, hiring entertainment for all social activities, and managing the event on-site.

The Social Planning Committee is also responsible for the Partner's Program, including:

- * Planning the program well enough in advance to be included with the convention promotion
- * Arranging events and activities
- * Arranging transportation
- * Staffing the partner's registration desk
- * Staffing the partner's hospitality suite
- * Locating sponsors for partner's totebags and inserts

The **Host City** works closely with the Association to ensure the convention remains a function for the entire AUMA membership and does not become a "host city" function.

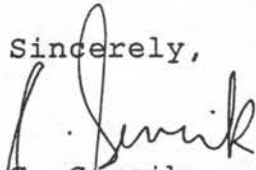

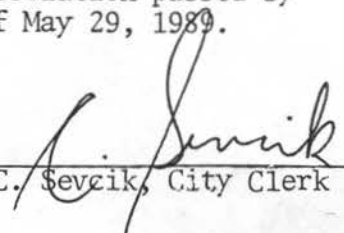

WHEREAS Family Initiatives is located in the Provincial Department of Family and Social Services under two ministers; and

WHEREAS the objectives and thrust of the Family and Community Support Services Program are more closely related to the Family Initiatives of the Provincial Government;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Family and Community Support Services Program be administered under the Department of Family and Social Services and closely co-ordinated with Family Initiatives.

Background

In the fall of 1988, the Provincial Government announced that it would give greater emphasis to the importance of the family in our society by means of appointing a Minister responsible for family issues. The Hon. Jim Dinning was given this responsibility in addition to his responsibility as Minister of Education.

In learning more about the thrust of the Family Initiatives program, local F.C.S.S. personnel became aware of the similarity of this thrust with the objectives of Family and Community Support Services Programs across the Province. Increasingly, local municipal F.C.S.S. programs have identified the similarities and are becoming more concerned about the possibility of fragmenting the efforts by having F.C.S.S. administered under one department, and Family Initiatives administered under a separate department.

With the revisions made to the cabinet following the 1989 Provincial election, the responsibility for Family Initiatives was moved to the Social Services Department, which became the Department of Family and Social Services. As a result of this move, it would seem appropriate to also consider where the Family and Community Support Services Program might more logically be located. It would seem appropriate to resolve this issue by moving the Family and Community Support Services Program from the Department of Health to the new Department of Family and Social Services.

- (b) Consolidate Parcels 1, 10, and 3 with the Owner's lands, and
- (c) Add Parcel 9 (from Block 10) to 64th Avenue, and
- (d) Create titles to Lots 3MR and 4MR in the name of the City, and
- (e) Create titles to the remainder of Parcel 7 (from Block 11) less Lot 3MR in the name of the City for future road.

power and other service connection charges, as may be required by the City, and

- (b) The Owner shall provide to the City a geotechnical report on the stability of the lands lying north of the Red Deer River, and if deemed necessary by the City shall provide to the City an indemnity agreement with respect to the stability and slippage of such lands, satisfactory to the City solicitor, and
- (c) The Owner shall grant any easements necessary for the installation of utilities to service the Owner's development.

16. This agreement shall enure to the benefit of, be binding upon and enforceable by the parties hereto, their respective successors and assigns.

Thank you for your letter of October 21 enquiring about the opportunities for hosting an FCM Conference in Red Deer.

All annual conference dates up to and including 1996 are now spoken for. The first available date is therefore, June 1997. I enclose the full conference schedule.

Municipalities hosting FCM conferences have a number of responsibilities. I enclose a document describing the nature and extent of those obligations. Typically, most of the funds for these responsibilities are raised from the private sector, although the contribution of the host municipalities themselves can be substantial.

Three other considerations will bear upon the Board's decision to accept an invitation. The first is the frequency of conferences in the province or the region scheduled for the same broad time period. The fact that three conferences are already scheduled for the Prairie provinces for the mid-1990's must be kept in mind. Another consideration will be the ease of transportation arrangements. A final consideration will be the capacity of the conference facilities themselves. In this respect, it would be helpful if you would forward to us a detailed description of Red Deer's convention facilities. We will be able to indicate whether or not these meet our requirements quite quickly.

HOST MUNICIPALITY CONFERENCE RESPONSIBILITIES

1. The traditional FCM Annual Conference dates are Friday through Tuesday noon of the first full week in June. The major arrival day is Thursday and the major departure day, Tuesday. Upon receipt of a request from the host municipality, the week preceding or that following the first week in June may be considered as alternatives subject to the approval of the FCM's Executive Committee.
2. The host municipality should be prepared to designate a municipal official or employee (with direct access to the local Chief Executive Officer) to act as local Conference Coordinator. This Coordinator should be available for advance planning prior to the preceding year's Conference, should attend the preceding year's Conference and should be available on a full-time basis from two weeks prior to the Conference through to its conclusion.
3. The host municipality should guarantee the following functions and services.
 - a) Friday evening opening reception for all delegates and partners.
 - b) Saturday luncheon for all delegates.
 - c) Saturday or Sunday banquet for all delegates and spouses (can be replaced by an informal function, such as a barbecue).
 - d) Obtain funding for a banquet or other closing event for Monday evening.
 - e) Special transportation services to supplement normal services as required for delegates' purposes.
 - f) A program of activities for partners.
 - g) Study tours for delegates.
 - h) Coffee service for delegates throughout the Conference.

Any additional host municipality will be welcomed provided that it does not interfere with the objectives of the Conference.

The FCM will not control host municipality expenditures, but will ask potential hosts to spell out proposed host activities in their final bids. The FCM will retain overall coordinating authority over planned host municipality activities and other Conference functions.

4. The host municipality must be able to commit a minimum of 900 first class hotel rooms. These should be located within easy walking distance of Conference headquarters. Alternatively, the host municipality should guarantee adequate transportation for the delegates. All final bookings will be handled by the FCM, and all delegate reservations made through its Secretariat.
5. The host municipality must be able to assure adequate function space in a headquarters hotel or Convention Centre. The following requirements are standard:
 - a) Two large rooms, one of which can accommodate a meeting of 900 persons, and the other for a luncheon to accommodate the same number. These rooms should be booked for the duration of the Conference. (Plenary Sessions).
 - b) Three smaller rooms which can accommodate workshops involving 250 to 300 persons each. These rooms must be booked for the duration of the Conference. (Committees, workshops and meetings).
 - c) One board room which can accommodate meetings of 75 persons. This room should be booked for the first day of the Conference and for the duration of the Conference. (National Board of Directors).
 - d) Three board rooms which can accommodate meetings of 20 persons each. These rooms must be booked for the first day of the Conference and for the duration of the Conference. (Nominations, Resolutions and Executive Committees).
 - e) Two large rooms suitable for the installation of production and Secretariat services. These rooms must be booked for the Wednesday preceding the Conference and through to the following Tuesday. (Secretariat).

- f) One large room to accommodate up to 50 press representatives.

Function space must be provided and booked as specified above. The loss of the use of function space because of a hotel or Conference centre accepting other bookings constrains the convening of special meetings (such as provincial nominating caucuses) which are an integral feature of FCM Conferences.

Function space is usually provided free of charge by the headquarters hotel. Where this space is subject to rental because of the use of a convention centre or the inability of the hotel to meet the requirements, the host will guarantee the rental, insurance and incidental costs incurred.

6. The host must be a direct member of the FCM. A bid by a regional government will only be accepted if the constituent accommodating the Conference is a full member.
7. The host municipal council and partners will be registered on a complimentary basis. In the case of a regional host, this arrangement will apply only to the members of regional council and their partners.

The FCM will make a grant of \$10 per registered delegate and partner, excluding complimentary host delegates to the host municipality.

8. The host municipality for each FCM Annual Conference will be invited to act as host to the FCM's Board and Conference principals (including partners) at a luncheon during the preceding year's Conference.

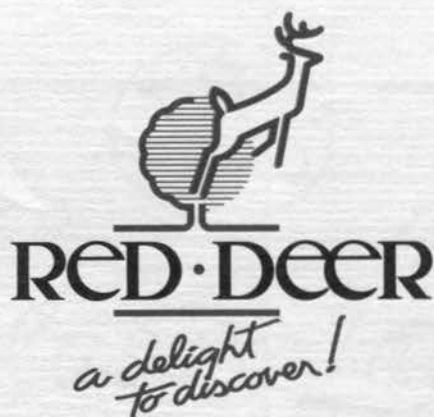

Dear Sirs:

On behalf of the Red Deer Tourist and Convention Board, I wish to bring to your attention an anticipated budget overexpenditure which the board projects for 1989.

The reason for this anticipated overexpenditure is two fold. The majority of this amount relates to postage expenses. Until December 1989, the Board's postage expenses were absorbed by the City. In December, we were advised that effective immediately these costs would be charged back to the Board. We have no difficulty with this decision, except that it was made well after our 1989 budget was developed and submitted. Our postage costs are significant because of the need to mail out various promotion publications, both in bulk and to individuals.

The second item which contributes to the anticipated overexpenditure is the provision of recording secretarial services at Board meetings. Effective July 1, 1989 this service, which we have greatly appreciated, will no longer be provided by the City through the City Clerk's Department. Again we have no quarrel with this decision. However, its timing was such that this item was not included in our budget, and we expect that some additional expenses will be incurred as a result.

We anticipate that the resulting overexpenditure for 1989 will be approximately \$2000, and we wish to bring this to your attention.

OVEREXPENDITURE

When the Red Deer Tourist and Convention Board was first established, City Council agreed to offer certain services to the Association, on an interim basis to assist in their establishment. Included in the package was free accommodation within City Hall, the use of telephones, secretarial service, office equipment, free postage and accounting services. The understanding was that the Tourist and Convention Association would have the use of these services for up to three years, at which time they would make other arrangements.

During this three year period, the Tourist and Convention Association would seek out supplementary funding, which together with funds provided by the City of Red Deer would allow them to become self-sufficient.

In view of the original arrangements, I would recommend that Council approve an over-expenditure for 1989 of approximately \$2000, and advise the Tourist and Convention Association that these two items should be considered in their 1990 budget. I believe the Tourist and Convention Association must make every effort to obtain alternate funding to allow them to become less dependent on the package currently provided by the City of Red Deer.

The attached request from the Red Deer Tourist & Convention Board with respect to an anticipated overexpenditure for postage is not unreasonable and as pointed out by the Dir. of Financial Services will be offset by reduced postage costs in the City Clerks Department. We would, therefore, recommend that Council approve an overexpenditure for postage in an amount up to \$2,000.00.

We have great concerns, however, with respect to the second item which the Board Chairman says will contribute to an anticipated overexpenditure. We are at a loss to see how such an overexpenditure can occur. It is true that effective July 1, 1989, the City Clerks Department will no longer be providing recording secretarial services at Board meetings. However, we are not aware of any committee, board or commission which is not serviced by the City Clerks Department, which has to engage the services of the secretary to take the minutes. To the best of our knowledge, the minutes are taken by a member of staff who must be present or by a member of the committee. This is provided for in Section 3 of the Bylaws of the Red Deer Tourist & Convention Association which contemplates the Manager acting as secretary and recording the minutes.

For Council's information, typing services for the Board will still be provided by the City.

We would, therefore, recommend that no overexpenditure be approved for this item.

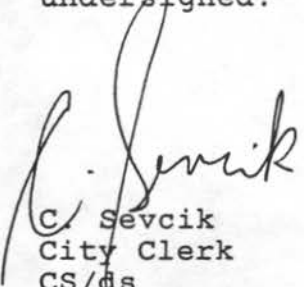

City Council had earlier indicated to your Association and accepted by your Association, an agreement of City financing towards the Agri-Trade project. Included in this financing was a City commitment of \$5.0 million. To finance this amount a borrowing Debenture was approved by City Council.

The Provincial Local Authorities Board has now approved the Debenture. This approval has conditions which we did not contemplate, and which are as follows:

- 1) Tenders for the project being received
- 2) All other funds being used or exhausted

It is anticipated that the City will be unable to borrow any Debenture funds until at least mid-1990 depending on grant advances and tenders awarded.

To overcome some of these difficulties, Council at its meeting of May 15, 1989 authorized the immediate use of \$1.7 million of City funds as part of the \$5.0 million commitment. The \$1.7 million was deposited in the Agri-Trade Centre account on May 16, 1989 from which date interest on same would start.

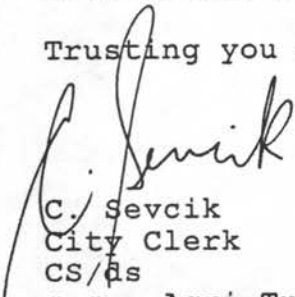

The weather and driving conditions in the first three months of 1989 were worse than the City of Red Deer has experienced for a number of years. The good winters have been accompanied by a reduction in the snow and ice control budgets.

There are a number of variables which influence the snow and ice control budget. These include amount of precipitation, number of snow events, time of day when an event starts, as well as duration. Below is a brief table which illustrates a comparison of the first three months of 1988 and 1989.

	<u>1988</u>	<u>1989</u>
Number of events	24	30
Number of events - snow +2cm	8	16
Total accumulation	71.6cm (30cm - 1 event)	85.2cm
Sanding material used	2750 tonnes	4979 tonnes

The first three months of 1989 included a snow removal on arterial roadways, bus routes, and downtown, which cost \$140,000.

Up to the end of April, 1989, \$478,717 has been spent of a total budget of \$488,120. We will need to do snow and ice control for October, November, December. We anticipate the costs for equipment, labour, sanding materials and salt to be \$250,000.

In addition, the increased snow in 1988/89 presented problems in thawing catchbasins in the spring. In some cases, Public Works crews were required to thaw catchbasins in the same location 3 and 4 times. This would happen when the temperature would drop below freezing overnight and refreeze the catchbasin. Costs in this account are \$61,900, with a budget of \$34,060, an overexpenditure of \$27,840.

Despite the fact that more than 3 times the previous year's sanding material was spread on the streets, it appears at this time, that the spring clean-up will be achieved within the approved budget.

We would respectfully request Council authorize an overexpenditure estimated at \$250,000 to the 1989 budget for snow and ice control, as well, we request approval for the over-expenditure of \$28,000 in catchbasin thawing.

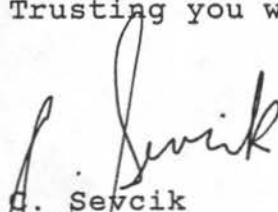

As directed by the Subdivision Committee, we are to approach City Council for authorization to service the remainder of Phase 2 of Deer Park, which we are now calling Phase 2B. Separately, the Land and Tax Department will be submitting their market analysis.


Phase 2B consists of 8 duplex lots and approximately 35 single family lots. We are proposing that this work would be tendered to private contractors with construction starting in July and completion in October. Final lift paving and lane construction would take place in 1990.

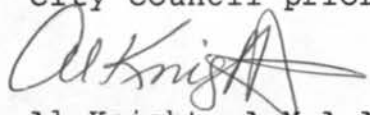

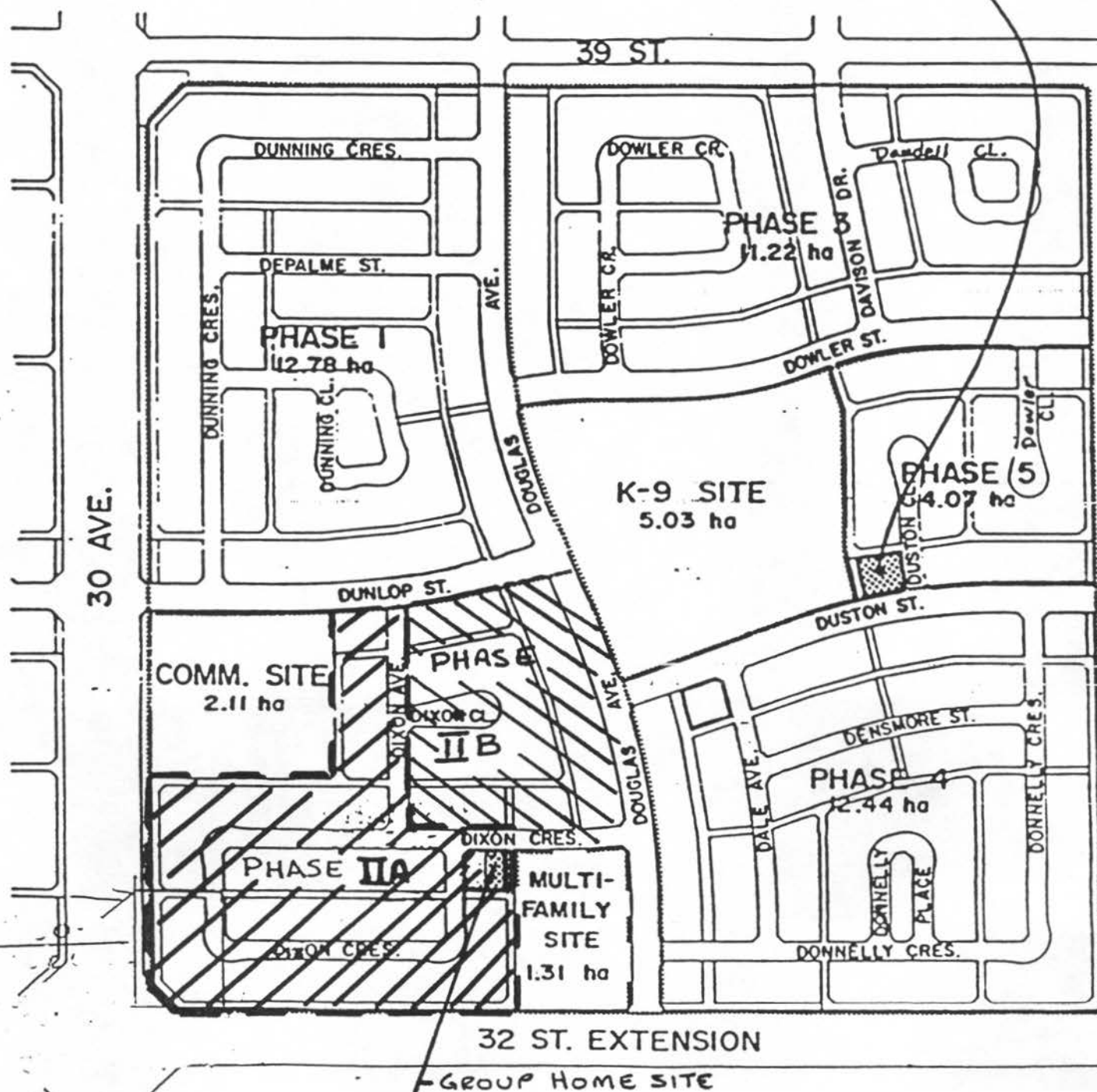

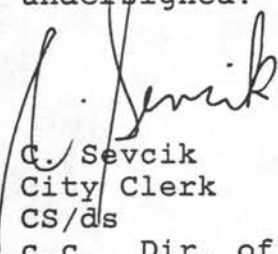

As you know, Canadians today place a higher priority on environmental matters than ever before. Recent surveys indicate that 94 per cent of our fellow citizens are convinced that urgent action by individuals is necessary if our planet is to survive. 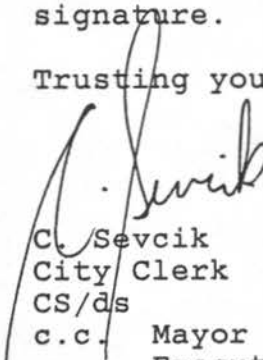

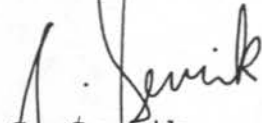

Within the 1989 budget, \$50,000 was allocated to commence the establishment of a Municipal Pavement Management System (MPMS).

We engaged the firm "Pavement Management Systems Limited" to prepare a Pre-Implementation Plan. This report outlines how a MPMS system could be implemented by the City.

What is Municipal Pavement Management System?

MPMS is a computer based pavement management system developed for Alberta Transportation and Utilities for use in Alberta cities. Cities presently using MPMS include St. Albert, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Camrose and Airdrie. Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie and the County of Strathcona are presently at the same stage as Red Deer.

What does MPMS do?

Data is collected on pavements from existing records and through sophisticated data collection vehicles. Structural condition, roughness and visual conditions are evaluated. This data is then fed into the computer where it is stored and sorted through the use of the MPMS software.

What will MPMS give us?

MPMS will provide us with a rating and ranking for our existing pavements based on objective measured data. It will provide cost estimates for maintenance and rehabilitation of pavements. It will also provide a prediction of when future maintenance will be required and the costs associated with future maintenance.

How would MPMS be implemented?

We are recommending a 3 phase implementation.

Phase 1 - 1989 - Data collection and analysis on approximately 60% of existing streets with maintenance and rehabilitation reports generated by the consultant. Cost \$45,000 - \$50,000.

Phase 11 - 1990 - Data collection on remaining streets. Installation of MPMS on a City personal computer with training

of City staff on the running of the data base, rehabilitation and maintenance subsystems. Cost \$35,000 - \$45,000.

Phase 111 - 1991 - Installation of project level subsystem including data collection and training of City staff. This subsystem is used for the design of specific rehabilitation projects. Cost \$25,000 - \$30,000.

Collected data has a shelf life of approximately 3 years which means an annual cost of \$30,000 - \$40,000. Approximately 1/3 to 1/2 the City would be surveyed each year to keep the information current.

Our discussions with Alberta Transportation indicate the initial implementation Phases 1, 11, and 111 would be cost shareable, but that continuing operating costs would not. Phase 1 has been approved by Alberta Transportation for funding in 1989.

Council authorization to proceed with Phase 1 of the Municipal Pavement Management System for 1989 is respectfully requested.

Representatives of Pavement Management Systems Limited, will be in attendance to provide council with a brief overview of the MPMS system.

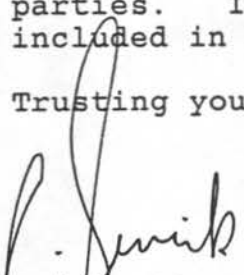

The near term measures implementation status are outlined in the following:

1) Convert the yellow meters from 2 to 1 hour at 40 cents/hour

Approximately 433 meters need to be converted at an estimated costs of \$9,400. This is less than the \$22,000 provided in the Parking Commission budget.

2) Change all on street meters to 40 cents / hour

Approximately 430 meters need to be changed at an estimated costs of \$9,400. This is less than the \$41,000 provided in the Parking Commission budget.

3) Install a ticket dispenser at the Tom Boy Lot.

Four tenders were received for the supply of the ticket dispenser:

CALE - Trafco, St. Albert, Alberta.	\$11,995
TICFAC - Curlette, Calgary.	\$12,792
SCHLUMBERGER - Blouin, Brassard, Quebec.	\$13,880
DYNAMETER - Interprovincial, Vancouver, B.C.	\$15,450

The installation costs were estimated to be \$2,200.

All other City Lot parking ticket dispensers are of the TICFAK type. To minimize public confusion and to facilitate ease of maintenance, we would recommend TICFAK be purchased.

Based on the tender received, the total implementation cost of this item is estimated to be \$14,800. This exceeded the \$8,000 provided in the Parking Commission budget.

4) Install 10 hour meters @ 25 cents / hour

These parking meters are to be installed at approximately 415 free parking stalls west of 48 Avenue and south of 54 Street.

The lowest tender (\$415 / meter) received for the supply of parking meters were received from Trafco of St. Albert, Alberta. The installation costs were estimated to be \$20 / meter.

Based on the tender received, the total implementation cost of this item is estimated to be \$228,000. This exceeded the \$207,000 provided in the Parking Commission budget.

5) Sports World Lot Reconstruction

Based on the conceptual layout indicated in the Long Term Parking Strategy Report, two options were prepared for the review of the Committee. Layout 2 differs from Layout 1 in that Layout 2 closes the eastern access to the Lot and replaced it with 6 additional parking stalls. The northern Lot will be paved and the southern Lot will be finished in gravel.

Based on this detailed design, the total implementation cost of this item is estimated to be \$26,200. This is less than the \$30,000 provided in the Parking Commission budget. However,

Parking Commission may wish to pave the southern half of the Lot at an additional cost of \$28,800.

6) Net effect on budget

The above tender and cost estimates would result in a 2.8% (\$8,600) net increase from the original budget.

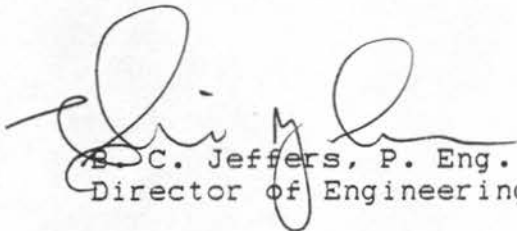
7) Schedules

Depending on when the Parking Manager is hired, and depending on the Parking Manager's direction, the impementation schedule could be as follows:

- The supplier has indicated that the TICFAK ticket dispenser can be delivered in 30 days. Upon the delivery of the machine, construction and installation would take approximately 1 month.
- The parking meter rate increases and conversion from 2 hour to 1 hour meters would commence within 1 week. Meters at the City Centre would be converted first.
- The supplier has indicated the 10 hour meters can be delivered in 75 days. New meters would be installed after the meter rate conversions are completed.
- Sports World Lot construction would be completed around August.

8) Directions required from the Parking Commission

- Approval for the purchase and installation of the TICFAK parking ticket dispenser for the Tom Boy Lot.
- Approval for the purchase of the 10 hour meters.
- Direction for the construction of either Layout A or Layout B of the Sports World Lot.
- Direction on whether the Sports World Lot should be paved or gravelled.
- Approval of the overall budget over-expenditure of \$8,600.

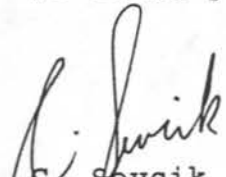

1. In December 1987, provincial authorities approached The City of Red Deer to determine if there was any interest in the use of the Old Provincial Building for some community purpose. In February 1988, the City responded, indicating interest in using the building to accommodate community, non-profit organizations in the downtown area. Provincial authorities responded, indicating that they would be prepared to lease the building to the City for a 25-year term, at a nominal rent of \$1.00 per annum. The City would be responsible for all necessary upgrading and maintenance, and would sub-lease the building to the various community service organizations.
2. In July 1988, the Social Planning Department contracted with Bearden Engineering Limited to do a preliminary study of the facility. They were to report on the condition of the structure and the mechanical systems, and provide preliminary estimates for the cost of renovations and ongoing maintenance. This report was completed in September 1988.
3. In November 1988, the Social Planning Department prepared a preliminary response for the use of the Old Provincial Building as a Community Services Centre. The proposal provided improved accommodation for the Senior Citizens Downtown House and a storefront location for the Community Information & Referral Service.

The proposal was similar in concept to the Montfort Community Services Centre which closed down in June 1988. It was a highly successful venture, providing accommodation for social service agencies, thereby, allowing them to share resources and work together more cooperatively. The Montfort Centre was self financing, in that the rents paid over the six-year period covered all operating and capital costs of the facility.

The proposal was supported by the F.C.S.S. Board, and considered by City Council at its meeting on November 14th, 1988, when the following resolution was adopted:

"RESOLVED that Council of The City of Red Deer, having considered various reports and correspondence relative to the Old Provincial Building/Downtown House - proposed Community Services Centre, hereby endorse the concept of leasing the Old Provincial Building for development as a Community Services Centre, subject to a more detailed cost analysis and feasibility study, and as presented to Council November 14th, 1988."

4. In March 1989, the City received a \$4,700 grant from the Province, under the Community Facility Enhancement Program. This enabled the Social Planning Department to work with Bearden Engineering Limited to complete a detailed feasibility study for the project.

The feasibility study is now complete, and tenants would include the Senior Citizens Downtown House, the Community Information & Referral Service, the Family Service Bureau, the Sexual Assault Centre and the Red Deer Action Group for the Physically Disabled.

The cost of renovations has increased to \$253,300, largely as the result of the need for installing an elevator to the upper floor. It is envisaged that \$128,300 of this sum will be recovered through rental rates, with the balance being obtained through a variety of grant programs. The ongoing operation of the facility would be fully self supporting, although, it is assumed at this stage that the City would support an application by the tenants for exemption of the facility from property taxes.

5. I strongly support the concept of the Community Services Centre for the following reasons:
 - It will enable a number of Community Services agencies to share resources and cooperate with one another. This synergistic relationship should result in improved services, at no additional expense.

- It will provide resources and support for a number of smaller community organizations, i.e., the Sexual Assault Centre and the Red Deer Action Group for the Physically Disabled.
- It will provide an improved facility for the Senior Citizens Downtown House. The present location of this facility is unsatisfactory, and further support in the present location should not be contemplated.
- It will provide a storefront location for the Community Information & Referral Service. The present location of this service considerably reduces its potential to serve the community.
- It will be managed by the Family Service Bureau, with direction provided by the Social Planning Department and the F.C.S.S. Board. This concept follows our stated objective of moving toward a greater facilitation role in the community, rather than a direct provider of services.
- It will improve service to the public, and assist in the revitalization of a section of Gaetz Avenue, which has a high vacancy rate.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS

I support the comments of the Social Planning Manager and the F.C.S.S. Board, and recommend that City Council:

- approve the lease of the Old Provincial Building for a period of fifteen years, for development and use as a Community Services Centre;
- approve the funding of \$128,300 for improvements to the building, to be recovered through rental rates over a fifteen-year period, subject to the receipt of a minimum of \$125,000 through a variety of grant programs;

Council members will recall a proposal for the community use of the Old Provincial Building being discussed at the November 14, 1988 regular meeting. At that meeting Council adopted the following motion:

"RESOLVED that Council of The City of Red Deer having considered various reports and correspondence relative to the Old Provincial Building/Downtown House - Proposed Community Services Centre hereby endorse the concept of leasing the Old Provincial Building for development as a Community Services Centre subject to a more detailed cost analysis and feasibility study and as presented to Council November 14, 1988."

Attached is a report prepared by the Social Planning Department giving the requested detailed cost analysis and feasibility study. This proposal was discussed by the F.C.S.S. Board at a special meeting held on May 16, 1989. Board members were enthusiastic about the proposal for the following reasons:

1. It promotes the sharing of resources, information and space by a number of related community, non-profit groups which should result in improved effectiveness of the services and better public awareness and use of the services.

2. It makes good use of a public facility currently under-utilized.
3. It has the potential of strengthening the downtown core.

The F.C.S.S. Board is prepared to give priority to increased funding for Downtown House in the 1990 budget in order to enable them to meet their rent obligations if this project is approved. However, the F.C.S.S. Board is also optimistic that Downtown House may be able to generate additional revenues to cover their increased rent obligations as a result of the move to this new facility.

The F.C.S.S. Board is confident that the Steering Committee for this project will be successful in generating additional funding in the amount of \$125,000 as partial financing for this project. After detailed discussion of the proposal, the Board adopted the following resolution:

"That the Red Deer and District Community Support Services Board having considered a proposal for community use of the Old Provincial Building dated May, 1989 hereby recommend to Council of The City of Red Deer:

I That The City of Red Deer enter into an agreement with the Province of Alberta to lease the Old Provincial Building to be used as a Community Services Centre for a period of 15 years commencing September 1, 1989 subject to the following conditions:

1. That leasehold improvements as per the proposal dated May, 1989 as recommended by Bearden Engineering be approved by both parties subject to securing of the financial grants for the project in the amount of \$125,000.
2. That the lease contain an option to renew for five-year periods following the termination of the lease.
3. That the lease contain a clause requiring either party to give two years notice in the event of termination of the lease.

4. That the Province of Alberta agree to pay back a pro-rated share of the City's capital cost in the event of termination before the 15 year period lapses.

- II That The City of Red Deer give its support for and agree to co-ordinate and facilitate applications by the tenants under the Municipal Tax Exemption Act for exemption of the facility for property tax purposes to take effect two years after the commencement of the lease.

It is the strong recommendation of the F.C.S.S. Board that Council approve of this proposal and enable the project to proceed.

There are a number of items that should be considered regarding the above:

1. Annual Capital Repayment

The figures quoted in the report are based on a monthly repayment schedule. An annual repayment schedule would increase the total annual repayment:

2. Rental Rates

Full occupancy is required to recover operating costs. This would suggest:

- a) There should be an annual escalation factor to cover increases in operating costs, and
- b) Possibly a provision in the rental rates should be provided to cover possible vacancies.

The rental rates per square foot would appear to be low. Normally at least some of the costs of renovations are recoverable from the tenant in addition to the market rental rate. This is not being done. Also the rental rate per square foot usually increases if the area rented is smaller. This has not apparently been considered to the extent it would normally. For example, 360 sq. ft. rents at the same rate per square foot as 1,900 square feet.

The City is being asked to subsidize or assist the facility by:

The City is also being asked to provide \$128,300 financing to be recovered over a 15 year period. If Council considers this funding to be justified, I would recommend it be provided from the capital projects reserve. The reserve would be reimbursed by the annual repayments over the 15 years.

4. Grant Funding

The proposal is based on the assumption there will be \$125,000 in grants approved for the project. The report appears to suggest the project should not proceed until the funding is confirmed. This would be reasonable.

We would support the proposal from the F.C.S.S. Board with respect to providing this facility in a manner similar to Montfort, which operated on a breakeven basis. There are, however, a number of concerns raised by the Dir. of Financial Services which do not appear to have been addressed in the report. We would, therefore, recommend that the report be referred back to the F.C.S.S. Board to address the concerns raised by the Dir. of Financial Services and that Council support the proposal in principle, subject to the facility being operated on a breakeven basis or the deficit being absorbed in the F.C.S.S. Budget.

1. Background

In December, 1987 Provincial authorities approached The City of Red Deer to determine if there was any interest in use of the Old Provincial Building for some community purpose. In February, 1988, the City responded, indicating interest in using the building to accommodate community, non-profit organizations in the downtown area. The Provincial Department of Public Works, Supply and Services indicated their willingness to lease the facility to The City of Red Deer for the purpose stated.

In July, 1988 the Social Planning Department contracted with Bearden Engineering to do a preliminary investigation on the facility and complete a report on the structure, maintenance costs, essential renovations required, and the state of the heating, mechanical and electrical systems. This report was received in September, 1988.

In November, 1988 the Family and Community Support Services Board and Red Deer City Council endorsed the concept and requested a more detailed cost analysis and feasibility study. A Steering Committee, made up of representatives from organizations interested in leasing space in the facility, was formed to develop the concept and estimate costs and sources of funding for the project.

Application was made under the Community Facility Enhancement Program for funds to cover the costs of a feasibility study for this project. In March, 1989 this funding was granted. Bearden Engineering consulted with the various organizations to be housed in the facility and completed its feasibility study in April, 1989. The estimated cost to complete all of the necessary renovations was \$253,300.

2. Facility

The Old Provincial Building is located on the corner of Gaetz Avenue and 51 Street in Downtown Red Deer. The building was built in approximately 1950 to house the Treasury Branch and Liquor Store on the main floor with office space for other Provincial functions on the second floor. After the new Provincial Building was completed in 1983, the facility was used by Alberta Public Works, and portions of the building have been rented to smaller organizations since that time.

The building is 118 feet by 50 feet with three levels. The basement consists mainly of good storage area. The main floor consists of some office space in the east and west ends of the building with a large open area in the middle. The second floor consists of a large number of rooms to be used for offices. Access to the second floor is through separate entrances on the north-east and south-west corners of the building. A service elevator operates between the basement and main floor levels. The stairwells to the second floor are quite narrow and require modification. In addition, a new elevator is necessary to serve the second floor as well.

3. Organizations Interested

In May, 1988 representatives of the Senior Citizen's Downtown House, Community Information and Referral Service, Suicide Prevention Service, Family Service Bureau, Sexual Assault Centre, and the Red Deer Action Group for the Physically Disabled toured the facility. Considerable interest was shown in moving to the facility subject to a reasonable rent being established. Likely, there are other organizations that would be quite interested in leasing space in this facility, particularly if they would be able to share a number of the resources that could be developed such as: a common meeting room, photostating equipment, and possibly secretarial or receptionist time. The Steering Committee is looking into all these aspects of a Community Services Centre.

4. Steering Committee

In November, 1988 a Steering Committee representing the interested organizations was formed to develop the concept of the Community Services Centre and estimate costs and sources of funding for the project. The Steering Committee consisted of the following:

The Steering Committee developed a Purpose and Philosophy statement for the operation of the Community Services Centre. This is attached as Appendix "A".

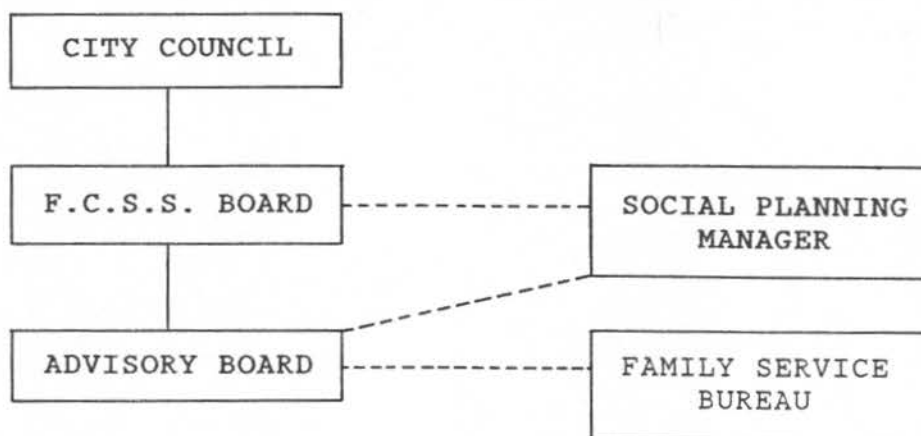
This report is a culmination of the work of this Steering Committee and reflects their collective views on how to proceed with this project.

5. Proposed Operation

The City of Red Deer would enter into a lease with the Provincial Government and the Social Planning Department would co-ordinate this project on behalf of the City. The Family and Community Support Services Board, extensively involved in overseeing the operations of many community, non-profit groups, would provide overall direction for the operation. Representatives from each of the tenant groups would come together to form an advisory board that would make recommendations on policies for the operation of the Community Services Centre. The Family Service Bureau has agreed to provide an administration service looking after this facility.

Included in the cost of operations will be a fee payable to the Family Service Bureau for administration services. This will include a collection of rents, submission of claims to the City, overseeing caretaking services, ensuring security of the facility, and general maintenance.

The organizational chart will be as follows:



6. Feasibility Study (see Appendix "B")

Bearden Engineering met with all of the agencies to be housed in the facility and has drawn up a set of plans showing how all of these needs could be accommodated and an estimate of the cost. A detailed study was submitted and is summarized as follows:

7. Property Taxes

Early in the development of this project it was realized that the property taxes assessed for this facility (\$21,150 - 1988) could not be easily added to the rents. As mentioned previously in a report from Al Knight, City Assessor, this facility would be taxable if the City sub-leases the premises to house community, non-profit groups. Mr. Knight also mentioned the provisions under the Municipal Tax Exemption Act whereby each of the sub-lessees could make application to the Local Authorities Board pursuant to the Municipal Tax Exemption Act for tax exemption of the area or areas that they are utilizing for their purpose.

In correspondence with the responsible provincial department, Alberta Public Works, we were able to obtain a commitment from them to continue paying a grant in lieu of taxes for a period of two years following the commencement date of the lease of the facility. Please refer to Appendix "C".

This commitment to continue paying a grant in lieu of taxes will afford us ample opportunity to make application to the provincial government for an exemption of this facility under the Municipal Tax Exemption Act. It is proposed that The City of Red Deer support the exemption of this facility if it is to become a Community Services Centre.

8. Annual Operating Budget

As part of the agreement with the Province, the City would be responsible for paying all of the costs of this facility. These are estimated as follows:

9. Agency Rents

The total square footage of the facility on the main and second floors has been calculated according to the renovation plans prepared by Bearden Engineering. Appendix "D" gives the detail on the areas occupied and the total costs of rents.

All of the organizations involved, with the exception of Downtown House, have indicated that the proposed rents are acceptable to them and within their budgets. There are four offices on the second floor that have not yet been assigned and it is anticipated that the rents for these offices are reasonable as well.

Downtown House has indicated that they would need some assistance in being able to afford the increased rents that would be assessed. Given their current location and the high priority of relocating their organization to better accommodation, the increased cost of approximately \$4,500 annually is justifiable. However, the F.C.S.S. Board needs to recognize that priority would have to be given to increased funding to Downtown House in the 1990 budget in order to enable them to make the move to this improved facility.

10. Financing of Project

The Steering Committee has identified a number of possible sources of grants to pay for some of the capital costs of this project. These sources are as follows:

Twilight Homes Foundation
 Red Deer Community Foundation
 Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation
 Canadian Job Strategy (Federal Government)
 New Horizons
 Community Facility Enhancement Program

The Steering Committee has proceeded to submit applications to the above organizations for picking up some of the capital costs of this project.

The proposed financing of the project is as follows:

It is proposed that The City of Red Deer finance the capital deficit of \$128,300 and that this capital be recovered over a 15 year period at the current interest rate available to the City in the amount of 10.5%. The annual payment in this instance would be \$16,810. Appendix "E" gives four examples of loan repayment schedules over 10 and 15 years at two different interest rates.

The annual costs over the 15 year life span of the facility, then, are as follows:

It can be seen from Appendix "D" that the total recoverable rent at 100% occupancy is \$57,150. It is likely that less than 100% of the rents would be recovered due to some reduction in occupancy but it is likely that rents after the second year of the project would approach the 100% figure. Therefore, this project appears to be financially feasible given the above considerations of rental rates, interest charges and grants from outside sources.

11. Recommendations

On the basis of the information contained in this proposal, it is recommended:

- I That The City of Red Deer enter into an agreement with the Province of Alberta to lease the Old Provincial Building to be used as a Community Services Centre for a period of 15 years commencing September 1, 1989 subject to the following conditions:
 - 1) that leasehold improvements as per the proposal dated May, 1989 as recommended by Bearden Engineering be approved by both parties subject to securing of the financial grants for the project in the amount of \$125,000.

- 2) that the lease contain an option to renew for five year periods following the termination of the lease.
- 3) that the lease contain a clause requiring either party to give two years' notice in the event of termination of the lease.
- 4) that the Province of Alberta agree to pay back a pro-rated share of the City's capital cost in the event of termination before the 15 year period lapses.

II That The City of Red Deer give its support for and agree to coordinate and facilitate applications by the tenants under the Municipal Tax Exemption Act for exemption of the facility for property tax purposes to take effect two years after the commencement of the lease.

The Gaetz Library

Dr. Gaetz, our pre-eminent pioneer, was a Methodist preacher, a successful businessman and community leader. He came to the west to get away from the pressures of a hectic community life in Ontario and found himself establishing a new town.

When Dr. Gaetz and his family arrived in this area in 1884 there were few other homesteaders. After an eight day trip by train from Ontario through the United States to Calgary and five days by ox wagon, the stopping house at The Crossing must have been a welcome sight. Their first house was a rude log cabin large enough to accommodate a family of ten children. Rough boards from the McKenzie and Wishart sawmill provided a roof and some inside trim.

That spring they broke ground and planted a garden and a few acres of grain. By 1890 Dr. Gaetz was giving evidence to the Standing Committee on Agriculture in Ottawa about the fertility of the soil and the overall suitability of the area for farming. He was looking for railways and settlers. The railway came to Red Deer in 1891, but the town and district grew more slowly than expected. This slow and steady growth was punctuated with periods of high immigration and periods of economic stagnation.



In 1901 Dr. Gaetz was able to retire to Woodlea Cottage, made entirely of locally milled lumber. The library, his office and meeting place, was attached to the side of

the house. No longer restrained by pioneering necessities, Dr. Gaetz had an extensive library, a far cry from the few books in the first school, only seventeen years before.

If you are interested in other aspects of Red Deer's history visit the adjacent Red Deer and District Museum and Archives. For more information call 343-6844.

The Historical Walking Tour starts here and takes you on a 4.5 kilometre walk past numerous heritage buildings and sites depicting the period of Red Deer's history primarily before 1914.

cash but invested their scarce resources in
a school for only seven children as a
commitment to the future.



This rough-hewn log building is a replica of
that first school built in 1887. Its construc-
tion is as good as a pioneer's house, built
with locally available material and a pio-
neer's tools and skills. The roughly
squared, hand hewn logs fit together better
than round logs and lasted longer than
unpeeled logs. The dovetail joints are not
only elegant, but functional. As the logs
shrink the tails draw the logs together. The
joints between the logs were plastered with
clay chinking.

The windows and the stove were the major
expense for the school. The hand-made
furniture was rough but serviceable. Books
used in the classroom were the varied
assortment the settlers brought with them.
Money was scarce and the grants from the
Northwest Territorial government offered
only a meagre wage to the teacher. Often
they only survived because of gifts of food
from the settlers.

By 1890 eighteen children were attending
this school. They were the seven school-
aged Gaetz children, the McClellan children
from The Crossing, the four Cole children,
the four children of the teacher, Mrs.
Sutherland and John Brisbin. The follow-
ing year the school was moved to Red Deer
to be near the growing population of the
hamlet.

The Stevenson-Hall Block

The Stevenson-Hall Block is a good exam-
ple of prairie, pioneer architecture. A
simple box-like structure with a false or
"boom town" front was a common architec-
tural feature of the new towns springing up
all over the west. The false front is an
attempt to make the structure appear more
than it is and perhaps to resemble larger
and more imposing buildings.

This building was built from lumber
produced in the Red Deer River valley.
Although lumber mills were to become an
important industry in Red Deer, in these
early years finished lumber was scarce and
expensive. The size of the structure reflects
this. The construction technique is the
familiar balloon frame and siding still
used in house-building today.

Although Messrs. Stevenson and Hall
moved on shortly after the structure was
completed, the block has served Red Deer
well. As a grocery store it furnished the
basic needs of the growing population and
the railway workers. As the Saskatchewan
Land and Homestead Company office it
played a central role in the land boom that
accompanied the influx of settlers at the
turn of the century. As larger structures
were built, the importance of the Stevenson
Hall Block lessened until it was retired as a
backyard workshed. Today, the Stevenson-
Hall Block is a reminder of the business
history of Red Deer.

GAETZ LIBRARY RESTORATION PROJECT

The project involved the restoration and relocation to Heritage Square in Rotary Recreation Park of the library portion of Woodlea Cottage, the 1901 home of the Reverend and Mrs. Leonard Gaetz.

The building was moved by Bonanza Building Movers Ltd. in late November of 1987. Prior to being moved, an engineering study was completed by Stuckey Construction of Red Deer. The engineering study indicated that the building was in good condition and that it was of unusually fine construction.

The Gaetz Library Restoration Project was integrated into a larger project known as Heritage Square being the major commemorative project for Red Deer's 75th Anniversary being celebrated in 1988. In addition to the Gaetz Library there would see the completion of the Stevenson-Hall Block, a replica of Red Deer's first school, the Presbyterian Church steeple and the development of landscaping and signage of the Park.

January 14 an application was submitted to the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation for a grant for architectural restoration in the amount of \$5,000. It was anticipated that the project would cost about \$15,000 in total. \$5,000 was realized from the Red Deer Heritage Foundation and \$5,000 from the Community Cultural Recreation Grant Program. The Alberta Historical Resources Foundation advised May 10 that the application had been successful.

Meanwhile, H. Mathiesen has been selected to be the contractor for a contract price of \$6,818.50. Subsequently, it was discovered that an additional sum of money was required to complete the project in the amount of \$500.00.

The building was moved onto its new foundation in early May and construction continued through to July 15.

An appraisal was done by R.C. Perry Appraisals and Consultants Ltd. on the value of the building. They estimated the building to be worth approximately \$4,950.00 and an income tax receipt from the City of Red Deer was generated for the donors of the building, Dr. & Mrs. R.M. Chadwick. Mr. Perry donated \$250.00 representing the cost of his appraisal.

Arrangements were made for interpretive signage and completion of the landscaping prior to the official opening of Heritage Square held July 31, 1989. The official opening attracted about 4,000 people and was a major outdoor event commemorating the 75th Anniversary. The Heritage Day weekend combined the opening of Heritage Square with other special heritage festival activities.

Mr. Redvers Perry, Director of the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation, was present at the official opening to represent the Foundation. Also present were Mayor and Mrs. J.C. Beaumier from Cap-de-la-Madeline, P.Q., Red Deer's twin city.

The project has been successful from every aspect. The restoration work is complete and of very high quality. The building provides a significant reminder of one of Red Deer's earliest buildings and its relation to the founder of the City of Red Deer, the Reverend Leonard Gaetz. The building provides an interesting architectural feature in the Heritage Square setting. The building will provide a useful interior space for use in connection with Heritage Square activities. The project was completed on time and within budget.

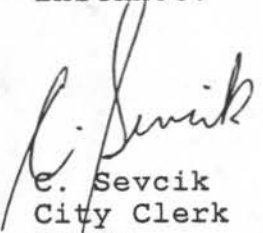

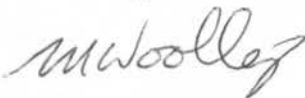

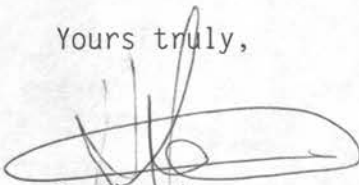
In response to your memo regarding the above, we have the following comments for Council's consideration.

Mr. Woolley filed the attached complaint forms with the Bylaw Department. When we looked into the circumstances of the issuance of these tickets, it was determined that the first ticket was issued on January 9, 1989, because the vehicle was parked on the snow route. The vehicle was towed off the snow route onto a side street which was subsequently cleaned and a second ticket issued January 12, 1989. At that time, because the license plates were expired, the vehicle was towed to the towing contractor's yard.

Under the attached policy, because two tickets were issued, the prosecution of these tickets was stopped. However, the charge for towing the vehicle and for storage of the vehicle was, in our opinion, Mr. Woolley's responsibility. The vehicle was left on a snow route and had expired plates.

We recommend that Mr. Woolley's request be denied.

PROCEDURES FOR INVESTIGATING PARKING TAG COMPLAINTS

This particular procedure shall apply to parking tags only and shall not apply to tags issued for moving offences under The Highway Traffic Act or other similar Provincial Statutes.

(1) *All complaints concerning the issuance of tags for violation of a parking offence under The Highway Traffic Act or for an offence under The City of Red Deer Traffic Bylaw, shall be referred directly to the Bylaw Enforcement Section.*

(2) *The Bylaw Enforcement Section shall initiate in duplicate a complaint form as per form "A" attached.*

(3) *One copy of the complaint form shall be routed to the issuing officer who shall investigate the complaint fully and record his or her findings on the said complaint form and return same to the Development Officer.*

(4) *The Development Officer shall review the complaint and the findings of the issuing officer and such other information as may be necessary and shall direct that processing of the traffic tag be "stopped" or "continued" and that the complainant be informed in writing of such decision.*

(5) *A copy of the letter of response to the complainant shall be attached to the complaint form for record purposes.*

(6) *The Development Officer may, if he deems it to be in the City's best interests, discontinue prosecution or direct that a given ticket be not entered for prosecution as the case may be.*

Commissioners' Comments

Contrary to the statement in the attached letter from Mr. Woolley, clearly proper arrangements were not made to conform to the City's snow route policy during Mr. Woolley's absence as tickets were issued for 2 separate infractions. We believe that Mr. Woolley has been more than fairly treated by having the prosecution of these tickets stopped and we could not recommend reimbursement of the towing and storage charge.

For Council's information, it is not a matter of cancelling the towing and storage charge. Under our contract, Willy's Towing will require payment either by Mr. Woolley or the City.

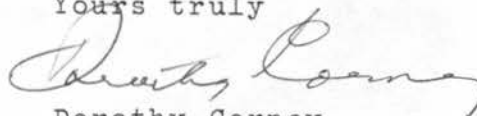
Having proceeded thus far, our Lawyer has recommended that we endeavour to get an ADVANCE RULING from Council.

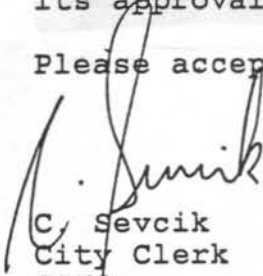
At the Committee of the Whole of Council meeting, the attached memo dated May 9, 1989, from the Director of Financial Services pertaining to the above topic was considered.

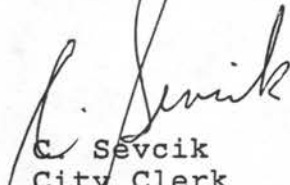

The City of Red Deer is cognisant of your government's efforts to curtail the ever increasing federal debt, and that, in so doing, there are difficult decisions to be made.

We have, however, a very significant concern that as a result of these federal budget cuts, the VIA Rail passenger service in Western Canada (particularly Edmonton, Jasper, Vancouver, Banff, Calgary) has been placed in jeopardy.

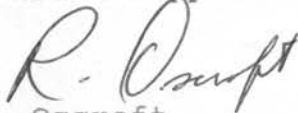
The lane in question is subject to increased traffic since the construction of the Mountview Fire Station. I would estimate that a minimum of 60 vehicle movements a day occur over the length of the lane by vehicles coming to or leaving the station.

In summer the road surface deteriorates quite rapidly even after grading, and there is the nuisance of dust raised by the traffic. Considerable water ponding occurs after heavy rainstorms.

It appears that each residence has parking facilities served from the lane, and there is probably some inconvenience to the petitioners caused by the deteriorated road surface.

I would have some concerns as to the probability of increased risk of traffic accident because of increased speeds anticipated by the paving of the lane, however the advantages of reduced dust and reduced maintenance costs to the lane would outweigh any disadvantages.

I would support the petitioners in this instance.

Re: Petition - Paving of the Lane

The petitioners are requesting the paving of the lane located east of 44A Avenue between 32nd and 34th Streets. No particular reason is given for this request, but it would appear the traffic volume, noise level or the dust caused by cars may be the basis for their request.

On the west side of the lane there are sixteen single family houses. On the east side there is a fire station, playground and school yard. A portion of the lane abutting the fire station is now paved.

The paving of lanes is normally undertaken as a local improvement provided it is supported by two thirds of the property owners, representing at least half of the land value. In this case the agreement of the public school is essential, otherwise the City has to accept their share of the cost.

Although we support the idea of paving the lane in principle, a paved lane in this location may give the impression that it is a narrow road and may encourage more use of the lane by the public. Furthermore the lane may be used more often for parking at school functions.

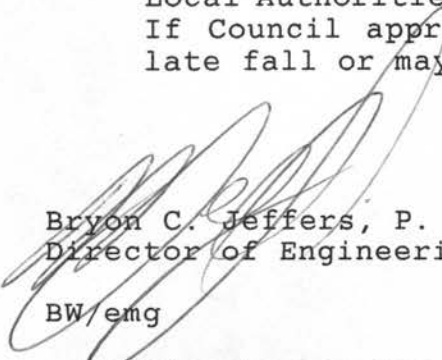

The Engineering Department has no objection to paving the above noted lane. However, we do have the following comments:

1. The work should be undertaken as a local improvement, with the benefitting property owners responsible for the construction costs.
2. The 1987 unit rate is \$70 per assessable metre or \$8.58 per assessable metre per year for 20 years, if paid on the tax roll. This rate will need adjustment to reflect current costs.
3. The lane was paved, as a General Benefit, adjacent to the 32 Street Fire Hall, for a distance of 52.48 m north of 32 Street.
4. It should be noted that the 50% share from the east side of the lane would be a General Benefit cost to the City at large.
5. The time required to design, advertise, seek approval from the Local Authorities Board, and schedule construction is limited. If Council approves the project, construction may occur in late fall or may have to be deferred to 1990.

There are 15 properties abutting the proposed paved lane improvement petition that is proposed to City Council. Section 156 (2) of the Municipal Taxation Act states:

(2) On receipt of the petition praying for any local improvement and signed by at least two thirds in number of the persons registered or assessed as owners

(a) of land abutted on that part of the street or place whereon or wherein the improvement is to be made, or

(b) of land to be benefitted by the local improvement,

as the case may be, and representing at least one half in value of the land, excluding improvements thereon, as the land is valued on the last revised assessment roll, the Council may take all proper and necessary proceedings for undertaking and completing the local improvement on the special frontage assessment system of special local benefit assessment system, as the case may be."

The petition contains 13 signatures, two of which are not eligible to appear on the petition for the following reasons.

1. Carrie Bollinger is not the registered owner of 3305 - 44A Avenue. The registered owner on the assessment roll (Theresa Dale Turton) was confirmed with Land Titles Office on May 12, 1989.
2. The registered owners of 3201 - 44A Avenue (Cleo and Mary Toepfer) are not abutting the proposed paved lane.

Included in the 15 owners is the Red Deer Public School District #104 of which we have a copy of correspondence dated May 15, 1989 signed by R. E. Congdon, Assistant Superintendent - Business Services, indicating the School District wishes to withdraw its right to sign the above mentioned petition, as provided in Section 158 of the Municipal Taxation Act.

The stipulation whereby a requirement of at least one half of the assessment roll be represented by the petition is also met by the signatures of the petitioners.

The remaining 11 signatures on the petition meet the requirements of Section 156 (2) of the Municipal Taxation Act. It should be noted that the south end of the lane abutting Lots 13, 14 and 15, and directly adjacent to and on the westerly side of the Fire Hall are presently paved and the lots are not included in the petition nor have they been included in the calculation of properties and assessment in analyzing the petition results.

Being a Bylaw to amend Bylaw No. 2942/87, the Dangerous Goods Route Bylaw of The City of Red Deer.

1. Bylaw 2942/87 is hereby amended by deleting Section 13(a) and by substituting therefor the following:

"at a permitted storage location, meaning any area which is at least one hundred and fifty (150) metres away from the nearest place of assembly, institutional or residential occupancy, or at a location approved by the Fire Chief".

2. This Bylaw shall come into force on the date of its passage.
